El Paso Natural Gas Co. Merges With Two European Corporations For Use of Peaceful Nuclear Blasts

El Paso Natural Gas Company in Paris by Robert Gachet, President and Managing Director of Nobel Bozel (France), and in Brussels by Emile Raskin, President of the Poudreries Reunies de Belgique (Belgium).

The announcement was made simultaneously in Houston by Howard Boyd, Chairman of the Board of El Paso Natural Gas Company,

Nobel Bozel (France) is part of a group of companies which produces and sells explosives, pharmaceuticals, plastics, chemicals and metallurgical products, having annual sales of \$200 million. Poudreries Reunies de Belgique (Belgium) is primarily engaged in the production of explosives, antiparasitic pharmaceuticals for agricultural use, engine blocks and other tooled products for the automotive industry, polyurethane foam, and various chemical products. Its annual sales are approximately \$40 million.

El Paso Natural Gas will have a 50 percent ownership in Nobel-Paso Geonuclear, and the remaining 50 percent ownership will be shared by the European companies.

Jo Neville and I decided that Sonora is definitely not the ideal place to nurture golf pro's. It is either too wet, too cold, too hot, or too windy.

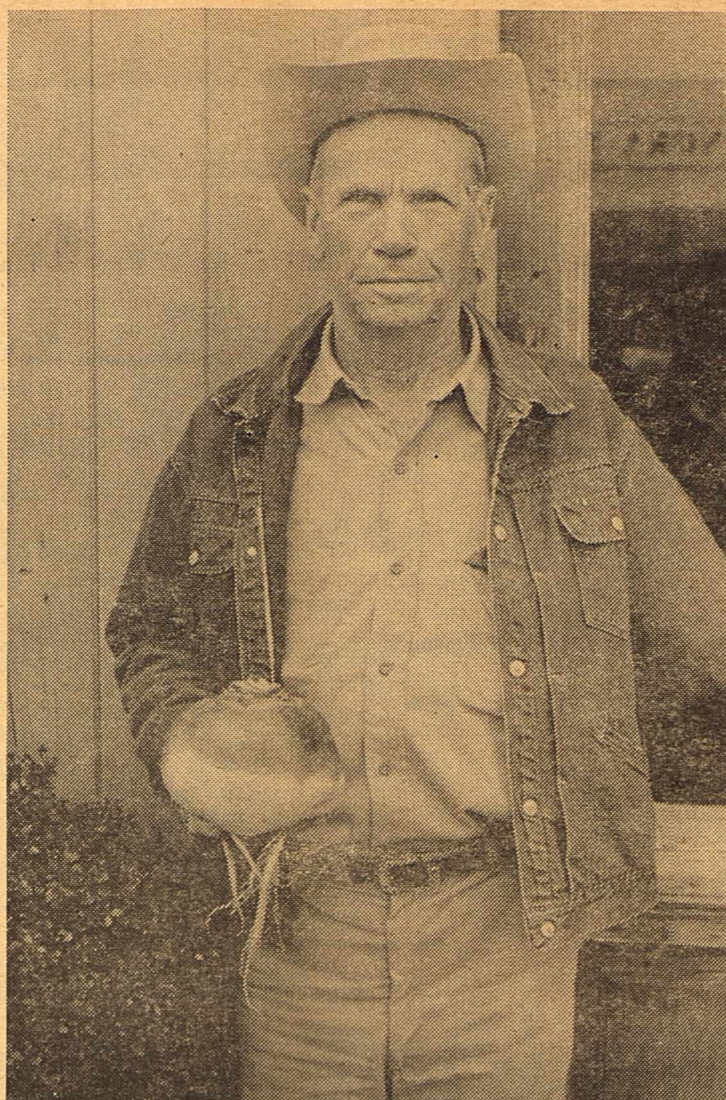

Mr. and Mrs. O. L. Richardson Sr. were hosts for a family Christmas dinner in the dining room of French's cafe December 24.

