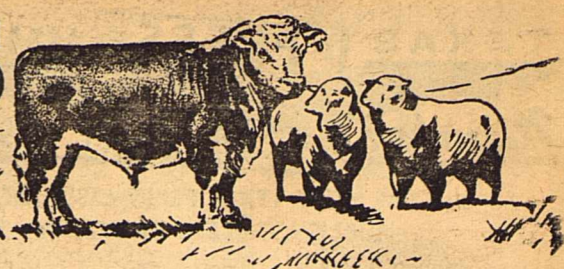

Cox For Governor Headquarters To Open With Des Barry To Speak Friday P.M.

Des Barry, Conservative candidate for Congressman-at-large, will arrive in Sonora at approximately 3 p.m., Friday, October 12 to officially open "Cox for Governor headquarters in a ribbon cutting ceremony.

Ralph Mayer, local Republican County Chairman, invites Sutton County and all citizens to attend the opening and to drink coffee with Des Barry. Barry is scheduled for a barbecue-speaking at Ozona High School at 7 o'clock the same evening.

Barry is president of Galveston Truck Lines of Houston, where he was reared and educated and where he now lives. He served five years in the Air Force and was discharged in 1946 as a Lieutenant Colonel. Barry pioneered for true open shop in the trucking business in 1955 and was named "Man of the Year" for transportation by traffic and transportation clubs of the Houston area in May 1959.

Listed among the nation's top public speakers by the Chamber of Commerce of the United States, he has spoken before more than 700 audiences in 35 states.

This is the 15th annual tour of this good neighbor flying group in which 16 states have participants this year.

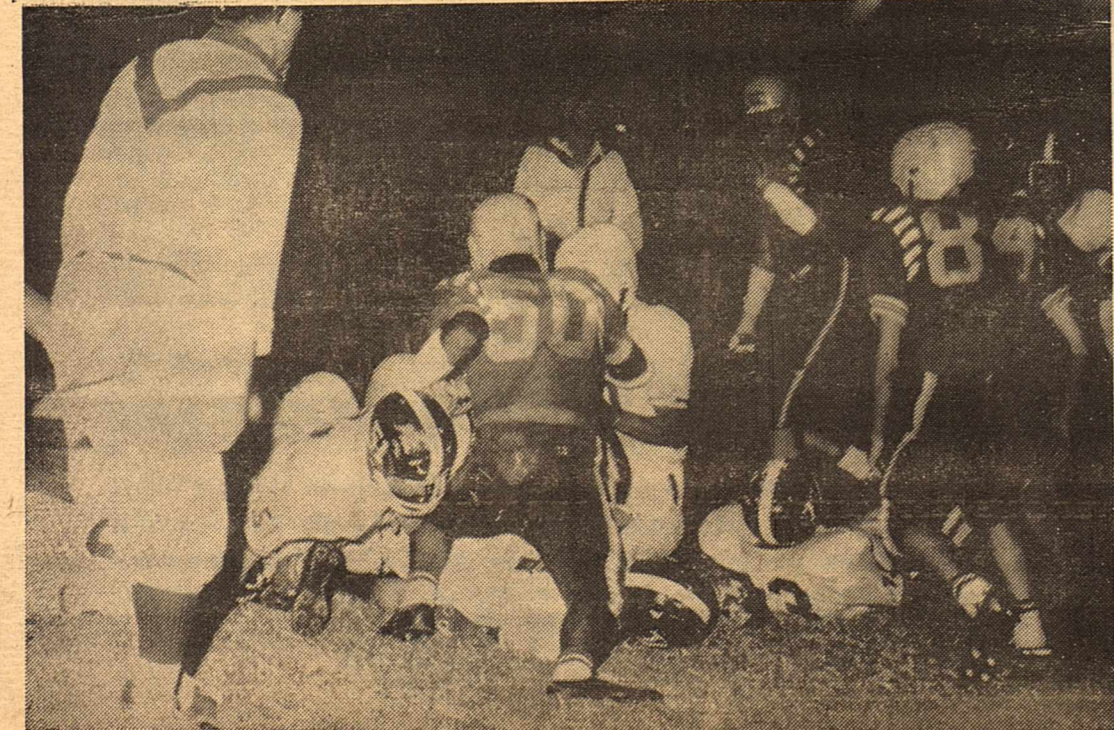
EPA Car Club Schedules Dance

Sewer Bonds Carry By Large Majority

The city referendum held October 6 at City Hall resulted in a vote of 146 to 10 in favor of 200,000 dollars' worth of bonds to finance Sonora's projected sewage disposal system.

