policies conceming communicable diseases affecting school attendance was approved. The amendment reads as

A "communicable disease" for the purposes of these regulations, is defined as any disease that may be transmitted from one person or animal to another person or animal either directly or indirectly.

a. Children suffering from any of the communicable diseases shall be barred from school attendance.

b. In addition to any communicable diseases, children suffering from scabies, impetigo contagiosa, ringworm, trachoma, common cold, contagious catarrhal conjuctivitis, and pediculosis also may be barred from school attendance.

c. All children excluded from school for reason of communicable disease may be readmitted to school only on the certificate of the attending physician attesting to their recovery and non-infectiousness, or a permit for readmission to school issued by a city or county health officer, or by the director of a health unit in areas where such units are established.

I am most deeply honored to have a part in these Honor Society Installations today.

It is a particular honor to speak to you since the work of your Administrators and Faculty is tied so closely with my work in the Legislature. We are gathered nere today in honor of your installation. For many of you this means the end of several long years of hard work.

You will soon be beginning life as a citizen of this great Nation. Your responsibility will increase, but so will your privileges.

Within a few years most of you will be married and have families. You will have jobs to support your families. Possibly some of you will lead the Community, State and Nation. Possibly some of you will be fortunate enough to serve in public office as I have done for the past few years. Others of you will be leaders in business, education or the military. You have a big job ahead and a big responsibility as a citizen of this Nation.

So today I would like to tell you a little about the Nation in which you are beginning productive, useful lives.

Border Patrol Seeks Applicants

The U. S. Border Patrol of the Immigration and Naturalization Service has an urgent need for a large number of physically fit young men desiring a career in Federal law enforcement work.

The Border Patrol is the armed, uniformed enforcement branch of the Immigration and Naturalization service. Its purpose is to detect and prevent the smuggling and the illegal entry of aliens into the United States and to apprehend those guilty of such violations.

No experience is required for these positions. To qualify, applicants must pass a written test of verbal abilities, judgment, and aptitude for learning a foreign language. Candidates who pass the written test will be called for oral interviews in the order of their standing on the list. The oral interview is designed to determine if the applicant has the personal qualities needed for the work. Candidates must also pass a rigid physical examination.

Those selected for appointment are assigned to the Border Patrol Academy for a period of intensive training in such subjects as immigration laws, Spanish, physical training and markmanship. Trainees receive full pay while in the academy.

The entrance salary of an Immigration Patrol Inspector is \$7,639 a year. Upon satisfactory completion of their probationary period, trainees are promoted to the journeyman position of Patrol Inspector (grade GS-8, \$8,449 a year). Further advancement can be achieved through regular in-Service promotions.

Full information is given in announcement No. WAM-911 (Revised), which may be secured from Interagency Boards of Examiners and from many postoffices as well as any office of the Immigration and Naturalization Service.



> You have received in the mail an envelope from the Texas Highway Department, Motor Vehicle Division, containing a card form in three parts, with perforations between the parts. This is your Motor Vehicle License Plate renewal application. All you have to do to get your new license plates is to send or bring this card — INTACT — to the tax collector's office, together with the amount of money required for the new license.
