Jacoby And Lumbreras Win Two-Way District Honors

District 8-A champions Sonora Broncos dominated the all-league team with 11 men in the 24 first team slots. Mason, who placed second in district play, had five men named to the first team, while Junction, Eldorado and Menard had a total of three, two, and one respectively.

Junior end linebacker Erasmo Lumbreras, senior guard Mark Jacoby, and Mason's tackle-cornback Dale Brandenberger were the only two-way first team selections.

Placing on the first team offense were running backs Kerry Joy and Ed Lee Renfro; ends, Erasmo Lumbreras and Thurston McCutchen; tackle Monte Dillard; guard, Mark Jacoby, and center, Bill Green. First team defense men named were Robert Mata, safety; David Wuest, cornerback; linebackers Erasmo Lumbreras and Mark Jacoby, and Jim Elliott and Barry Black, linemen.

Broncos chosen for the second team offense were David Wuest, quarterback; Robert Mata, running back; and Jim Elliott, tackle. Monte Dillard, lineman was chosen on the second team defense.

The Broncos have advanced to quarterfinals and will meet Sudan in Odessa at Barrett Stadium, Friday, with game time scheduled for 7:30 p.m.

Broncos Advance To Quarterfinals After 7-6 Squeaker Over Coahoma

Two Coahoma fumbles and an unsuccessful two point conversion gave the Sonora Broncos a 7-6 victory over the Coahoma Bulldogs in San Angelo's snow-covered Bobcat Stadium Saturday night.

It was not the offense of the Broncos that won the game—it was the unyielding defense. Isreal Sanchez recovered two fumbles and made some timely tackles. One recovery set up the Bronco's lone touchdown while the other prevented the Bulldogs from the game winning touchdown.

The Broncos kicked off to start the game, but Coahoma's Toly Green fumbled the return at his own 15. Four plays later fullback Kerry Joy scored from the two. David Wuest added the point after and Sonora led 7-0.

The Bulldogs came thundering back on their next offensive series. They drove 74 yards on nine plays to pay dirt. Ricky Evans went the final 25 yards on an end sweep. Quarterback Kenny

Clanton tried for two, but was dropped by Sanchez and Ted Fish.

The next two times the Broncos got the ball they pushed down to the Coahoma 20 and 14 yard lines only to be held on downs by a stiff Bulldog line.

After their scoring drive, the Bulldogs never threatened again in the first half.

Sonora took the second half kick off and it appeared that they would break away from the Bulldogs. The Coahoma defense dug in and

held the Broncos on downs on the Bulldog ten.

With about three minutes left, the Bulldogs drove to the Sonora eight before Sanchez recovered a Clanton fumble. The game ended

with Coahoma, after the Bronco's were forced to punt, on the Sonora 29.

Broncos will meet Sudan in Odessa Friday at 7:30 in the quarterfinals game.

Leslie Malmstrom Dies December 3, 1968

Leslie Malmstrom died December 3, 1968, in McKnight Hospital in Carlsbad. He was born July 22, 1904 in Moline, Illinois. Mr. Malmstrom was a member of the Baptist Church, and was a brick-mason by trade.

Ratliff-Kerbow Funeral Home is in charge of arrangements and burial will be in Sonora Cemetery.

