This week witnessed the beginning of another summer of boys baseball in Bovina. This makes for a pretty hectic period for the participants and spectators ---and that includes what seems like a majority of the people in this area.

The season only lasts about six weeks, but that can be a long time if your favorite team is suffering from the knack of losing most of its games.

Games are played at the rate of two or three per night for four nights a week. That makes for a lot of balls, strikes and basehits. It also brings about much enthusiasm, excitement and disappointment. That disappointment comes because there's a losing team in each of those two or three games per night.

The success of the program here can be measured, to some extent, in the cash box of the concession stand at the ballpark. This is, without a doubt, one of the top businesses in town during the season when you consider the number of hours it is in operation on those four playing days per week.

If you have six teams playing in one night, with 15 players per team, that makes for 90 boys right there. Then, if each of those brings two parents to the games plus a big brother and a little sister and a grandparent, that swells the number in attendance by another 450. Then throw in a few more numbers for just plain fans, umpires, nouncers, scorekeepers and what-have-you and, on paper, you can have 600 people on hand.

That, friends, can make for selling a lot of soda pop, pop corn and hot dogs.

The boys' baseball program here is probably now in its 13th or so year. It has been organized into leagues made up of local teams for something like 10 years. Prior to that, we had one or two teams which competed with other teams outside this area. Back then, we're not sure there was even a regular schedule, but games were "matched" when and where they could be.

In spite of criticisms of the baseball program, we think it's one of the finest things to ever happen to this area or any other.

Needless to say, the summer baseball season is one of our favorite times of the year.

The idea for erection of a windmill as a memorial to days gone by which was suggested by the Buck Ellisons a couple of weeks ago has born some fruit.

