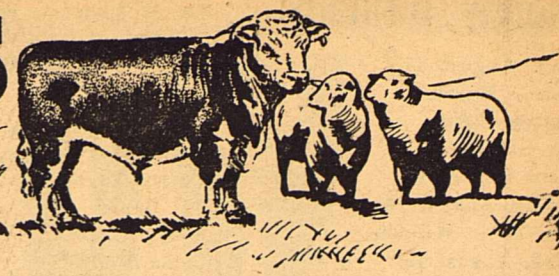

## City Clean-up To Start August 20

Roll 'em! That will be the City's call bright and early Monday morning, August 20, to set off a week of rolling to pick up trash along all the curbs in any section of town as part of Sonora's Chamber of Commerce-Garden Club joint clean-up drive.

City trucks will pick up trash throughout the week, as long as needed, until Sonora's house-cleaning is completed.

Property owners, residents, homemakers and businessmen are encouraged to cooperate in the week's cleanup, August 20-24. It is stressed that vacant lots, too, should be mowed and cleared during this drive. Trash and discarded material should be placed along any curb for the City's disposal crew.

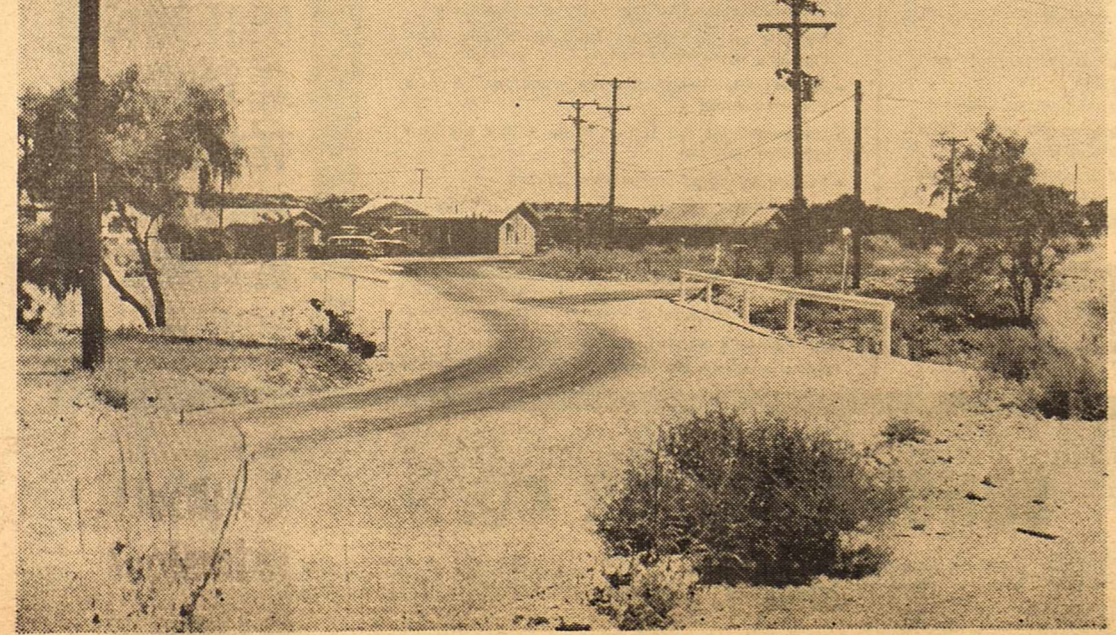

# A Fire A Day In Sonora Keeps Firemen Fighting

A fire a day keeps the firemen fighting away. And there has been an average of one fire a day since Wednesday, August 8 with the worst one happening at the Robert Halbert Ranch, where about 400 acres of grassland burned in three hours. This started from a trash fire built "safely" in a cliche pit with no grass anywhere near. By all the odds, this was the fire that could not happen.

Thursday, August 9 there was a fire in the Frank Reyna home with \$100 property loss, due to smoking in bed.

