Proceeds from the annual sale are used by the Lion's Club to sponsor Boy Scout and Girl Scout troops, operate the swimming pool, Little League baseball, Wool and Mohair Show, and other projects.

"The continued support of ranchmen and businessmen will be appreciated, and the money will be used for a good cause," said E. B. Keng, Lion's Club president.

## Sub-Station Range Management Day Postponed Until Wed. Of Next Week

The range management field day originally scheduled to be held Wednesday, September 13 at the Ranch Experiment Station near here has been postponed until Wednesday, September 20. Uncertainty about possible bad weather resulting from Hurricane Carla led to the postponement.

The field day will begin at ten o'clock Wednesday morning with discussion of the economics of range management, progress of range management and wildlife

management. Speakers will be C. L. Leinweber, R. J. Hildreth, O. C. Wallmo and A. H. Walker.

The Sutton County 4-H Club will serve lunch at a nominal cost to guests.

A guided tour of the range study pastures will be conducted in the afternoon to show the results of different kinds and combinations of livestock grazing, rates of grazing, outstanding results of deferred rotation, and results of rangeland seeding on rangelands.

### First Steer Roping In Over 50 Years Scheduled For Sonora September 23

The Sonora Park and Horse Show Assn. has scheduled a steer roping contest for Saturday, September 23, with performances at 2:00 P.M. and at 8 P.M. The events will be held in the new revamped rodeo arena at the Sonora Park. The proceeds will go toward the improvement of the Park.

Big steers from Old Mexico will be used in this event and some thirty teams of ropers have indicated they will behave. Team roping is a popular type of rodeo and with big steers it promises real excitement. This will be the first roping of this type in Sonora.

Vernon West, Ray Hutto and others of Del Rio are assembling the livestock and are staging a contest in Del Rio this weekend. The Del Rio event is being sponsored by the Del Rio Lions Club.

Old timers of Sonora may remember the old fashioned steer roping contests held here around the turn of the century. The last one staged here, we are informed, was about 1906 and the setting where our school grounds are now located. This event attracted the top ropers of the nation.

### Salk Vaccine Still Best Bet As Polio Preventive

According to information received from the Texas Department of Health by Dr. Charles F. Browne, data compiled by the Department provides "a strong indication for continuing emphasis on the use of Salk vaccine (against polio), the only available preparation affording protection against all 3 types of poliovirus."

The new polio vaccine tablets are effective only against Type I polio. This type has been the greatest menace of the three types but since 1959 the incidence of Type III polio has increased steadily.

Parents of children who have not received the Salk injections or who have not been innoculated themselves are urged to do so.

Sonora High School's Broncos squeezed by the San Felipe Mustangs 15 to 14 here Friday night in their second game of the season. Rain which began falling in the final quarter of the game made the last nine minutes of the evening hard going for both teams.

In the first quarter quarterback Primo Gonzales connected a 50-yard pass to Julio Samaniego to set up a touchdown by Danny Rutherford who scored from the 18 yardline on a run off tackle. Gonzales kicked was good for the bonus point.

In the second period San Felipe's Arturo Soto scored on a

ten yard end run. The conversion attempt was no good. Later in the same quarter Sonora's Lester Schmidt pushed over guard for the Broncos' second touchdown. A pass from Gonzales to Augustin Chavez gave the Broncos the all-important extra two points.

After a scoreless third quarter San Felipe's Soto plunged over from the Sonora one. Soto's pass to Villarreal was good and the game ended on the 15 to 14 score.

quota. Running a country is not much different from running a ranch; very few people can do it successfully.  
So, the world ought to be divided up into twelve zones, and only one zone allowed to have a crisis at a time, and that one limited to one month. Any time a crisis can't run its course in a month, somebody is just hogging the news. Thus we'd have only twelve a year, and never more than one at a time. You take a country whose crisis allotment comes in January, and it gets to itching to have one in November, it'll just have to wait. Over-production can play thunder with the crisis market the same as it can with us ranchers, and everybody knows the world can't stand to be in the same shape ranching's in.

### Smallmouth Bass Now Showing Up In Llano River

Smallmouth bass at last may be getting a foothold in Texas, according to Marion Toole, coordinator of inland fisheries of the Game and Fish Commission. He has received information about the catching of one large smallmouth and two small ones

on the Llano River near Junction. The two small fish caught are indicative that the original stocking there two years ago has produced a successful spawn.

Consideration now is being given to additional stockings in the Frio and Nueces rivers. This would be done from a stock of fingerlings now being held at the San Marcos hatchery.

A successful spawn has been had at the hatchery, which would provide enough fish for an initial planting, according to the biologist.

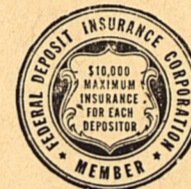
