

Also present at the meeting were Jo Ed Harrell, county maintenence department employee and J. W. Elliott, county judge who presided over the meeting.



Study Centers Need Good Lighting

With school season comes study time. Bonny Lay, extension housing and home furnishings specialist, stresses the importance of good lighting in study centers. A welllighted desk makes it easier to concentrate and avoid eyestrain and physical tension.

To study, use a lamp correctly placed and fitted with a 200,-watt bulb. If you do not have a diffuser on the lamp, use a white bulb to

Place the lamp so the center of the lampshade is about 15 inches to the left of the work center and the lamp about 12 inches back of the front edge of the table for a right handed person.

Several lamp manufacturers now are making specially designed higher-wattage study lamps which produce nearly twice as much light as other lamps and spread light over a wider area. They also reduce glare.

Tags attached to these lamps say, "This is a Better Light Better Sight Bureau Study Lamp.' Miss Lay gives some other suggestions to improve light in a study center:

-Choose a desk with a lightcolored, nonglossy finish. -Use a light-colored blotter or

desk pad. -Paint walls in neutral or light colors or select a plain wallpaper or one with a small quiet design. -Make sure that the desk does