Friday, August 10 during trash in a can caused a grass fire at Happy Brown's Cafe.

Saturday, August 11 saw no fire in Sonora, but the average was maintained the following day by all the misfortunes of an electrical storm with no rewarding moisture.

Sunday, August 12 lightning with no rain set off a fire on the Glen Richardson ranch about 50 miles out of Sonora near Rock Springs, where about 100 acres of grass was destroyed. On the same day, lightning set off a grass fire on the Shannon Clark-ranch, where about 100 acres burned.

Tuesday, August 14 was potentially a most dangerous fire. Tall grass under the gasoline tanks at the Texaco bulk station was set off by welding sparks. Darcy Carroll discovered and put this fire out with an extinguisher before the danger point was reached.

The Sonora Volunteer Firemen answered all of these calls and some others. They worked in each case, as needed, with citizens who pitched in. "Only one thing has saved us in this rash of fires," Fire Chief Lee Patrick says. "If we had had any wind at all we would still be fighting the Halbert fire. With wind, any one of these fires would just have been out of control in no time."

This year so far we have had

twice as many calls as we had all last year, according to Fire Marshal John A. Martin, Jr. Sonora has already had an estimated \$5,000 in fire losses, compared with \$523 for the entire year of 1961.

Martin says if we lose much more insured property by fire we will lose our good fire credit and the rate will inevitably go up. He says it's up to the good citizens of Sonora to help prevent these fires. He urges everyone to make war on uncut grass and weeds, to be careful with smoking and matches, to not put oily cloths or gasoline near heaters and cook stoves.

The city discourages the burning of trash fire anywhere within the city limits. Beginning

Monday, August 20 city trucks will be engaged in picking up trash all through the week. Citizens are urged to clear out fire hazards, but are asked not to build trash fires anywhere within the congested city limits.

Extreme caution is urged in Sonora and surrounding country in this fire-breeding season. If fires do occur, then do not hesitate to call the Fire Department, plainly giving your name and the location of the fire. The number is 24242 and is listed on the front inside page of the new directory. "Try not to need to report a fire," advises Fire Marshal Martin, "but do not wait once a fire has started, even if it is a small one, for they all are, at first."

# Sonora Growing - Growing - Grown Paving, Building, Clean-Up Here

There's no business like grow business in Sonora. And street paving, bridge building, record breaking utilities consumption, a proposed sewage disposal plant, and a clean-up drive for next week are all part of the growth pattern.

Currently, the building of curbs and gutters and paving of Edgemont Street in the Castle Hills section is in progress along the newly acquired properties of Albert Ward, Armer Earwood, and P. J. Taylor. Street paving is always initiated by property owners and the city then helps with the work.

A bridge has been completed across Murphy Draw near the Ratliff-Kerbow Funeral Home. This was once a low water crossing, but is now safe and above the high water line. This bridge was a necessity for the homes in that section.

The month of July was the record breaking water consumption month with 31,000,000 gallons metered. At the present consumption rate 40,000,000 gallons of water will be metered this month. At times the plant is being pumped to capacity.

