


Suds Drinkers Get a Break

Jim Cusenbary To Work In Ecuador

John C. White, Texas Commissioner of Agriculture, has announced he is sending marketing specialist Jim Cusenbary of San Angelo to Ecuador to work toward exporting Texas beef cattle to that south American country.

The commissioner said this is part of the Texas Department of Agriculture's export marketing program which provides aid to foreign buyers in purchasing Texas livestock.

This export program has been instrumental in developing new markets for Texas livestock producers. Cusenbary's trip to Ecuador is a follow-up of a recent tour on which he personally escorted five Ecuadorian ranchmen on visits to Texas ranches and other agricultural facilities.

The livestockmen from Ecuador requested that Cusenbary be allowed to visit this country to assist in developing a livestock import program in Ecuador's highlands," White said.

According to the Ecuadorian visitors, that country is 100 years behind Texas beef cattle producers in beef production. The South American country is primarily dependent upon agriculture for its economic survival and the development of beef production is a large part of a widespread effort by Ecuador to improve the standard of living for its people.

The commissioner said Cusenbary will be in Ecuador during the last two weeks in February, leaving February 16 and returning February 27.



UP TO THE HOME FOLKS

As election time rolls around again, a new army of candidates and officeholders will be tempted to promise anything to the folks back home in exchange for votes. The fate of the nation will hang on whether the folks back home are clear-headed enough to see the danger in the bait being offered them.

The outspoken head of the Chamber of Commerce of the United States, Mr. Jenkin Lloyd Jones, gives a little homey advice to voters on the matter of government spending. He says: "W can't have it all -- not the whole bag, not right now, we've got to learn to wait another year for the new expressway, to put up with the old harbor breakwater for a few years more, not to be too free - handed with increased social security benefits until we've made sure that the dollar will stand it and we won't be paid off in potato chips. I suggest that we not only accept and welcome a slowdown of federal expenditures.... but that we get specific. We will get nowhere as long as we politically reward those public servants who have gone to Washington to loot the public treasury in our behalf. We are going to have to encourage those who have the guts to say 'no' to us....

It does no good to kick about inflation and then turn around and vote for those who would give the country more of the same medicine that has sent the cost of living through the roof and cut the value of the dollar by more than half.

If you do not live or pay tax n a school district which is affected by large numbers of students whose parents are employ ed by or assigned to a federal installation, then "impact funds" probably mean very little to you.

It was impact funds in the annual HEW appropriations bill which were given as the chief reason for the recent Presidental veto of that measure.

The \$600-million for impact funds contained in the measure was 91 percent of the amount previously authorized by the White House. Accordingly, affected school districts prepared their budgets on the assumption this money would be forthcom-

What is needed is an overhaul of the entire impact program. This kind of special aid should be restricted to special situations where federal activity actually imposes an extreme hardship on local school districts. Under present practices many districts have become entitled to this type of help even though the federal impact is remote or practically nonexistent.

Accent On Health That plump, healthy, happy

overweight adults in later life says Today's Health, the magazine of the American Medical Association

All too many mothers, with the best of intentions, nag their small fry into cating more than they want to cat. The healthy, fat baby who remains chubby as he grows into pre-school and first grade years becomes less attractive as an individual. And the habit of eating more calories than necessary is likely to remain the rest of his life

The parent is not the one to decide whether the child should lose weight, how he should lose it, or whether he should continue to remain "pleasingly plump," says Today's Health. The doctor should be consulted.

If it fits your doctor's counsel, here are some tips to help your oungster lose weight-

• Weigh once a week and keep rack of the weight. Use the same scale and wear approximately the same clothing. • It isn't necessary to cut out

all desserts and snacks, as long as their calorie count is included in the daily total. Fresh fruits are good for snacks.

· Keep a supply of raw carrots, radishes, celery sticks and pickles for more snacking. Tomato juice or clear bouillon can serve for drinks.

• Cut out rich salad dressings; instead use vinegar and lemon juice.

• Trim fat from meat, take it easy on the butter, substitute skim milk for whole milk. But be sure to get sufficient Vitamin A from fruits and vegetables.

The most important factor in helping the obese child to reduce poundage is to handle it naturally. Don't make a point of telling the child he is on a reducing diet. Just serve the meals naturally and as a matter of course. Avoid nagging the child about his diet. It will only make him rebellious and more inclined to snack on the sly.

Some lures, like the Heddon Chugger, stand the test of time. This is a great compliment for most baits go through a period when they produce best, then suddenly they lose their appeal to a newcomer.

One reason, no doubt, is that fish become conditioned to certain baits. When the lure is something new, bass are uninhibited. They strike like crazy! But the more they see of the bait, the less inclined they are to hit it. That is, unless the fisherman in the water. We once read of a unique test made in a fish hatchery. One lure of only one color was used. On the first day the bass struck the lure as if there would be no second chance for a meal. On the second day its appeal was almost as good.

No one knows for sure where the "plastic - worm - in - salt - water fad" started. T-Sgt. Phillip Scudder III of Orlando, Fla. claims he originated the idea. Until some rebuttal is sounded, we'll take his word for it.

Says Scudder, "In October, 1966, I was wading the flats of East Bay near Panama City, Fla., when I noticed several dead marine worms floating long and as large as a pencil and of very flimsy texture.

"Gathering the few that I could, I used them under a float and fished them as you would any bait. Having good luck with these and unable to locate more, I substituted a plastic worm.

"Nearest imitation to the marine worm I could find was a yellow plastic worm with small black dots. I tried this worm under a cork with little success. So I removed the cork After a month it was virtually im- and simply cast the worm out and retrieved it slowly along the bottom, using a tiny sinker for a weight.

"Right away I began to get strikes. But I caught very few fish since they were only grabbing the end of the long worm. Remedying this was simple: I merely pinched the worm off two inches below the hook. The birth of the salt-water plastic worm as we know it today occurred at that mo-

Thus a new rage was born. Today the plastic worm is noted as one of the very best baits for salt water, just as it is a top producer in fresh water. Wonder what the rage will be next
