The shooting occurred Wednesday night at 9:30 when a .22 caliber rifle was fired from outside the Simon Arebalo home. The bullet crashed through the window, hitting the Arebalo youth in the back as he cleaned his shoes. Death occurred twenty minutes later at Hudspeth Memorial Hospital where authocities had taken him. The bullet had entered below the right shoulder blade and was found lodged in the youth's heart.

Arrest of Ramos came as Joe Wilie and Joe Brownlee, highway patrolmen, were driving north to Sonora on Highway 277. Sheriff Herman Moore, hearing a report of the shooting on his killing 18-year-old Juan Jose tery under the direction of Ratradio, was driving up the Old Arebolo.

Ramos, not 10 feet from the sheriff, then turned his rifle on Moore and Moore sped off. He turned around to approach the youth from the north as Wille and Brownlee approached from

Ramos fired two shots at the patrolmen before Wilie injured the youth in the leg. He there surrendered.

Dixon Mahon, district attorney, said that the youth was being charged as a delinquent juvenile in connection with the assault with intent to murder Texas Highway Patrolman Joe Wille. A minor cannot be tried for murder until he is 17 years old. Ramos will be 17 on July 17.

State voters rejected the proposed amendment that would have abolished the poll tax. You will need a valid poll tax receipt next year to vote in the Democratic or Republican primary, elections for school trustees and city aldermen, and any special elections that might be called.

People over 60 years of age in this county do not have to have an exemption; 21-yearolds can get their exemption now or in anticipation they will be 21.

They must have the exemption 30 days before any election they wish to vote in. Deadline for paying your poll tax is January

Despite the complete disavowance of "caveat emptor" (let the buyer beware) by some businesses that thrive on high promotion deals. Buyers are contacted by direct mail, over the telephone, or by "come on" advertisements. These contacts all resort to fancy claims and a

high pressure approach. How can you avoid such sales tactics? There is no sure way, outside of dealing with reputable, established merchants, and using common sense in reading the ads. But there are certain sucker

"Buy now or lose the chance.." "You have been specially select-

"It's only a legal form. ."

"You can save up to. ." "Yours absolutely free. . "

These signals do not necessarily indicate a bad deal, but prices, and ask for information from a merchant you know, or from a friend.

Remember, in this world of tough business competition, one seldom gets anything for nothing. Once you have signed an order, even the law may not be able to help you, no matter how improvident the deal may be for