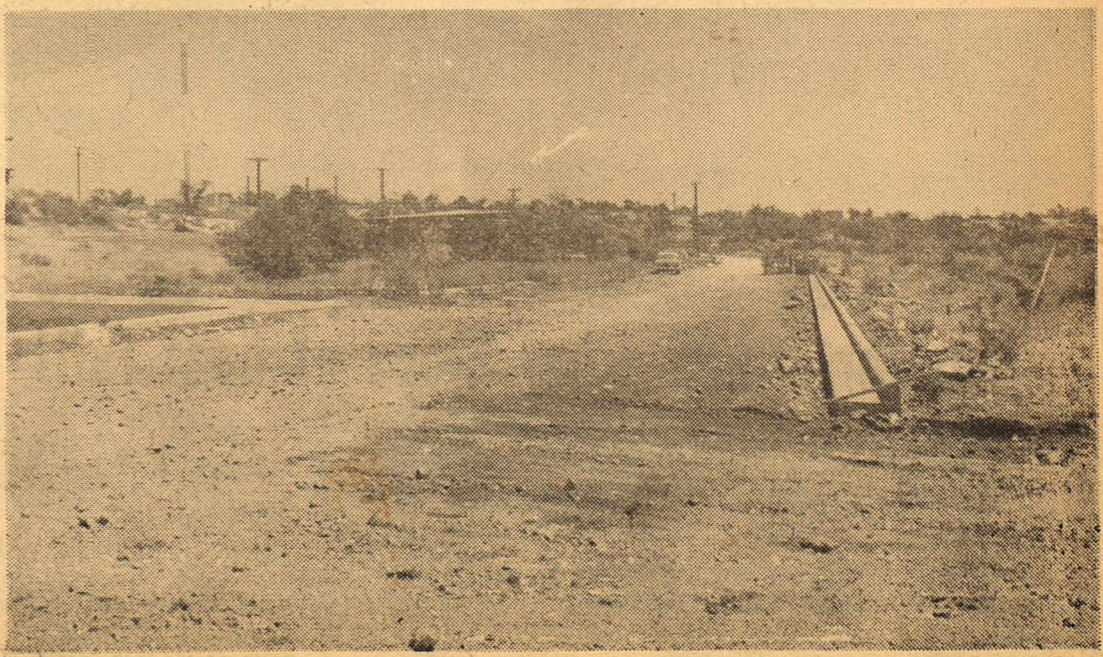
Electrical consumption for the past month was the greatest in the history of the 21-year old municipal light plant. Electrical

line construction is now going on in the south end of town due to increased demand.

A sewage disposal plant is in the discussion stage. Preliminary plans have been drawn up and financing is being explored.

The City Commission in its regular meeting voted to carry out a clean-up drive, August 20-24, as requested by the Chamber of Commerce.

Edgemont Street in the Castle Hills section is in the process of being paved in a joint city and property owner effort.

## Devil's River Philosopher Tries To Relieve Experi's Worry Over What He'd Do With A Tax Cut

Editor's Note: The Devil's River Philosopher on his bitter-weed ranch on Devil's River tries to reassure a Washington expert this week, his letter reveals.

Dear editor:

The difference between an expert and an ordinary man sometimes can be found in the kind of problems that bother them.

For example, I was reading in a newspaper last night during a television re-run which I wasn't interested in the first time that an economics expert in Washington was debating whether a tax cut should be made this year.

Now the phase of the question that was bothering him was not whether the government could afford it but what would the people do with a tax cut. I mean, he said that if the people took the tax out and spent it, that'd be fine, it would stimulate the national economy, which he claimed was the purpose of the proposed cut. But, he contended, if the people took the cut and put it in the bank, this wouldn't stimulate the economy and would defeat the whole purpose, and this was causing him

some grave concern.

This is what I'm talking about. It's hard for me to understand how a man can become so expert in his field that he can't know automatically what I'd do, along with 99 per cent of the rest of the people, if the government gave us a \$100 tax cut. It's a situation about which it's hard to keep a straight face.

But to ease his worries, I'd like to assure him that if the government will give me a tax cut, I will recognize my duty to my country and do my best to

stimulate the national economy. I will not unethically, not to say unpatriotically, hide it in a mattress, bury it in a bank vault, or even hoard it in a savings bond. No sir. The minute I get it, I'll head for Sonora and stimulate the economy.

If that economics expert is seriously worried about most others taking out tax cuts and holding on to them and dry-

ing up the springs of business, I'd say he is approaching the point where he has run out of something to worry about, except maybe his own knowledge of people. I have a notion that

if he'll look around, even just among his fellow economics experts, he'll find they're about as over-drawn as the rest of us.