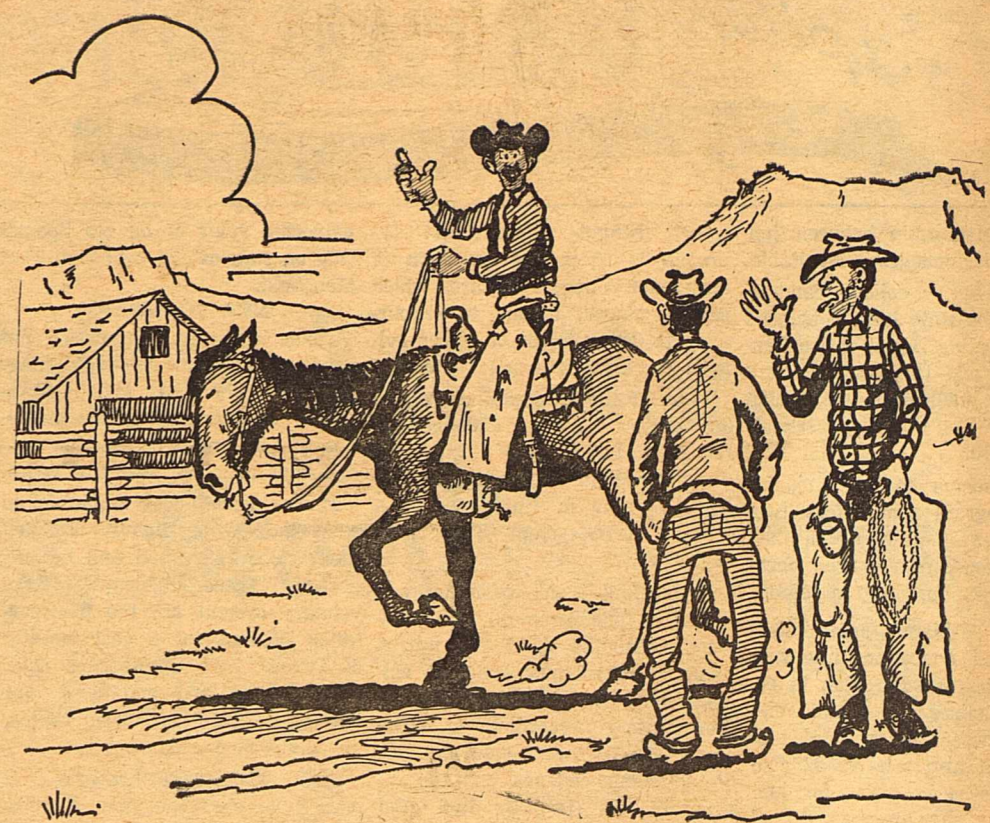

Technician Announces Conservation Booklet

Revised copies of the Edwards Plateau soil and water conservation district's Program and Plan of Work have been distributed to local landowners and other interested people.

The printed document, which was originally prepared in 1947-48 when the district was organized, has been updated to reflect current conditions. It contains general information on physical conditions regarding soil, water, plants and wildlife of the Edwards Plateau district.

The document also points out conservation problems, objectives, and some accomplishments. The watershed program on Dry Devil's River and Lowrey Draw is discussed, as well as the increased emphasis being placed on wildlife management.

The five elected landowner-supervisors who operate the district are Fred T. Earwood, W. B. McMillan, Edwin E. Sawyer, Joe B. Ross, and Vestel Askew. Joe M. VanderStucken was an original supervisor, succeeded by McMillan in 1958, Frank Bond, another original supervisor, was succeeded by Askew in 1966.

"The work of District supervisors is seldom fully appreciated," said E. B. Keng, Soil Conservation Service technician.

"The local supervisors have held 234 meetings since 1946 — and their meager pay of \$4 per meeting has been largely donated back to provide essay and other youth participation prizes."

Keng urged landowners, businessmen and others to study the new program and plan to learn more about the Edwards Plateau soil and water conservation district.

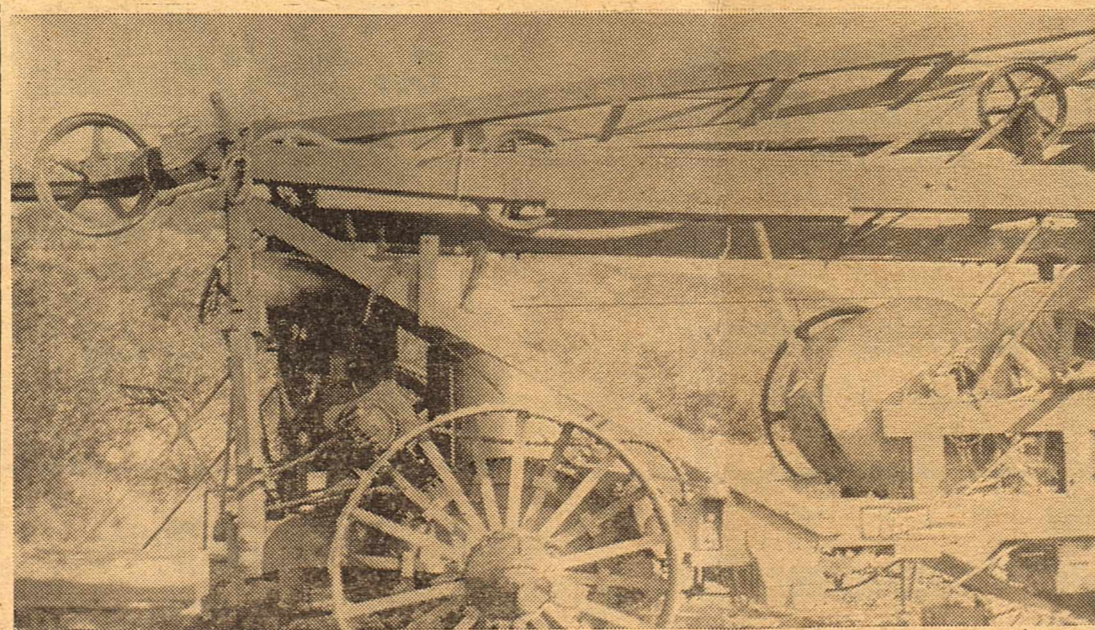
