Five Texas Wool Teams Qualify for Nationals

Five Texas county 4-H wool judging teams will compete with teams from three other states in the National 4-H Wool Judging Contest here June 13-15.

The annual show is sponsored jointly by the Sonora Lions Club and the Sonora Wool and Mohair Company.

A qualifying contest for the national event was held at Angelo State College Saturday, May 27. First place qualifier was the 4-H team from San Saba County. Other top teams qualifying were 4-H Clubs from Kendall, Kerr, McCulloch and Edwards counties.

The five Texas teams will compete against teams from New Mexico, Colorado and Wyoming for the national wool judging title.

Championship judging will be held on the last day of the show, June 15.

Competition is open to 4-H members between the ages of 14-18. Each state competing is limited to five teams.

The first national contest was held here in 1947 as a part of the Sonora Wool and Mohair Show.

From this beginning wool shows and contests have spread to other parts of Texas and the country.

Purpose of the contest, according to County Agent, D. C. Langford, is to encourage the training of youth in the classification, grading and evaluation of wool.

Officials for the show will be James A. Gray, Texas Extension Animal Husbandman as show superintendent and J. R. Stauder, Extension Sheep Specialist, New Mexico University, as assistant show superintendent.

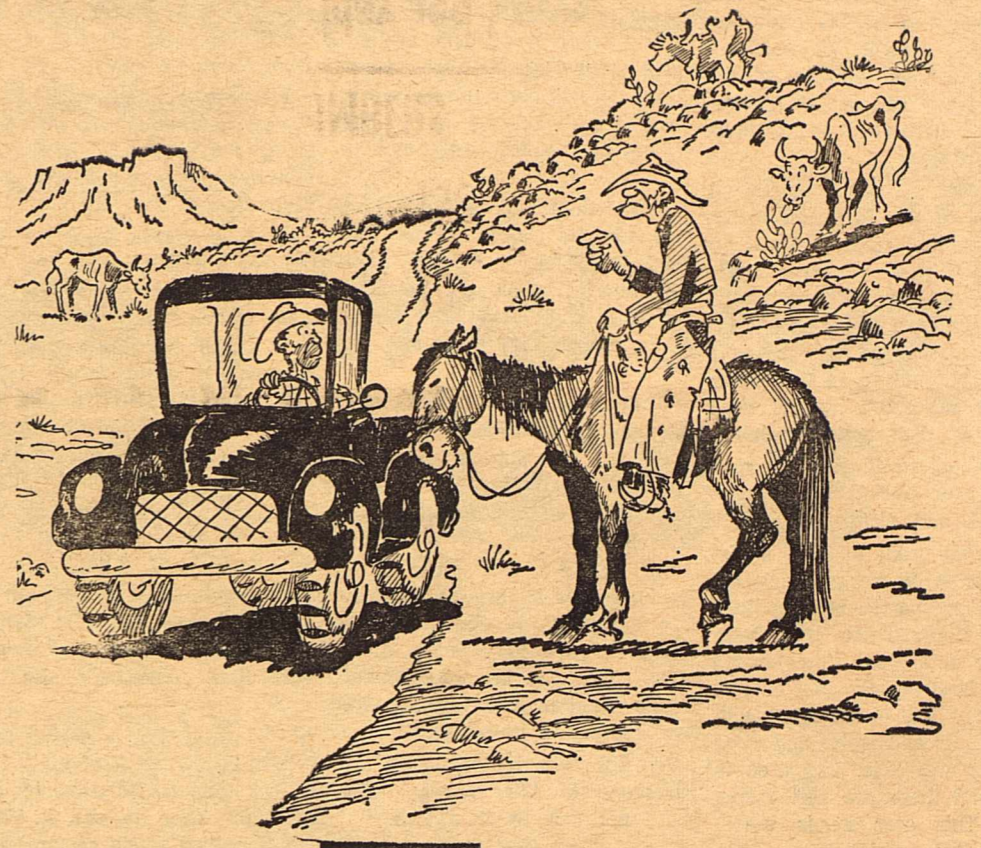

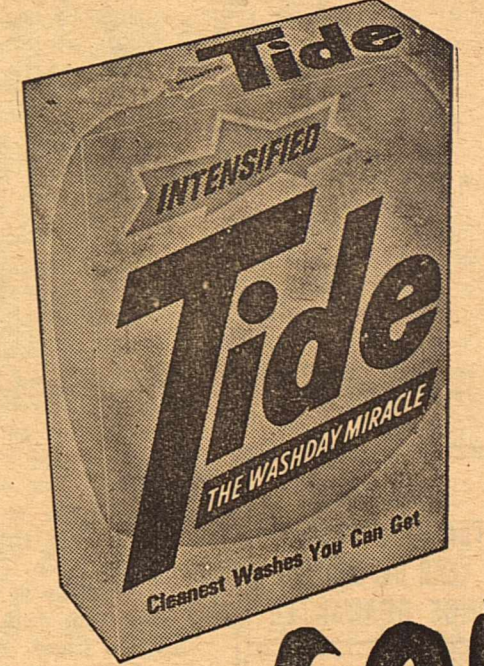
