

Ranchers Reminded To Back-Tag Cattle In Brucellosis Program

Ranchers are reminded to back-tag all grown cattle (three years of age or older) that are being shipped to market, so that the cattle can be blood tested and credited to their herd and to Sutton County for Brucellosis recertification.

If ranchers test at least 5 percent of all breeding cattle in the county each year or a total of 15 percent for each 3 year period, the county can be recertified as a modified certified Brucellosis area without a retest.

Sutton County's 3 year period of brucellosis certification expires November 16, 1963, so it would be possible to get the county recertified without a retest if we could get 15 percent of the cattle back tagged and tested under the back-tag method before this date.

Information on this program and back-tag kits may be obtained at the Chamber of Commerce office, the County Agent's office or from Livestock inspectors.

Imported Birds Being Studied in Lamar County

Some 400 French redlegged partridges have been released in the prairie grass and meadows of Lamar County in recent weeks, according to W. J. Cutbirth, Jr., assistant executive secretary of the Game and Fish Commission.

This is a European import, native to France, and the birds have been successfully transplanted to England. Brood stock was obtained from England about four years ago, through the

cooperation and recommendation of the Bureau of Sport Fisheries and Wildlife of the U. S. Fish and Wildlife Service.

The purpose of the releases is to make a study of the exotic game bird, to determine if it is adaptable to the Texas environment, and if it will be a suitable game bird. The release site in Lamar County was selected because conditions appear to be similar to the native habitat in France and England. To date, approximately 700 have been released in the study area.

The redlegged partridge is from three to four times the weight of the bobwhite quail. They are reported to eat a considerable amount of green foods, and because of their preference for more open range with a minimum of escape cover, they are not likely to compete directly with bobwhites for available food.

A check of the banded birds shows that to date they have remained within the study area. A limited number of redlegs are being raised at the Tyler game bird farm for this study, and none of them will be available for general release until such time as the study has accomplished its purpose.

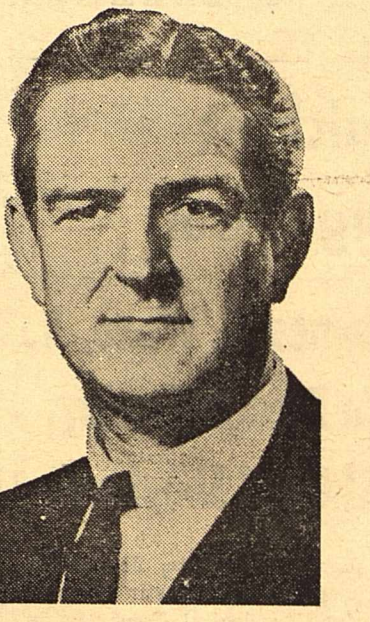

Licenseless Fishing Tops Arrest Lists

This is fishing season, and too many are going fishing without buying licenses, according to arrest reports of game wardens for the month of March.

There were 94 arrests for fishing without a license during the month. In all, game wardens arrested 257 persons, and the courts assessed fines and costs amounting to \$8,889 for the month.

Although the deer hunting season has been closed since December 31, 1961, a number of arrests were made for killing deer in closed season, killing does, and hunting at night. In fact, there were 36 arrests made in connection with night hunting.

The licenses were suspended on 18 violators, and some of them paid fines amounting to \$200.

A fishing license is required of all persons between 17 and 65 who fish outside their home county or who fish with rod and reel or other winding devices any place in the state. The price is \$2.15 for either resident or non-resident.

New Soil & Water Conservation Program Available To Eligible Sutton Ranchers

A new soil and water conservation program is now available to interested, and eligible, landowners and operators in Sutton County-called the Great Plains Conservation Program.

The program was started several years ago to help operators in the twelve Great Plains states to hasten application of conservation practices on the land. Much of this area was plowed up

or badly overgrazed during two war periods, and has been a source of severe dust storms. Sutton County is the southern-most county included in the program.

The Great Plains Conservation Program, or GPCP, is quite similar to the soil conservation district program, except that it provides cost-shares to operators for applying certain needed conser-

vation measures on the land. No assistance is provided for proper range use or deferred grazing, but the operator must also carry out these practices on his ranch.

The GPCP program does not in any way interfere with the Sutton County ACPS program-it simply enables more landowners or operators to apply a sound conservation program. It is also separate from and in addition to the Edwards Plateau Soil Conservation District program of technical assistance, in which participation by the landowner is completely voluntary.

The GPCP program is administered by a local committee consisting of the SCS work unit conservationist as chairman; the

chairman of the Sutton County ACPS; the County Agent; and the Edwards Plateau SCD board of supervisors in a consulting representative.

Cost share assistance is based on the planning of needed conservation practices on an entire ranch, or operating unit. Assistance is limited to various brush control practices, cross fences, water development, seeding of old fields or rangeland, pitting, and diversion terraces.

Some conservation practices will be required, where necessary to restore productivity of the land, while others may be optional with the landowner. For example, heavy brush infestations must be controlled, mode-

rate brush infestation control is optional with the landowner, and no cost share assistance can be provided for light infestations.

The program allows cost-share assistance up to \$25,000 per ranch, and contracts can cover periods from 3 to 10 years. The program is designed to help cooperators who are definitely interested in applying a sound conservation program to an entire ranch. When a conservation plan is developed with a GPCP cooperator, a contract is signed which sets up or earmarks the amount of cost-share planned for each practice. Changes and amendments can be made to hasten or defer application of practices, but the contract must be carried out or the cost-share assistance must be refunded.

Sutton County landowners and operators who are interested in this program should contact E. B. Keng, Soil Conservation Service.

