



The Marfa field looked somewhat like a gravel road with a goal post at either end. With the exception of a few varieties of burrs, no vegetation of any kind had ever been known to grow there. Many of the local townspeople turned out to see the game, or rather, Dad said the men did. as women were not particularly interested in football those days. Most of the details of the game have been forgotten since that long ago battle, but one thing does stand out in Dad's mind. He remembers that Drury Wood, who played for Sul Ross and later became superintendent of schools in Alpine, dealt him a mighty rough afternoon. In fact, after a head-on colision with the much heavier, stronger Wood, Dad said the remainder of the game was played in a haze
