Registered Voters **Total 86 Percent**



Change In Income Tax Forms More Confusing Than Ever

The form is designed by rechnical would like to put it on the line for Uncle Sam. But the cry is going up across the length and breadth of the land: A long-suffering public can't find the proper line.

As reported in U.S. News & World Report the other day, "Millions of taxpayers are running into trouble with this year's new tax forms. Early filings reveal many people cannot understand the instructions. Tax advisers are enjoying booming business. Fears grow that a crisis may come as the April 15 reporting deadline nears.

Now why should this be the case when the IRS repeatedly assures the taxpaying public that its intention is to make the form new and simpler, easier to follow, a thing of beauty and a joy forever?

Well, one reason might be that, for all its good intentions, IRS has gone the way of all beureaucracies: It has designed a mechanism (in this case Form 1040 and accompanying impedimenta) that looks good in theory but doesn't work out so well in practice.

One is led to wonder whether IRS in creating something new and "simpler" really had the patient public in the forefront of its thinking-

The point is that designing a new form and announcing it as an improvement doesn't

necessarily make it so. One of the troubles is that Form 1040 has been revised in some manner or other in eight of the last 10 years. Without doubt these changes have been made with a purpose in mind; we do not suggest the IRS is fiddling around just to make the taxpayer burn.



The Administration's new welfare plan will be debated in the House soon - probably before the Easter recess. While it will likely be approved, I plan to vote against it. The new scheme would more than double the 10.1 million now on relief rolls, and would add, initially, some \$5-billion per year to welfare costs - which now exceeds \$20-billion, not counting private charity.

The chief innovation is a \$2400 per year guaranteed annual income for all families of four - whether they work or not. This figure includes \$800 in food stamps.

Sponsors theorize that somehow the plan would create an incentive for low-income people to work harder, make more money, and rise above the \$2400 "subsistence" level. But experience with both the Kennedy and LBJ welfare programs has proven it simply doesn't work that way. 

In any event, adoption of the income guaran tee concept pushed the USA closer to the statu of the total welfare state.







Lieutenant Governor Ben Barnes has announced that he will conduct a tour of the state's facilities for the treatment and rehabilitation of drug users on the 26th and 27th

of this month. The Lieutenant Governor is inviting members of the Capitol Press, members of the statewide press, representatives of parent and educational groups, and law enforcement agencies, and the heads of those state agencies dealing with the drug problem to accompany him on the tour.

Barnes said that the tour will visit the Texas Research Institute of Mental Sciences at Houston, the University of Texas Medical Branch at Galveston, the Department of Corrections facilities at Huntsville, Timber lawn Sanitarium at Dallas, Clinical Research Center at Fort Worth, and Terrell State Hospital at Terrell. Barnes expressed the hope that this tour would "provide an awareness of what is available in the area of drug treatment and rehabilitation and guide the state in filling in the gaps so that those who need help can receive it."
