This would mean that by 1970 the expanding U. S. population could be provided with a 25 per cent increase in its standard of living. The population is ex-





There are sands of bumps along the way, any of which can be hit just right and seriously damage your

car or trunk. It is necessary to be completely self-contained-carrying living quarters with you. Facilities are few and far between on the Alaska Highway. House trailers are not the best means of housing for the trip. Hills, mud and, rocks make them almost impossible to maneuver. Jobson suggests a pickup truck with coach. This provides living quarters without hauling anything behind

your vehicle. Extra equipment for your ehicle should include a set of tires, fan belt, fuel and water pumps, coil and ignition points. If the gasoline tank is exposed, have it padded and covered with some rubberlike material. Flying rocks may puncture it if it is not protected. If you wish to charge your gasoline - credit cards which will take you through are Standard, Chevron, Imperial-Esso and Texaco.

Don't expect to find superb fishing easily. Mostly, you'll have to seek it out as on any other well-traveled road. There are still many fine hunting areas, but they are spotty. It is best to check with the authorities in the area you select.

Maps and information concerning facilities can be obtained from the Canadian Government Travel Bureau at Ottawa. Their free booklet "Alaska Highway, Road to Adventure" is excellent.
