Some Early Blooms In Evidence

By E. B. Keng There are signs that spring is just around the comer-and a tremendous spring is anticipated. Good winter moisture germinated a great variety of annual weeds and grasses. The countryside should develop a riot of color by April.

Some of the early blooming plants are in evidence now. Bladderpod, or cloth-of-gold, has a lemon yellow flower, and is in full bloom now. In the mustard family, this plant will develop many small, bladderlike pods that give it the name. It is a very good sheep and goat

One of the earliest native plants to bloom is the anemone. These flowers may be white or purple. Another very early lant is the wedgeleaf draba, a very small plant with a white flower. California filaree is very abundant this year, and is covered with small lavender

In the shrub department, red-

plants are also covered with red blooms. The algerita and elbow bushes are blooming now, both with yellow flowers. A few Spanish daggers are putting up their individual bouquets of large white, or cream colored blooms. Bluebonnets will again be abundant in protected areas, and should start blooming in late April. A few early bitterweed plants are beginning to

The few remaining buckeye

The old liveoak leaves are turning brown, and will soon be replaced by a new crop of bright green leaves. Shinoaks are budding, and will be in full leaf and bloom very shortly.

Two of the widely known harbingers of spring are holding back, apparently awaiting the last of the cold weather. The scissortail flycatcher has not been reported in the area. When the scissortails arrive for nesting, most people believe that spring is really here. The mesquite trees have also shown no sign of breaking dormancy. 440, Sonora second with 45. 6 buds are coming into full bloom. They are occasionally killed by late frosts, but this occurs rarely.
