GAINS BY FRENCH TOWARD LASSIGNY

SOME PROGRESS TOWARD COV-ETED POSITION IS OFFICIAL-LY REPORTED.

QUIET ON THE BRITISH FRONT

News Indicates Offensive in Picardy Will Be Continued Until More Gains Are Made.

London-The French resumed their offensive Tuesday in Picardy, attack-ing the German line between the Matz and the Oise rivers over a front of some 15 or 20 miles, extending from the neighborhood of Les Loges. south of Roye, to the vicinity of Rib ecourt The official French statement tells of an advance to the north and east of Gury. "thereby increasing the menace to the Germans at Lassigny. Farther east, the statement says, the French lines were advanced a mile and a half to the north of the village of Cambronne, a town not on available maps. Unofficial reports claim that the French have captured the high part of a chain of hills opposite Lassigny, referred to in press dispatches as the "massif of Lassigny," and that the French position is such as to make it highly probable that the Germans will have to evacuate Lassigny in a few hours, which in turn is expected mpel them to fall back to a line running roughly from Peronne to Noyon. Should the Germans fall back to the Noyon-Peronne line it would involve evacuating as much territory as the allied armies have already captured, 300 square miles or

Federal Occupation Tax Provided.

Washington.-Proprietors of all business and professional men will pay an annual federal license of \$10 and heads of wholesale concerns doing a yearly business of \$200,000 will be required to pay an annual fee of \$25, according to a schedule inserted in the draft of the \$8,000,000,000 revenue bill by house ways and means committee. Farmers, mechanics, ministers and teachers will be exempted from the \$10 occupational tax, as will concerns doing an annual business of

GAINS ARE MADE IN PICARDY BY ALLIES

ALLIED GUNS ARE POUNDING ROADS AND BRIDGES BE-

Paris-French troops fighting south of Roye Monday and American and British troops fighting north of the Somme Sunday night gained ground Somme Sunday night gained ground have been unable to stem the tide in Picardy. The British between the of advance against them. Somme and Roye made practically no gains during Monday.

Reports indicate that the Germans are making a determined stand along as much of the front as they have been able to reorganize and that re inforcements have arrived to fill the depleted ranks.

The gains of Sunday and Monday aggregate about 60 square miles, whereas those of Saturday totaled about 110 square miles. The reports of Monday are not quite clear, but it appears that less ground was taken Monday than on Sunday,

The attack on Picardy is the largest allied victory in France in quite a long time and the result of it has been to start a wave of discontent in Germany, if the newspapers correctly interpret public opinion

Monday's operations north of the Somme resulted in the capture of Braye by British and Americans. an advance of some two miles over a front of possibly three miles. Braye is on the north bank of the Somme in a region where the heaviest German opposition has been shown since the new drive began.

Proyart. four miles south of the Somme, was definitely added to the allied gains.

Lihons, near Chaulnes, appears also to have been definitely taken from the Germans.

BEATEN HUNS ARE STILL FALLING BACK

GERMAN DIVISIONAL HEADQUAR TERS KIDNAPED EN BLOC BY ALLIED SOLDIERS.

With British Armies in the Field .-Broken and bewildered, the Second and Eighth German armies are still failing back before the eastward drive of the allies, abandoning their stores, guns and equipment and in-tent only on reaching a rendezvous where they can reorganize and rally from this staggering blow.

The battle front was widened Sun day by fresh attacks on the part of the French on the right. Montdidier was recovered on Saturday by an adroit blow on its flank, and additional pressure thrown against the re tiring enemy in this region and be Montdidier in accelerating his journey toward home

The Huns also are finding the Americans against them in this retreat. as they did in their last along the Marne, and the discovery has filled them with unspeakable rage.

While the Germans have material ly stiffened their defense against the British, American and French troops on the Picardy battle front,

The Americans and their British brothers in arms at last accounts were pressing closely upon the Braymme, aided by tanks and ar mored cars.

By far the greater progress has been made by the French from the region immediately southwest and south of Roye to the Oise river. Here they have driven their line well across Roye-Compeigne road and at Cambronne have reached the road leading from Compeigne to Noyon.

The smoke of large fires continues to be seen far behind the enemy lines and the movement of long transport columns eastward is considered evidence that it is the intention of the enemy ultimately to retreat to new lines of defense.

Aviators have destroyed all the bridges across the Somme from the region of Peronne southward, and with the enemy's communicating lines either in their hands or domin-ated by their guns are retrograde movement necessarily must be slow. The allied troops gradually are encircling Roye.

Gas, Attack Made on Coast Guards Washington.-Using poisoned gas a German submarine attacked the coast guard station and lighthouse on Smith Island off the North Carolina coast Saturday night, the navy department has announced. Six men were overcome by the gas. The gas

was released from oil spread over the surface of the water by the submarine, the navy department announce ment says. Three large areas of the oil, each larger than acre, grounded near the island. The gas, which appeared similar to mustard gas, used in fighting on the western front, was effective about 40 minutes. None of the men overcome by the fumes died.

