Psychologically, it has the guilt-producing impact of receiving stolen goods, even if these goods are legally stolen.

Nothing corrodes the human spirit as deeply as subsidized idleness. As proven by the rioting and looting, it leads to the desire for illegally stolen goods. The experts say that many people on SFN reach the point where they are virtually beyond rehabilitation.

Dr. M. Harvey Brenner, a sociologist at Yale University, has just completed a statistical study of mental health in the United States, covering the period from 1910 to 1960. He reports that doctors can forecast the general state of mental health with a glance at society's unemployment figures.

Dr. Brenner's study deals, primarily, with people whose behavior requires them to be admitted to mental institutions, but common sense tells us that, for every case that reaches this extreme, there are hundreds that approach it