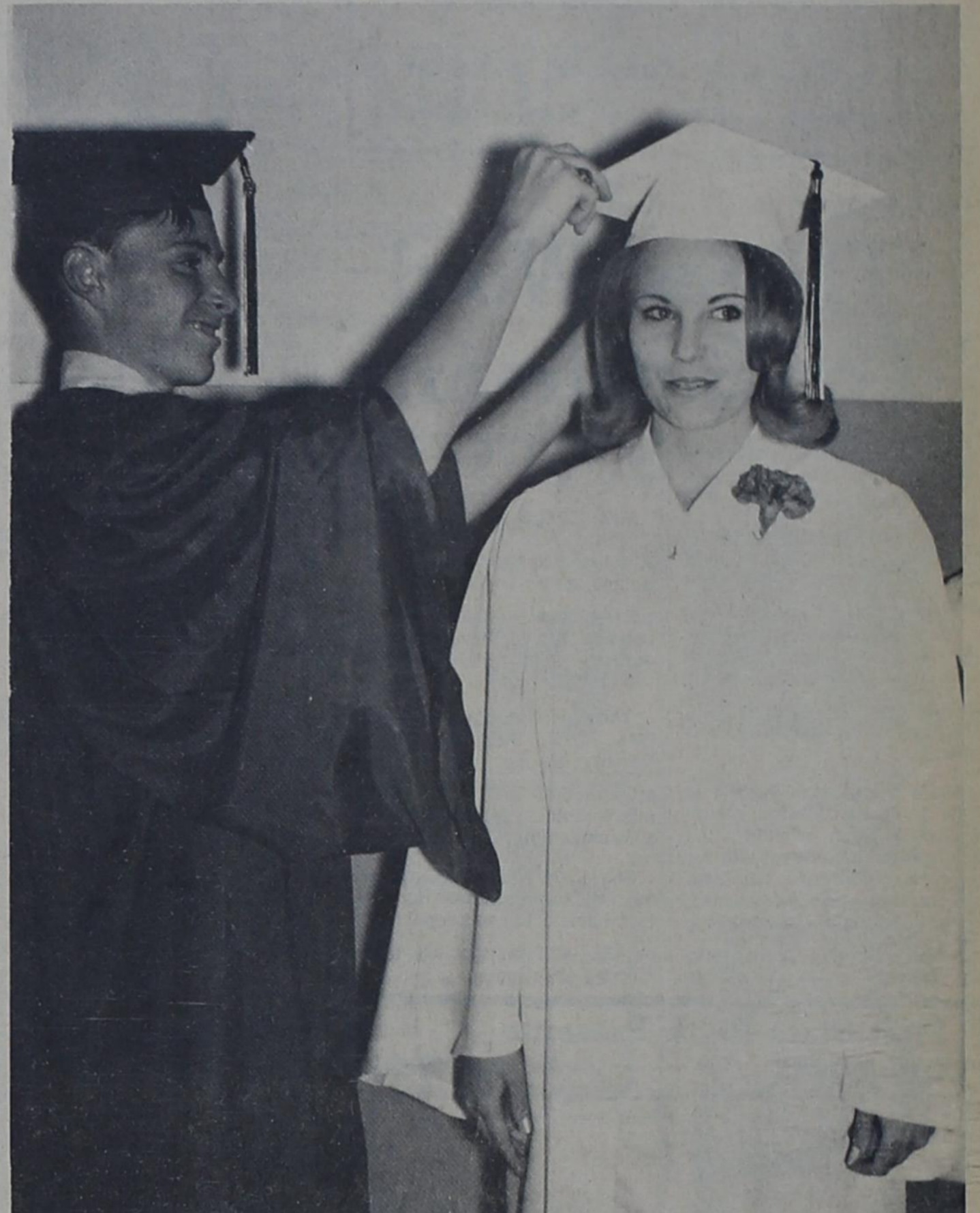

City Orders Trash Truck

City of Bovina will have a new trash truck about July 1, according to city officials.

On Wednesday of last week, the trash truck caught fire, damaging the hydraulic pump and wiring. Those repairs were completed this week.

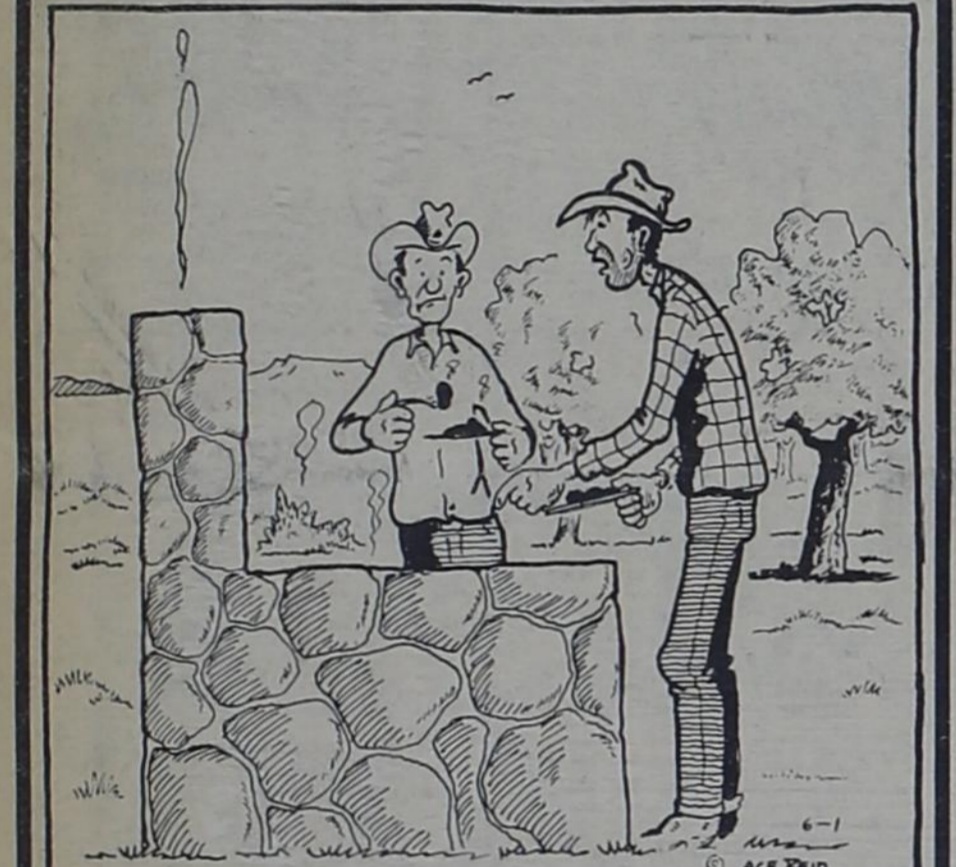
A few miles away from home, the friends and two children were in an automobile accident. Bill received a broken leg and Becky bruises.