ALLIES CONTINUE TO FOLLOW UP GAINS

ADVANCE OF THE BRITISH AND FRENCH IN PICARDY STILL CONTINUES.

Paris.-The allied advance in the Picardy salient east of Amiens con Thursday the area occupied was about 90 square miles, while that occupied Friday was approximately 25 square miles. The total of pristaken up to Friday night was officially stated to be 17,000. tween 200 and 300 cannon have been captured. Of the prisoners, the French claim credit for 4 000, which would leave 13,000 to the credit of the British. Fighting was still going on when General Halg's report was written Friday afternoon. The Berlin official statement, issued at noon, claimed that German counter-attacks had stopped the allied progress be-tween the Somme and the Avre, but the night statement admits that "the enemy is continuing his attacks."

When the British advanced Thursday they captured Chipiliy, near the bend in the river between Cerisy and Mericourt. A dispatch from London Friday night says the Germans, by a strong counter-attack recaptured Chipilly.

The German strength here has pre vented the British advance on the north side of the Somme from keep ing up with that on the south side However, the gain on the north side remains some four miles deep. The advance on the south side of the river at the deepest point is between 11 and 12 miles. General Haig, in his report, fixes the new line as beginning at Pirrepont on the Avre river and extending northeastward to Arvillers, thence north via Rosleres and Rainecourt, thence northwest to From Morcourt the line runs due north via Cerisy to the old line near Morlancourt. WATER COLORED BY PLANTS

Interesting Discovery the Result of Tests Made by Scientists of Harvard University.

That many marine plants cause ser water to become alkaline when ex-posed to sunlight is definitely proved through interesting experiments devised by W. J. V. Osterhout and A. R. C. Haas of the laboratory of plant physiology, Harvard university.

These gentlemen have found a way measure accurately the increased alkalinity. Without going into details, it may be said that this consists in immersing a green seaweed in a glass tube of salt water to which a few drops of phenopthalein have been added. After exposure to smilght, the water turns plak, and the degree of pinkness, measured by watching against the colors of a series of tubes containing the same concentration of indicator in a series of "buffer soluquantity of alkali produced by the action of the snnlight.

LESSON FOR AUGUST 18

SOME ACTIVITIES OF THE PRIMI-

LESSON TEXT-Acts 2:42-47; 4:32-35; 6:

GOLDEN TEXT-Enter into his gates with thanksgiving, and into his courts with praise: be thankful unto him and bless his name.—Psaims 10:4.

DEVOTIONAL READING—Psaims 122:

1-9. ADDITIONAL MATERIAL—Mark 11:15-17; Acts 10:33: I Corinthians 2:9; 12:4-29; Ephesians 4:1-16.

1. The Church Worshiping (Acts 2: 42-47).

As the result of Peter's preaching at Pentecost about three thousand per-sons confessed Christ in baptism. That their conversion was genuine is evi-denced by what they did:

1. "Continued steadfastly in the apostles' doctrine" (v. 42).

Continuance and steadfastness are infallible proofs of the genuineness of one's conversion. They not only were steadfast, but they kept themselves in the school of Christ-came regularly to the meetings to be instructed by the apostles. Christians cannot grow un-less they feed upon God's word. Trashy novels and story papers will not make Christians grow. The "s' ere milk of the word" is essential to growth (I Peter 2:2).

Kept themselves in the fellow-

ship of the apostles (v. 42).

This doubtless means that they attached themselves to the church and sought the friendship of Christian peo-ole. Christian growth is helped by association with Christian people, not by withdrawal. One who expects sanctification in seclusion will be doomed to disappointment.

3. They went regularly to the com-munion table (v. 42).

In the "breaking of bread" they symbolically fed upon Christ. True worshipers will not neglect this means of

4. They went regularly to the prayer meeting (v. 42).

Prayer is the very breath of soul growth. It is as necessary to spiritual life as breathing is to physical life. The result of such life was:

(1) Wholesome fear (v. 43). (2) A powerful ministry (v. 43). Many wonders and signs were done by the apostles. (3) Mutual ministry (vv. 44-45). Those who give themselves to Christ are large-hearted and generous, giving of their substance to help the poor and needy. (4) A constant worship (v. 46). (5) Unity and gladness (v. 46). (6) Gracious influence among the people (v. 47). (7) A perpetual growth (v. 47). Where such genuineness is manifest there will be growth. The Lord added to the church daily—

there was a continuous revival.

II. The Church Witnessing (Acts 4:

Note the characteristics of a witnessing church:

1. A praying church (v. 31). For every want and every need they betook themselves to God in prayer.

2. A spirit-filled church (v. 31).
