Rev. Alanson Brown To Visit England For Study At Canterbury College

The Rev. Alanson Brown, rector of St. John's Episcopal Church, is planning a four week stay in England this summer. The trip, sponsored by the Rural Worker's Fellowship of the Episcopal Church, will take him to both London and Canterbury for a period of travel and study. Accompanied by his wife and children, Mr. Brown will leave for Alexandria, Virginia, June 5, where he will participate in a two week refresher course at the Virginia Seminary in Alexandria. Mr. Brown will leave his family vacationing with relatives in Alexandria, and fly from New York June 29. After a three day visit in London, he will proceed to Canterbury, Kent, England for a study period at St. Augustine's College, the central theological college of the Anglican Church.

The courses of study are all relevant to the role of small town churches, and are designed to acquaint the participating ministers with typical, small town parishes. As a part of this study, Rev. Brown will have the opportunity to study English rural life, for he will spend a week in the home of a vicar in a small parish. After completing his stay in Canterbury, Mr. Brown will have two weeks in which to travel and visit in England. He will fly from London to New York July 30 and, after a short stop in Alexandria, Virginia, will arrive in Sonora, August 5. Mr. Brown will be traveling on a scholarship provided by the Home Department of The National Council of the Episcopal Church.

John Paul Friess was high individual with a total of 696 points and Preston Neely third with 687. Highest possible score was 800 points. High junior was Ray Glascock with 691 points.