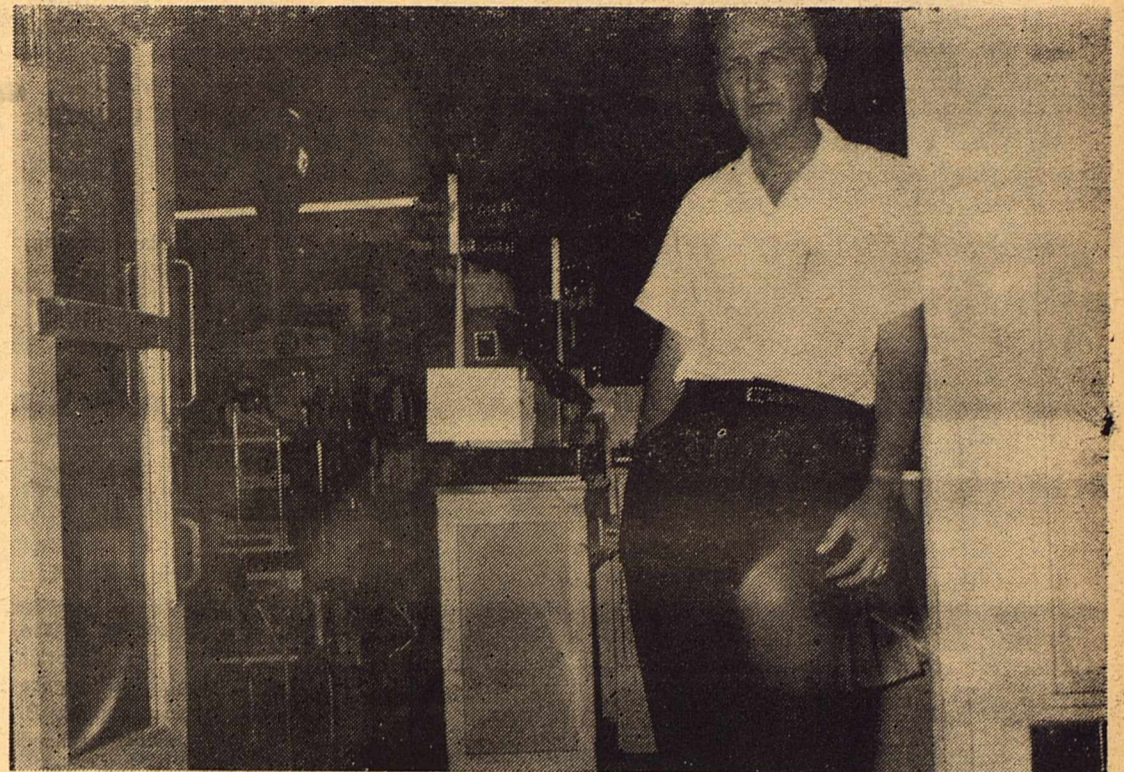

# THEN AND NOW



This was the Sonora of yesteryear, about 1897. Above, is the courthouse and business section; below, is residential Sonora of the same period.

Even then, people came for miles to shop Sonora first. Note the crowds of people, the horses, the buggy on Main Street before the days of fast autos, paved streets, and the tourist trade. There were no power lines or electrical systems, no paved or even board sidewalks in this era. There was no traffic problem around the post office. Horses and buggies behaved better than autos . . . except on New Years. One January 1st Sonora awoke to find a cart with horse, all harnessed and ready to go, perched on a narrow upstairs perch, downtown.



Pictured is James Morris, manager of Evans Foodway, one of the busiest spots along Highway 290 today. The building that houses the grocery was built by Bob Hallum on what was then Sonora Sheriff J. L. Davis' back lot. The grocery was first operated by G. E. "Bud" Smith. Evans has had the business since December 1954.

Manager of Evans for over three years, James Morris is a veteran groceryman with 25 years in the retail food business. He began delivering groceries in a Model-T truck, as a teenager in East Texas in 1931. He was later in the Soil Service in Arizona, then in grocery businesses in Uvalde, Bracketville, and Del Rio.

