> To qualify for the Scout lifeguard emblem, a Scout must hold swimming and rowing merit badges, the lifesaving merit badge or Red Cross junior or senior life saving certifcate, instruct one Scout for 3 hours in swimming or an aquatic merit padge, and swim 1/4 mile.

The Scout must also demonstrate water rescue methods by accurately throwing a 15-inch ring buoy, act as a coxswain of a lifeboat and make a "rescue" and demonstrate water rescue by entering the water feetfirst, swimming 30 feet, properly rescuing a "victim", and towing him to shore.

Other aquatic merit badges earned by great numbers of Scouts during this summers' camps were lifesaving merit badges, 139, swimming merit badges, 298; canoeing it badges, 58.

In addition, 79 Scouts were awarded the mile swim badge for swimming one mile under conditions and at the time given by the waterfront director.

Camp Sol Mayer, 3 miles from Fort McKavett, opened on May 29 and operated for four 1 week periods during which time 624 Scouts. 10 Explorers and 62 Leaders enjoyed the program. At Camp Fawcett one mile North of Barksdale 395 Scouts, and 28 Leaders attended this unique experience.

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

MORE AMERICANS TO VACATION BY CAR

More Americans will vacation by car this year than ever before. Many older citizens will be among these travelers.

Research done in connection with the recent national driving test indicates that many drivers need to brush up on their driving skills. Additionally, older citizens, especially, will want to check up on these safe-driving points:

1. With the aid of a road map, plan the route you will take by dividing the distance into even periods of driving. Outline rest stops, scenic points, and overnight lodging to provide variety in each day's travel.

2. Allow plenty of driving time. Schedule arrival in major cities to avoid rush hour traffic. 3. More people travel on weekends than during the week. Plan your long trips during the week,

and schedule weekends for visiting. 4. Summer means that more vacationers will be traveling. When possible, plan trips before the close of school in the spring and after the start of school

5. To reduce eyestrain, wear sunglasses for daytime driving and keep night driving to a minimum. 6. All stopping, passing and turning distances are more difficult to judge after dark. Plan most of

the driving during the daylight hours. Research indicates that many medicines can affect the way a driver handles the wheel. Certain City Secretary drugs such as antihistimines, cold tablets, and sedatives may dull your reflexes or impair your co-

Tranquilizing drugs can cloud your judgment and interfere with your driving skills. Stimulants may cause undue nervousness. Consult your doctor about side effects of any drug he prescribes. Don't drive until you know that the drugs you take won't affect your driving skill.

Sure enough, knowing the potatoes are needed, Moscow officials take thousands of students out of classes for a month, the spuds are dug and the


The first time this happened, the article said, it made sense, but the officials are beginning to wonder why it has to happen year after year.

an old refrigerator, ice box, or home freezer may easily become a death trap—as lethal as a gas chamber-a national industry association warns.

Old, used refrigerators-often unwittingly abandoned and discarded in basements, on back porches, and in garages and junk yards-have snuffed out the lives of 326 children between the ages of two and twelve in the United States during the past 19 years—an average of 17 children annually-statistics compiled by the Refrigeration Service Engineers Society indicate.
