Sutton County's historical society started to roll Friday when Joe B. Ross, Mrs. Norman Rousselot to see about the printing of certificates of original membership. (Mrs. Bob Vicars is also a committee member.)

The plan they discussed was centered around the selling of these certificates to Sutton County folks to finance operations. First goal of the group is to get on file histories of all the original Sutton County families and purchase a file cabinet for storage.

This information would eventually be placed in a county museum, when and if the museum is es-

Mrs. Cusenbary (Dorothy) said, "Why at present we don't have enough money to frame our charter-and our charter isn't paid for yet! But this is a beginning. The goal we'll work for is the establishment of a museum."

Interest in the establishment of a permanent display of Sutton County relics reached a peak during Sonora's Diamond Jubilee in 1965. Mrs. Collier Shurley began a collection and eventually filled the Bud Smith building with early-day relics-most of which had their background centered in Sutton

Museum attendants were surprised at how quickly items of significant historical nature turned up for display-and how quickly they disappeared after the Jubilee closed. One possible exception might be the heavy iron stove John Eaton positioned in the Favorite Saloon. Because of its weight and size it still stays in the back of the Morgan and Hunt building.

While efforts in Junction and Ozona have ended in the establishment of museums in both towns, Sonora's dream of a permanent display of early-day relics is still to be fulfilled.

Let's hope this committee is successful in making Sonora's dream of a museum come true. It can materialize if Sutton County people

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#### **IRS Offers Special Enrollment Exam**


Those who wish to take the enrollment examination to qualify to practice before the Internal Revenue Service may obtain application forms and other informational materials from Richard R. Bishop, Examination Coordinator, P. O. Box 594, Dallas, Texas 75221. Mr. Bishop may be reached by telephone at area code 214, RI 9-2795, or in room 1132 at 1600 Patterson Street, Dallas.

District Director Ellis Campbell, Jr., emphasizes that the right to represent clients in tax and other matters before IRS is limited to those who meet the highest standards of technical proficiency and ethical conduct.

The examination will be held in the Dallas District Office on September 26 and September 27, 1968, for those tax practitioners who are not attorneys or certified public accountants.

Applications, accompanied by a fee of \$25 payable to the Internal Revenue Service, should be sent to Director, Audit Division, Internal Revenue Service, Washington, D. C., 20224, by August 31, 1968.

In 1967, twenty-three persons in the Dallas District (covering the northern half of Texas) took the exam, Mr. Campbell said.