Sonorans Vote 5-1 For Mail Delivery

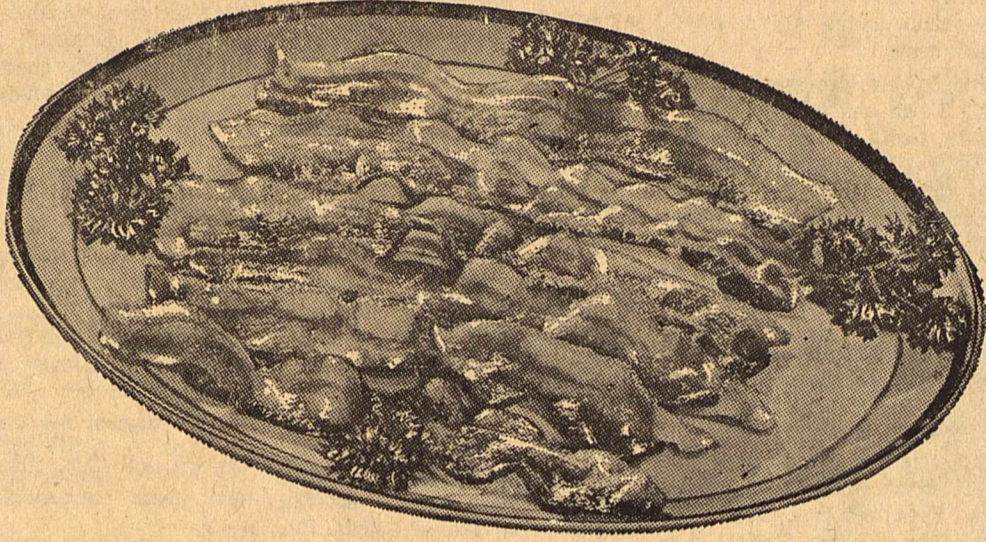

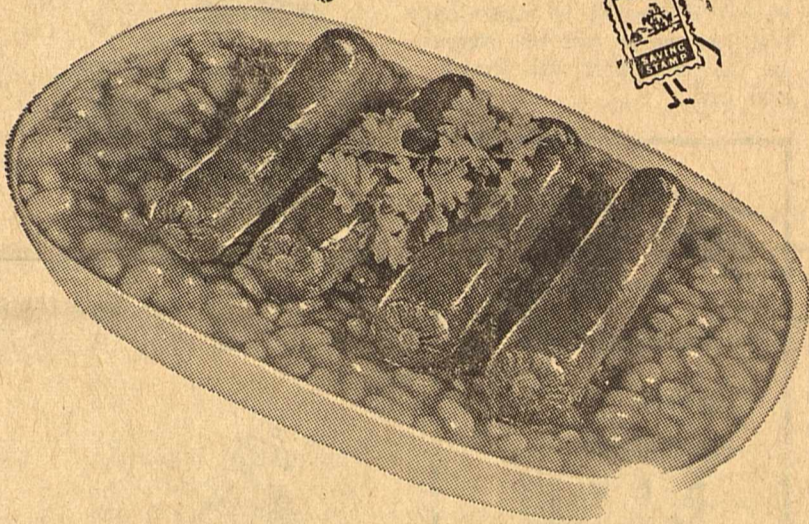

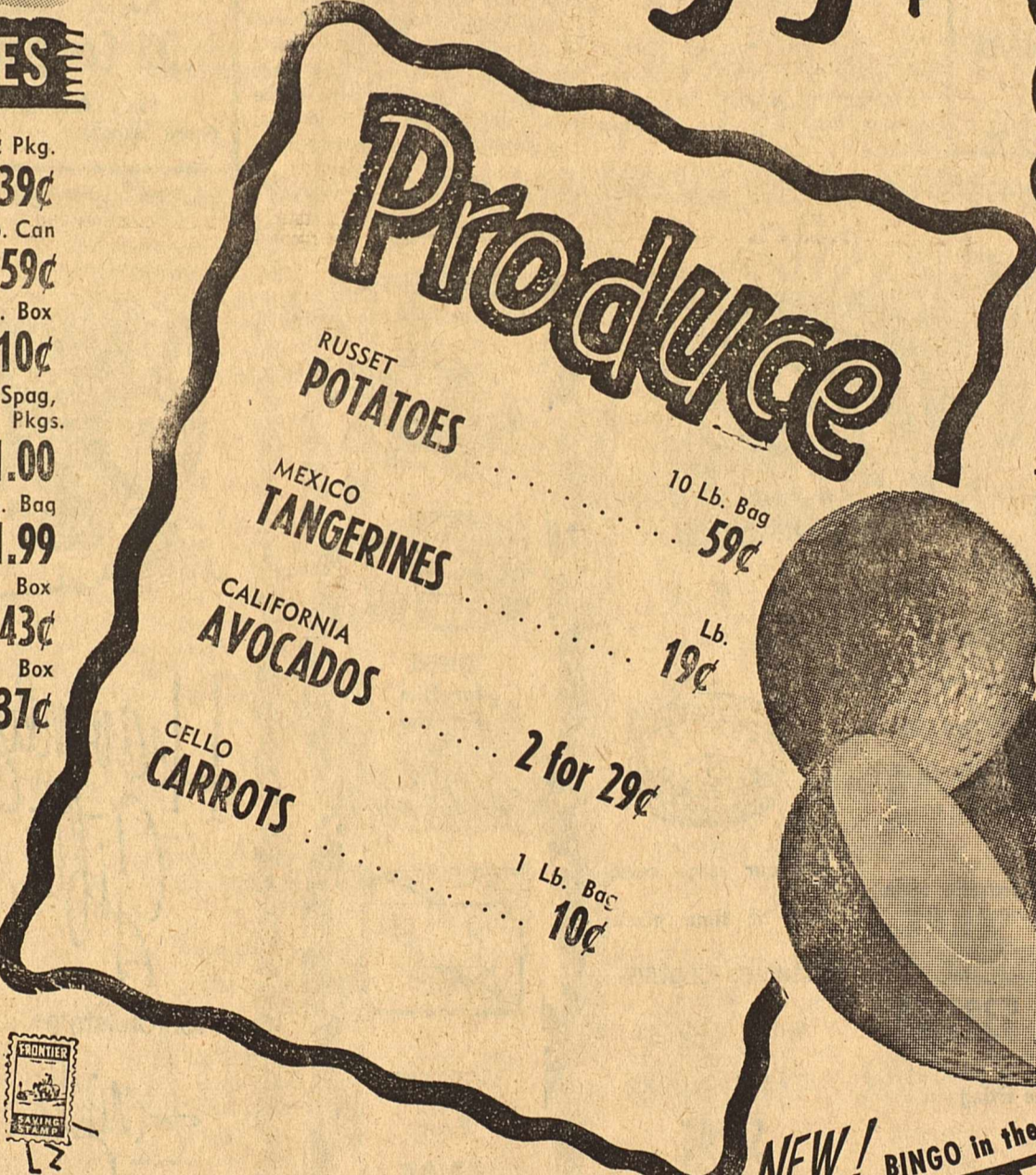

Do you know how to report a fire? How to call the police or sheriff or the FBI? Do you know when the least expensive long distance rates are in effect?

Health Department Cites Jim Harris

An official State Health Department citation for work proficiency has been awarded to Jimmy Hugh Harris, Sonora City manager.

To qualify for certification, a plant operator must have accumulated a prescribed amount of actual work experience. He must also have attended both regional and statewide short schools at which the techniques of water treatment and waste water disposal are taught, and must have passed an examination given by State Health Department sanitary engineers.

State law requires that at least one operator per shift be certified for competency by health department engineers, but many operators seek certification on their own time and at their own expense to increase their efficiency as key public servants to their community and state.

Telephone customers in Sonora will begin to receive next week their new telephone directories which answer all these questions and many more, according to Jack Goss, division manager for General Telephone Company of the Southwest.

Goss urged customers to carefully review the information and instructions in the front of the new directory. Being familiar with the area code map, emergency numbers, the various long distance rates and types of long distance calls and when day, evening and night long distance rates are in effect will assist all customers in using the telephone so it will be most helpful to them.

There is also space in the directory reserved for listing frequently called numbers, new numbers not listed in the directory, or frequently called area codes and telephone numbers in other cities.

The division manager urged everyone to transfer any still-up-to-date notations from the old directory to the new. He also pointed out that it might be wise to check through the old book before discarding it to be sure valuable papers are not destroyed. "But be sure and throw the old book away to avoid calling wrong numbers or numbers which no longer are assigned," he suggests.

Customers who have not received a new directory by December 12 should contact the business office.
