DIKN The skindly with an except with an except Joe David Nance has kindly furnished us with an excerpt from "A Vaquero of the Brush Country", a 1929 J. Frank Dobie book and we feel it will be of interest to our readers. The book belongs to Joe's grandfather R. G. Nance, and the following is taken from pages 271-273, chapter 30. It is based on an 1890 visit to Sonora.

After we crossed the high divide between the Llanos and the head draws of Devil's River we came to Sonora, a little town just about a year old that was soon to become the seat of Sutton County. We did not tarry here long, but long enough for me to receive some distinct impressions.

Its chief organization was a kangaroo court, and this court was about the liveliest thing of its kind that ever functioned in the West. It claimed its authority from "the famous seventeenth Legislature of Texas" - though I have never found out what made this particular legislature famous. The 'Just Judge" that presided over it was my uncle, Sam Duncan, who claimed to be the only honest gambler in the country. The prosecuting attorney was Charlie Adams, author of a book, printed privately some years later, entitled "Forty Years A Fool". In this court there were no juries and the decision of the Just Judge was without appeal. He frequently assessed the fines, and the money was always turned over to the cause of charity.

Sam G. Tayloe, now district judge in San Antonio, was tried for theft and his wife was brought in as a witness-evidence of the fact that women sometimes took part in these mock courts on a frontier barren of social amusements. It was proved that Tayloe had stolen his wife. In another case a long, lank young man was accused of "stuttering in the streets against the peace and dignity of the State of Devil's River." He gave his name as Bob Martin. The Just Judge sentenced him to herd a flock of 1500 sheep for one day. He was to herd them on foot. At the end of the day he came in-so a story that has been told on many tenderfeet goes-and reported to the owner, who asked if any of the sheep had given him any trouble. Bob stutteringly replied that three lambs had given him just an awful

lot of trouble but that he had finally corralled them with the other sheep. It was a time of year when there were no lambs, and the owner's curiosity was aroused. He went down to the pen to investigate. The "lambs' turned out to be three jack rabbits. On the strength of his energy and enterprise Bob got a permanent job. Today he is randling sheep of his own by the tens of thousands. Sonora had more horse play and more varieties of horse play than any other community have ever been acquainted with. It possessed a weekly news paper called "The Devil's River News" and also a struggling Sunday school that was held in the one-roomed school house. The chief news gatherer for the paper was a Mrs. Hooper: she knew everything". One Sunday morning several of us young and younger men came together in one of the dozen saloons of the town. One of the gang was Lee L. Russell, now of Fort Worth and one of the largest cattle dealers in America. He announc ed to us that he had promised is sister he would attend Sunday School at ten o'clock that Sabbath morning and he suggested that we all go along. We went. The few women who conducted the Sunday School welcomed us most cordially and apportioned to our use a long bench. The teacher was an elderly woman and she began her instruction with orthodox catechism.
