## Some Foreign Ranch Employees

There has been some misunderstanding by farmers and ranchers as to which foreign born agricultural employees are covered by social security, according to Floyd B. Ellington, manager of the San Angelo Social Security District Office.

If you are a farmer or rancher and contract with a foreign government for specific temporary agricultural workers, then wages paid to these employees are not taxable wages under the Junior High Invitational Basket-Social Security Act. Juicy Purple Plums Enhance Dessert



It's hard to find a better-or more inexpensive-treat than "Society Dessert" to serve at a club meeting in your home. If there's any left over, the family will go for it, too.

Graham cracker crumbs form the base and topping for a filling of canned purple plums, chopped pecans and whipped evaporated milk in a lemon gelatin mixture. A luscious purple plum half atop each chilled serving provides an elegant touch.

Rich-looking canned purple plums, which have been scarce for the last two years, are now available in good supply in grocery stores to add delightful flavor to many desserts and entrees.

1 can (141/2 oz.) evaporated milk 1 can (1 lb. 15 oz.) purple

plums in extra heavy syrup
1/2 cup chopped pecans
2 packages lemon gelatin
3 cups hot water

cups graham cracker, gin-ger or vanilla cooky

Pour evaporated milk into refrigerator tray; chill until icy cold and partially frozen. Drain plums. Pit and cut into small pieces. Add nuts. Dissolve gelatin in hot water and chill until partially set. Whip until light and fluffy. Add lemon juice, rind and sugar. Whip chilled milk and fold into gelatin mixture. Line bottom of 13 x 9-inch pan with crumbs, reserving ½ cup for top. Pour in half of gelatin mixture. Arrange plum mixture over it. Spoon in remaining gelatin and sprinkle with remaining crumbs. Chill until firm. Cut into squares to serve. Garnish with purple plum half, if desired. Makes 15 servings.

Total wages shown on an employee's W-2 must include amounts received as sick pay from his employer, even though no tax has been withheld on such sick pay. Sick pay is not required to be shown separately.

If it becomes necessary to correct a W-2 after it has been given to an employee, a revised statement must be issued and marked "corrected by employer."