SENATE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 12 proposing an Amendment to the Constitution so as to provide for the State of Texas to employ a certain number of public employees may be employed in an advisory capacity or appointed to serve as a consultant on or an advisory committee, or as a member of a Public School Board provided they are not members of the teaching profession, and may receive reimbursement of expenses, with other agencies of this state, or any political subdivision thereof, and of the Federal Government, with the approval of the administrative head of the state department or agency or the governing board of the institution in which such employee is employed and provided there is no conflict of interest.

Air Force and Coast Guard. It is further provided that state employees may be appointed to serve as a consultant or on an advisory committee, or as a member of a Public School Board provided they are not members of the teaching profession, and may receive reimbursement of expenses, with other agencies of this state, or any political subdivision thereof, and of the Federal Government, with the approval of the administrative head of the state department or agency or the governing board of the institution in which such employee is employed and provided there is no conflict of interest.

Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this state at the general election to be held on Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1962, at which election all ballots shall have printed thereon:

**BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:**

Section 1. That Section 53 of Article XVI of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended so as to hereafter read as follows:

"Section 53. The accounting officers of this state shall neither draw nor pay a warrant upon the Treasury in favor of any person, for salary or compensation as agent, officer or appointee, who holds at the same time any other office or position of honor, trust or profit, under this state or the United States except as herein provided in this Constitution. Provided, that this restriction as to the drawing or paying of warrants upon the Treasury shall not apply to officers of the National Guard of Texas, the National Guard Reserve, the Officers Reserve Corps of the United States, nor to enlisted men of the National Guard, the National Guard Reserve, and the Organized Reserve of the United States, nor to retired officers of the United States Army, Navy, Marine Corps, Air Force and Coast Guard, and retired warrant officers and retired enlisted men of the United States Army, Navy, Marine Corps.

"FOR the Constitutional Amendment permitting state employees to serve as a consultant or on an advisory committee, or as a member of a Public School Board provided they are not members of the teaching profession, with a state agency, or any political subdivision thereof, or the Federal Government, with the approval of the administrative head of the state department or agency or the governing board of the institution in which such employee is employed and there is no conflict of interest."

Sec. 2. The Governor shall issue the necessary Proclamation for said election and have the same published in the manner and for the length of time required by the Constitution and laws of this state.

SENATE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 25 proposing an Amendment to Section 49-b, Article III of the Constitution of Texas providing for the resale of lands of the Veterans Land Fund remaining unsold after having been first offered for sale to veterans, to be sold to such purchasers, in such quantities, and on such terms, and at such prices and rates of interest, and under such rules and regulations as are now provided by law or as may hereafter be provided by law.

Section 49-b of Article III of the Constitution of Texas providing for the resale of lands of the Veterans Land Fund remaining unsold after having been first offered for sale to veterans, to be sold to such purchasers, in such quantities, and on such terms, and at such prices and rates of interest, and under such rules and regulations as are now provided by law or as may hereafter be provided by law.

**BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:**

Section 1. That Section 49-b, Article III of the Constitution of Texas, be amended by adding thereto the following:

"The foregoing notwithstanding, any lands in the Veterans Land Fund which have been first offered for resale to veterans and which have not been sold may be resold to such purchasers, in such quantities, and on such terms, and at such prices and rates of interest, and under such rules and regulations as are now provided by law, or as may hereafter be provided by law.

Sec. 2. The Governor of the State of Texas shall issue the necessary proclamation for said election, and have the same published in the manner and for the length of time required by the Constitution of this state.

Section 1. That Article IX of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended by adding thereto a new Section, immediately following Section 1, to be known as Section 1-A which shall read as follows:

"Section 1-A. The Legislature may authorize the governing body of any county bordering on the Gulf of Mexico or the tidewater limits thereof to regulate and restrict the speed, parking and travel of motor vehicles on beaches available to the public by virtue of public right and the littering of such beaches.

Nothing in this amendment shall increase the rights of any riparian or littoral landowner with regard to beaches available to the public by virtue of public right or submerged lands.