Water Import --

Halfway Foundation Approved For Study

Final approval of a project which will aid the U. S. Bureau of Reclamation in determining the feasibility of importing water to the High Plains was given this week to the High Plains Research Foundation at Halfway.

The project will determine the yield and production response of sugarbeets and corn to various combinations of fertilizer and irrigation. The study at the Foundation is a part of the five and a half year research study assigned to Iowa State University by the Bureau in 1967.

The Foundation is one of several institutions cooperating with the University throughout western United States in compiling detailed information for the Bureau's study.

Purpose of the study is to develop better correlation between physical soil characteristics and crop yields under given conditions of irrigation in a wide range of geographic locations.

According to the arrangement approved this week, the Foundation will conduct 20 varying irrigation and fertilizer test plots each on sugarbeet and corn.

Attending the meeting at the Foundation Tuesday to approve the study were Stan Kleinman, economist, Iowa State University, and Bureau representatives, H. A. Schweers, Austin; George Loomis, Amarillo; Robert Vadar, Denver and Robert Struthers, Denver.

The total University study is expected to develop better correlation between physical soil characteristics and crop yields under given conditions of irrigation for improved methods of evaluating the productive ca-

capacity of irrigated farmlands in the western United States. Commissioner of Reclamation Floyd E. Dominy said, "We are confident that this study will yield new concepts and methods that will improve Reclamation's procedures in land classification and economic analysis of irrigation projects."

Director of the Foundation, Dr. Tom Longnecker, stated, "We are pleased that the Bureau and Iowa State have decided to place this research project here at the Foundation since it permits us to expand our irrigation fertilizer research to include sugarbeets and corn as well as cotton, grain sorghum, wheat and soybeans. More efficient use of water is the objective of these studies."

This is the purpose of the study. Past annual reports on cotton, grain sorghum and cotton also will be considered in completing the University study.

This shows the depth of the Reclamation economic and feasibility study into providing supplemental irrigation water to the High Plains. The University study is to be completed in February of 1973.

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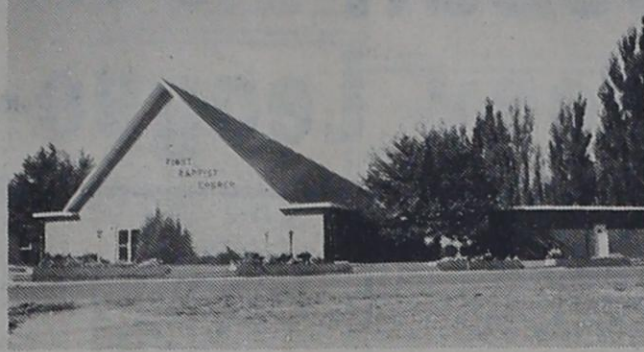
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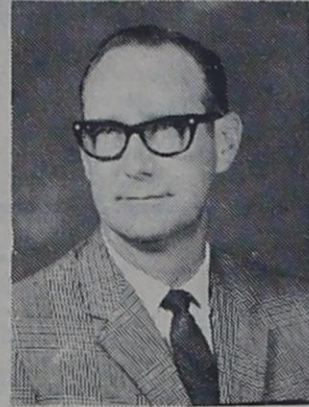

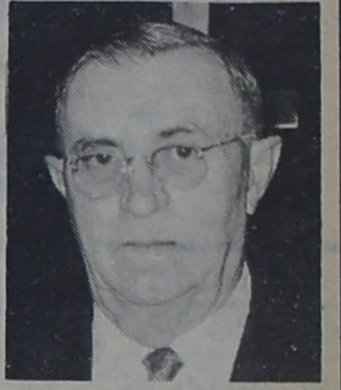

CONTROL OF GREENBUGS ON GRAIN SORGHUM

After last years round with greenbugs in grain sorghum everyone will be on the lookout for them in 1969. As a result of last years experience and research it is hoped that the information gathered will be beneficial in 1969.

