While the printer, the grocer and the dry goods man find it easy to adjust prices to reflect the cost of doing business, Bill and other men in his trade have to ask a commission in Austin to okay a rate hike. Bill says it's been far too long since this okay was given.


A letter from D. C. Greer, state highway engineer, saying that a decision concerning a requested area development road could not be reached immediately was read at the meeting of the County Com-