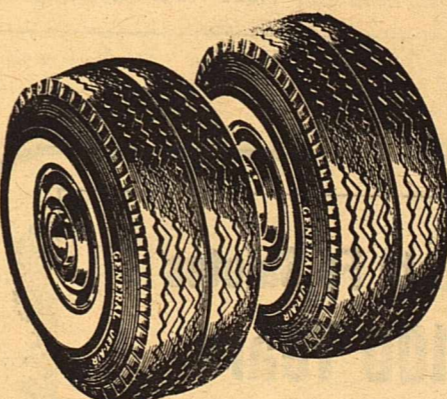

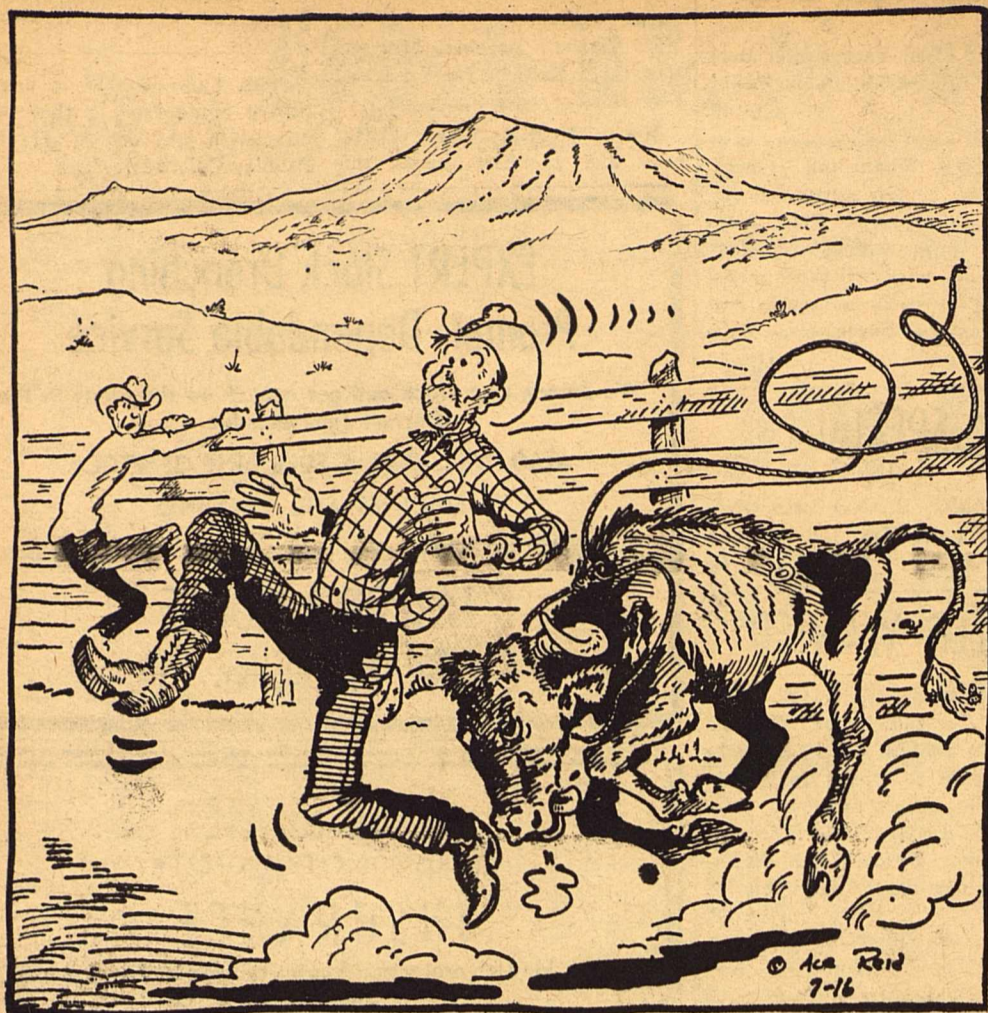