A recent Texas Cooperative Economic Insect Report has reported greenbugs attacking grain sorghum in Denton, Grayson, Cook and Collins Counties.

Although damage was not serious in these areas, farmers in Farmer County should be on the alert to possible greenbug infestations. Recent rains received in the county the past few weeks have helped to reduce greenbug numbers on wheat, Joinsongrass and volunteer grain sorghum.

CONTROL OF GREENBUGS

The extent of greenbug damage in grain sorghum is dependent upon greenbug numbers, plant size and stage growth, moisture conditions, presence or absence of parasites and predators and plant vigor. Producers are cautioned to observe plant conditions closely and the development of greenbug numbers and damage. Damage from the seedling stage up to early pre-boot often results in stand loss and plant death.

Plants from emergence up to about 6 inches in height, showing visible damage with colonies of greenbugs on the under leaf surface, should be treated. Research data from 1968 indicates that larger plants, up to the pre-boot stage, may tol-

erate more greenbugs. Large numbers of greenbug on this size plant should be controlled before any entire plant leaves are killed.

Yield reduction during the pre-boot, boot, blooming and grain development stages are dependent on greenbug numbers, length of time that greenbugs have infested plants and plant condition. Based on one year's experience and research, heavy populations can cause extensive damage to pre-boot and older plants. Indications are that greenbug numbers, which result in death to more than the 2 lower, normalized leaves, should be controlled.

The above general guides are based on the assumption that the greenbug buildup is occurring more rapidly than effective control by beneficial insects. Also, if a plant is undergoing stress, plants cannot support as many greenbugs without suffering yield reductions.