This was nearly double the turn-out of voters compared with the total of 82 who voted in the last previous city election on water bonds.

With the Federal grant of \$51,990, with overwhelming voter approval of the bond issue plus an unusually favorable bond market at present, the new sewage plant and trunk lines are financially in sight for Sonora.

All-Out Screwworm Fund Drive Slated Here And Over Texas

Governor Price Daniel has declared October 14-20 "Screwworm Eradication Week."

According to local chairman Ralph P. Mayer, intensive effort will be made by the local committee to collect the remainder of the Sutton County quota still due the Southwest Animal Health Research Foundation. Sutton County is now \$2,000 short of its \$30,000 share of the \$3 million needed by the Foundation for the screwworm eradication program. Only 15 of 145 producers have failed to contribute in this county.

Marvin J. Bridges, Executive Director of the Foundation, attended the directors' meeting of the Texas Sheep and Goat

Raisers Association in Fort Stockton, last month. He said producers there were enthusiastic and agreed to contact all producers in their respective counties to give all an opportunity to contribute their fair share of 50 cents per animal to the eradication program.

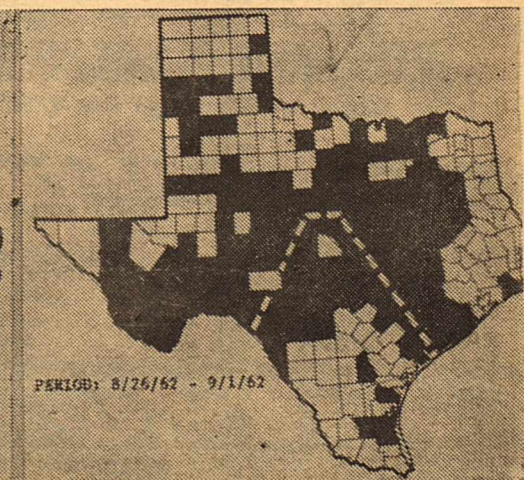
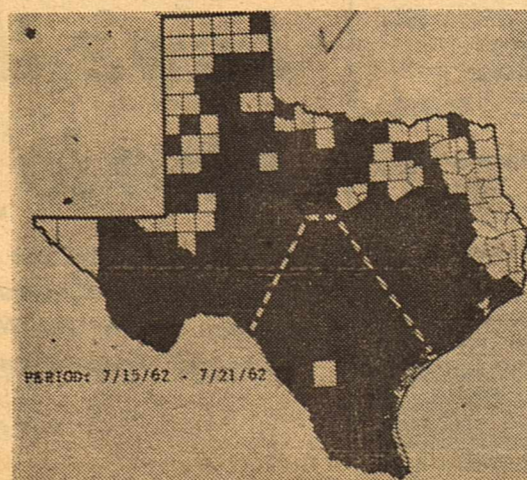
The Foundation will exhibit at the Texas State Fair in Dallas with slides of the Mission plant operations and various phases of screwworm eradication.

The Union Stock Yards at

San Antonio has offered its assistance to program by donating 50 cents for every head of livestock sold at the stocker-feeder sale being conducted on October 25.

The committee plans to contact non-contributing producers in this last phase of Sutton County's drive. It is urgent that Sutton and all counties complete their quotas so the work of the foundation can go on with the eradication program, whose effectiveness is evident.

I was out here on my bitterweed ranch yesterday sitting down resting my mind from all the current crises of the world when a pleasant October breeze blew a newspaper into my yard and I dropped it right at my feet and I picked it up and skipped the front page headlines and was going through the inside pages when an article caught my eye. "Computers Will Work On Ranch," it said, and I read it immediately. "Ranches of the future will be handled largely by computers," it continued.

