F. S. A. Assistance Five Callahan Available To More County Boys Leave **Farmers** 

The Farm Security Adminstration is preparing to extend left yesterday on the Sunshine its rehabilation loan program to more small farmers in Callahan Fort Bliss, El Paso. They were: County, Rural Supervisor James

S Knight announced today. "These loans are made to help farmers to stay on the land and do a better job of farming" Mr McKnight said. "Livestock and equipment, food, feed seed, and fertilizer are some of the things which are included in FSA Ibans in addition to general crop production

Any farmer, no matter whether he is a tenant or owner, is eligible for an FSA loan," he ex plained, "if he has a family-size farm on which he is now located or can find one, and can work out a farm plan to repay the loan over a period as long as five years." Loans are made only to farmers who cannot get the required financing from any other source.

The FSA supervisor said that this year Callahan County farmers have been slower to take advantage of the FSA's loan service and that he wanted "every farmer in need of this assistance to call at his office before the season become too far advanced." The FSA office is located at Baird in the Courthouse on the third floor