Area Citizens Show Interest In Fisher Survey

By Congressman O. C. Fisher

IF THE PEOPLE in southwest Texas had their way about it there would be no medical care program under social security; no federal school aid; no UN bond purchase; no expansion of the Peace Corps and the Congress would retain its constitutional responsibilities rather than delegating some of them to the President, on a standby basis.

RESULTS OF TABULATION of the questionnaires just completed reveal an aroused public interest in governmental affairs in our area. Plugging for lower federal spending, fewer controls, less government in the affairs of the people, Texans spoke out strongly and decisively in answer to the 24 questions submitted.

On the question of expanding the Peace Corps (whose mission is largely a duplication of Point 4) 79 per cent were against and only 9 per cent favored more spending on this project.

The people voted more than 4 to 1 against the medicare proposal, the adoption of which would force an increase in the social security tax.

Federal school aid was defeated more than 3 to 1. In fact, of 382 teachers who answered, 289 were opposed to federal aid for teachers' salaries.

"Right to work" laws were favored by well over 10 to 1.

Nearly 75 per cent oppose any expansion of unemployment compensation. Hundreds of citizens wrote in to cite specific instances of abuse in this program, where unemployed refuse to seek or accept gainful employment so long as they can draw unemployment benefits.

And they take a dim view of the various new welfare programs that have been submitted to the Congress.

By a margin of nearly 5 to 1 these Texans think we should forego any raises for government employees at this time.

And by a ratio of better than 2½ to 1 the people oppose H.R. 3745, a World War I pension bill.

Foreign aid should be confined to friendly countries, and it should be reduced or eliminated.

This is the voice of the people of the 21st district. Some 15,000 expressed themselves. This represents a fairly accurate cross-section of public opinion.

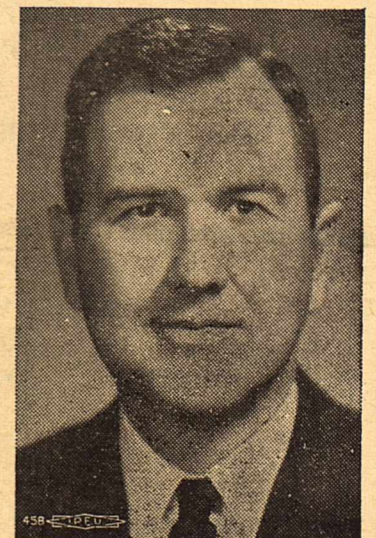

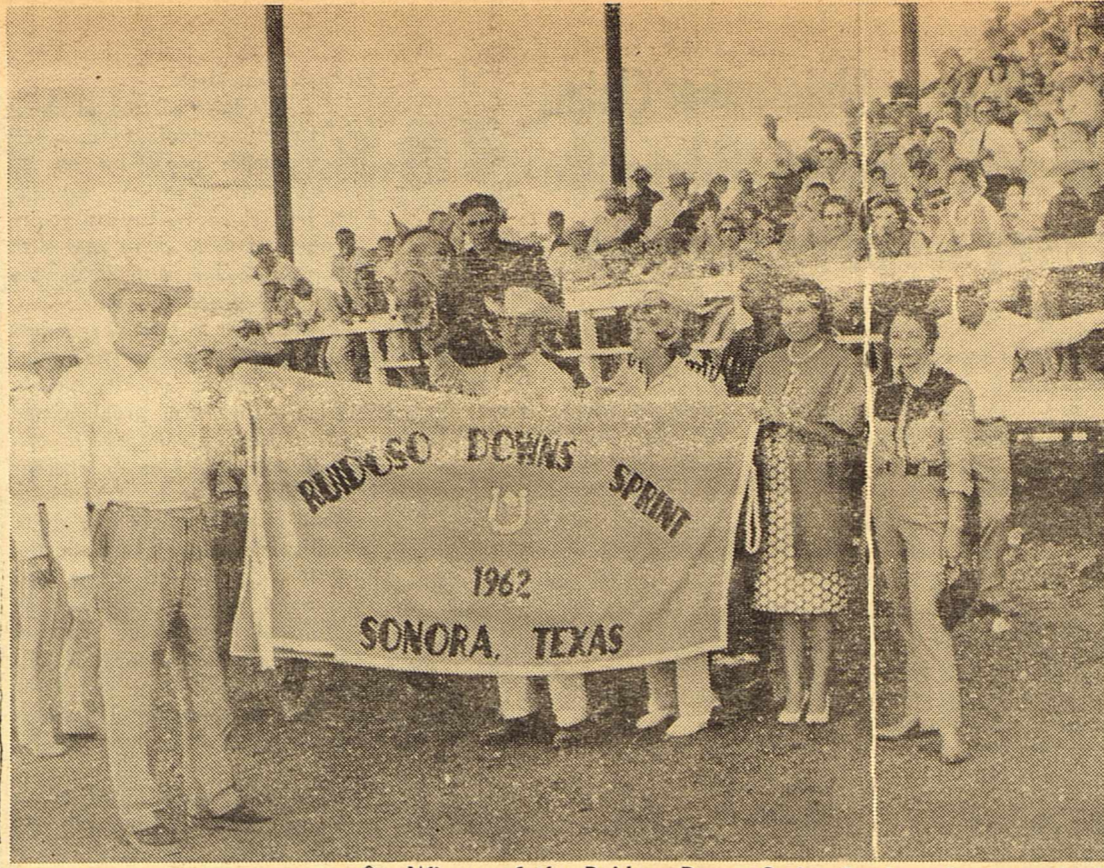