Aren't going to catch me working harder to pay for a machine to tell me to work harder to feed my livestock.

I've never fully understood the point in these big electronic computing machines anyway. I know they can figure up in a few seconds the answer to a problem it'd take a man years to figure, but the way I get around needing such a machine on this ranch is, I just don't think up any problems that big. Why don't they turn these machines loose on the problem of Cuba?

Rangers Return To Original Silver Star Badge

Col. Homer Garrison, Jr., director of the Texas Department of Public Safety, has announced that the Texas Rangers are going back to the tradition-steeped Mexican silver badge worn by their predecessors in frontier days.

The new official Ranger badge, issued to each of the 62 members of the force, is a replica of the badge which old-time Rangers carved out of Mexican silver pieces when Texas became a state and their duties charged from military to law enforcement.

The best information available indicates that the five-pointed star on the badge symbolizes the "Lone Star" of Texas. The points are supported by an engraved wheel.

When the Department of Public Safety was created in 1935 and the Rangers became part of it, this badge was replaced with a solid badge of somewhat different shape and design. Then in 1957, a different badge was adopted for all officers of the Department, including the Rangers. This is a modern version of the old Ranger badge, with a five-pointed star surrounded by

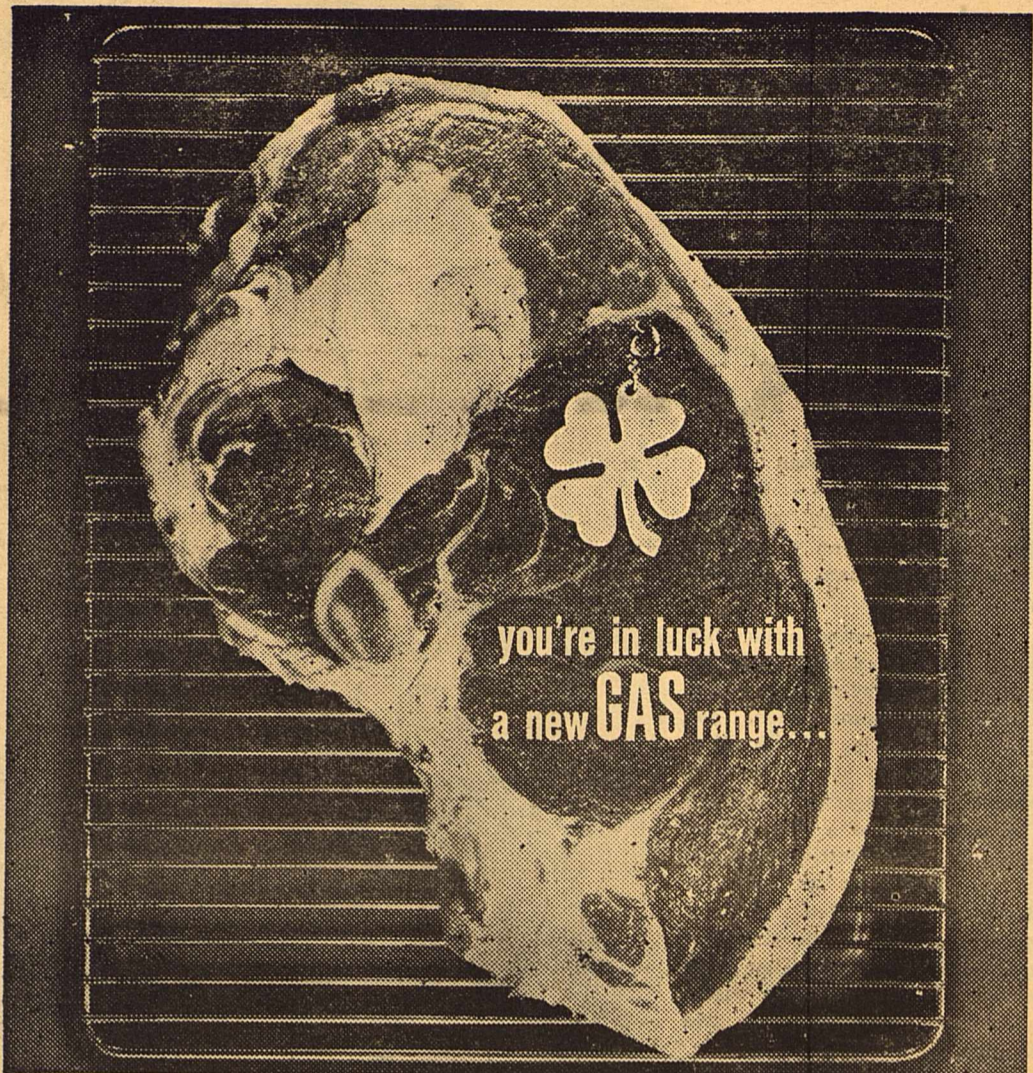

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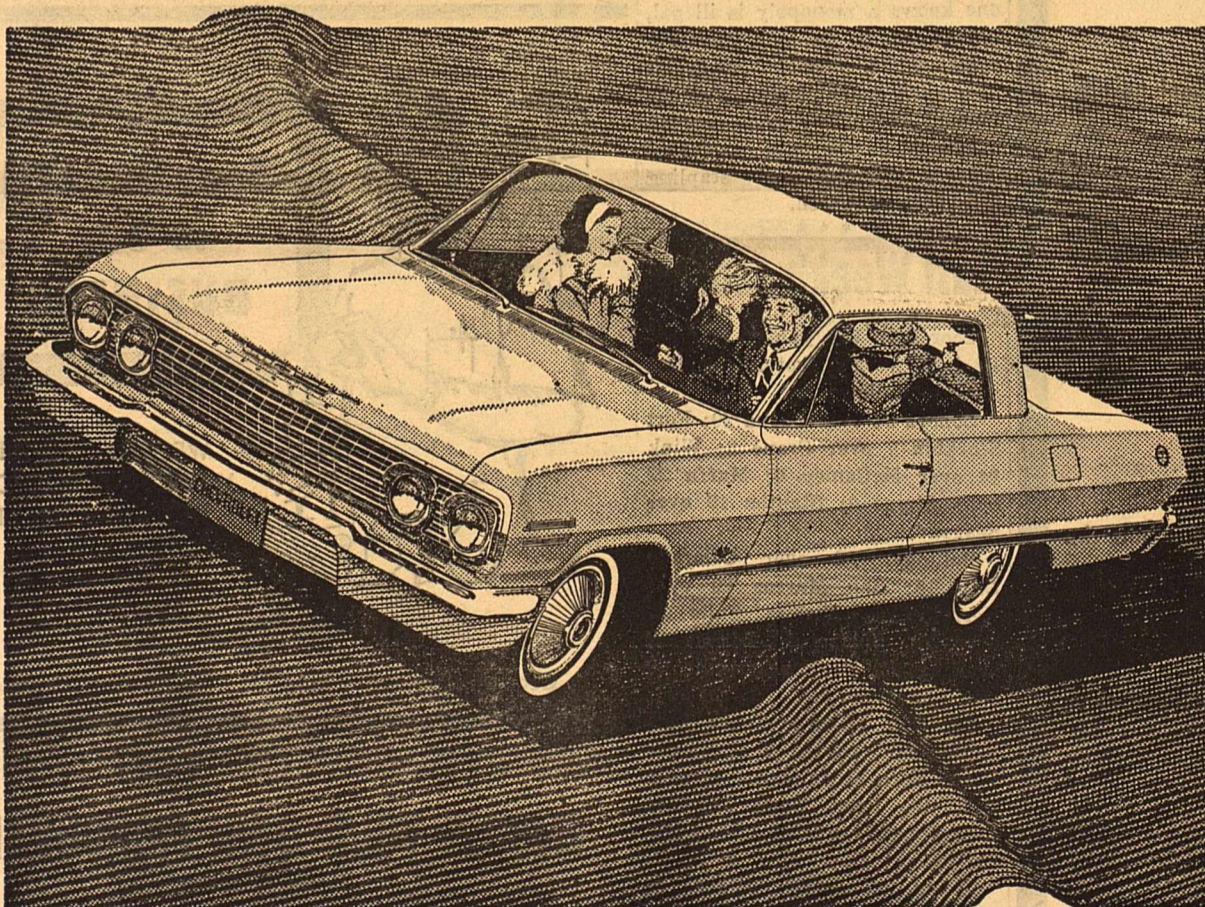