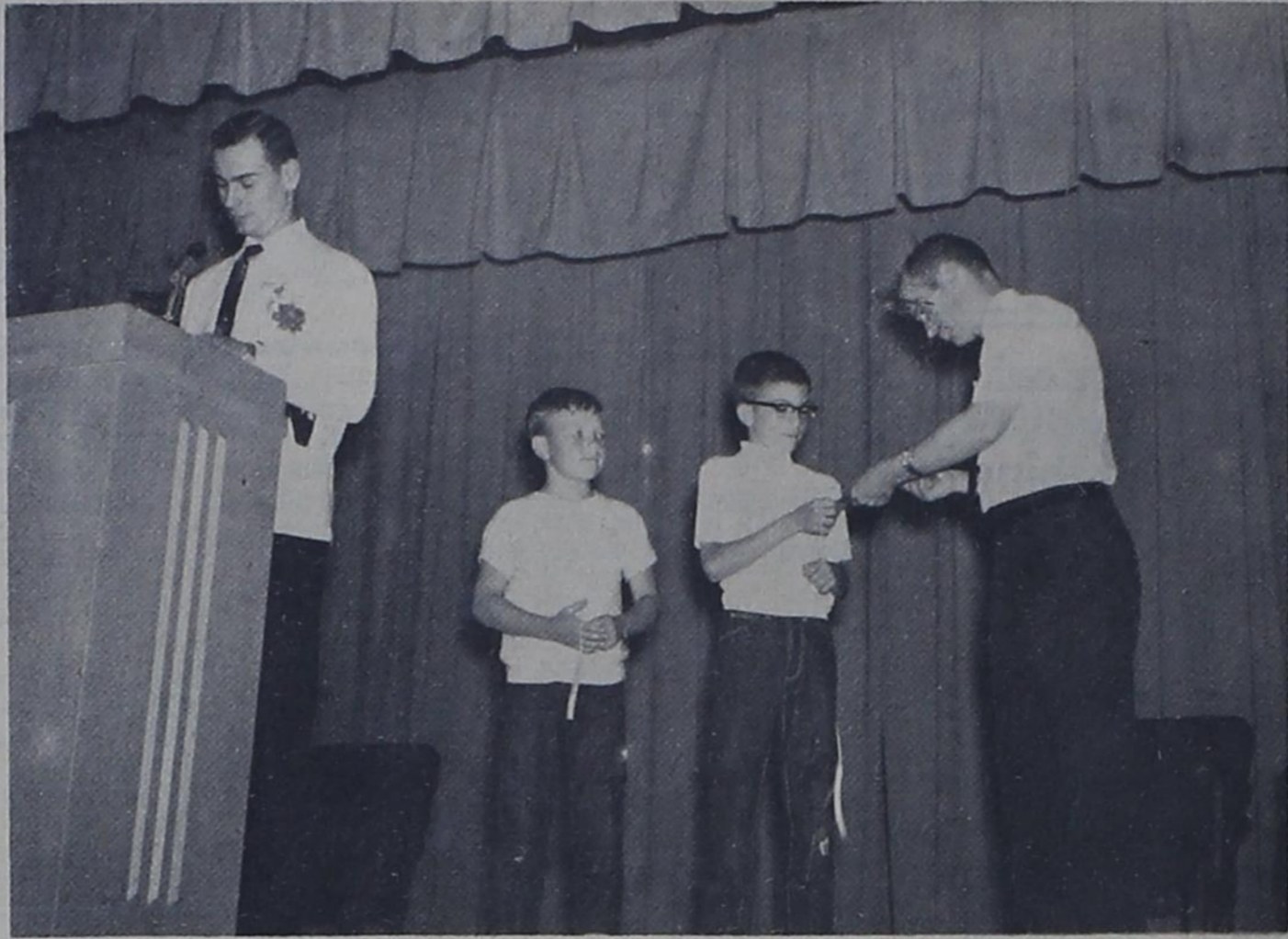

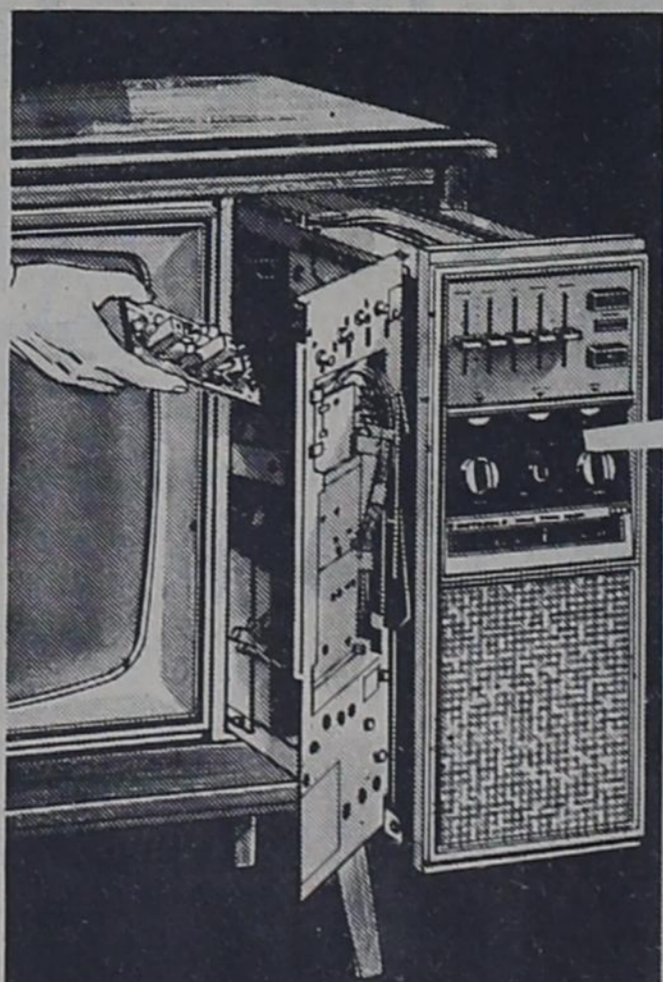