There's a beauty brain into which a woman feeds a little information and the machine comes up with recommendations for her beauty needs. This thinking machine, one of the Univaes, is wise in one respect. When even the suggestion of a skin allergy enters into its questionnaire, the Univac throws up its hands in despair. Move over, thinking machine, many of the skin doctors join you there. Time may prove this is one of the wisest answers the beauty brain is able to give.

Beauty business is the third largest industry in the nation today, outranked only by steel and agriculture. Beauty, of course, includes cosmetics and all the other aids.

What makes people turn over to the government a large portion of their earnings, so bureaucrats can spend it for what the people "should have" instead of the "frivolous" things they want? Efficiency? For the good of the majority? The end justifies the means?

Well, whatever the reason, it has become evident that we do need one more government bureau. There is nothing stable about staples. There are more kinds of stapling machines than there are staples to fit. This is a federal case and one that should be handled as such. A Bureau for Stabilizing Staples could get things on the right track with one good standard staple. Oh, sure, a few little companies would be hurt if they could not meet the standard or if they had a large obsolete stock already made up. Then, there would be a few thinkers who would insist their kind of staple was better. But these things are to be expected when socializing an industry. You must not stop to think of staples that are better or worse, you must learn to bow before the standard, what is good for the majority.

Of course, one old-fashioned free enterprise monopoly might also stabilize staples, but U. S. Steel has already had some problems this year. Anyway, everyone knows a monopoly is illegal, unless carried on by a government, which cannot violate its own anti-trust laws. All is "trust" here. One more bureau seems to be the only answer of getting staples and stapling machines to match.

Des Barry, subject of the Readers' Digest article, "The Man the Teamsters Found Too Hot to Handle," and Conservative candidate for Congressman-At Large, is president of Galveston Truck Lines of Houston, where he was reared and educated. He served five years in the Air Force and was discharged a Lieutenant Colonel in 1946.

Broncos Nudge Ozona Lions 26-20
In Real Grid Battle Here Friday

The Sonora High School Broncos took their third win of the season here Friday night with a 26-20 victory over the Ozona Lions. It was the Lions' second defeat of the year.
Scoring got underway late in the first quarter with Lion Halfback Pete Montgomery scampering eighty yards up the middle and along the sideline for the touchdown. A pass from Quarterback Leroy Cooper to Halfback Richard Vargas was good for the two extra points and the period ended with the Lions leading 8-0.
The Lions pushed their lead to 14 points in the early part of the second quarter with Back Dub Scrivner plugging over from the Sonora three, ending a drive which began on the Ozona 35. The try for extra point failed.
Sonora's first touchdown came on a 49-yard drive with Quarterback Primo Gonzales scoring on a keeper play from the one-foot line. His try for bonus points failed. Still in the second period, Halfback Bobby Castillo drove over from the five. A pass from Gonzales to Halfback Johnny Merck was good and saw the

game tied 14-14 at halftime.
Ozona again forged ahead in the third period with Montgomery going over from the Bronco one yardline to end a 47-yard Lion drive. The extra point try was no good. In the final period Bronco Castillo again hit pay dirt for Sonora from the Ozona five after a 60-yard march by the Broncos. The kick following was wide, and the game was tied up again—20 and 20.
The deciding touchdown came after Castillo received a 15-yard pass from Gonzales and then ran 35 yards to the Ozona nine. He carried for eight yards and then for the final one. The extra point try was no good.
Statistics: Yards rushing, Sonora 208, Ozona 263; First downs, Sonora 15, Ozona 13; Passes, Sonora completed three of seven for 86 yards, Ozona completed three of 13 for 76; Interceptions, Sonora one, Ozona two; Penalties, Sonora five for 42 yards, Ozona three for 25; Punts: Sonora four for a 37-yard average, Ozona six for 25. Each team lost the ball once on fumbles and Ozona recovered two of their own fumbles.
