# Broncos Thunder Ahead Advance To Semi-Finals

The Sonora Broncos advance to the semi-final game by virtue of a win over the Honey Grove Warriors. Even though the final score was 19-19, the Broncos won by a penetration and will meet Petersburg in the semi-final bout in Snyder at 7:30 Friday night.

It took the top performance by the Sonora team to get the win, as they were forced to play catch up football almost all night long. A second half surge by the Bronco offense and a fired up defense turned the tide for the Big Reds.

Honey Grove showed their strength as they marched 80 yards for a touchdown on their first possession of the night. Warrior Henry Green carried

six times, once a 35-yard romp to the Bronco 14 yard line. He chalked up the touchdown himself from 8 yards out making it 6-0 early in the first quarter. Kerry Joy blocked the extra point try.

The Broncos came charging back with a drive of their own. Quarterback Eddie Sutton led the offense to the Warrior 11

with a pair of passes to Mike Taylor and Richard Bernal. The Honey Grove defense stiffened and forced Taylor to attempt a 27 yard field goal. He is try was wide however, but an important penetration was chalked up.

Someone forgot to tell the Warriors about the fearsome Bronco defense as they went 77 yards again for their second tally with Green doing most of the work. Green broke from the Bronco 47 and went into the end zone virtually untouched. Even though the Broncos swarmed through the line, the Warrior extra point attempt was good, and the Warriors led 13-0.

This time the Broncos realized that they would have to score and accordingly they put together a 54-yard drive after Sammy Perez returned the kickoff 34 yards to the Honey Grove 46. It took the skill of all three of the Sonora backs, Scott Jacoby, Noel and Arnold Samaniego, to do the trick and Noel punched over from the two yard line with 5:06 left on the clock in the first half.

The Warriors tried to push another score across before half time as they pushed to the Bronco 25 before Perez picked off a David Seale pass. The Broncos went to the dressing room behind 13-7 at the half.

Sonora came thundering back with a 10-play 64-yard drive covering the distance with running plays. Jacoby pounded over from the six, making it 13-13 after Taylor's conversion went wide with 6:16 left in the game.

The lead went to Honey Grove four minutes later as they drove 73 yards with Green and two clutch, third down passes of 13 and 17 yards to James Allen and Jessie Morris, respectively, accounting for most of the yardage. Green scored from eight yards out. The Warriors tried for the two point conversion, but the clutch defense of the Broncos did its job and Green was halted short of the mark.

### Former Sonoran A. Z. Joy Honored

A former Sonoran and local high school graduate, A. Z. Joy, county agent in White Pine County, Nevada, was named by the Nevada Farm Bureau as an outstanding agent in the State based on his service over the years to farmers, ranchers and the bureau. Joy is a son of Mr. and Mrs. Artie Joy.

William Hicks, executive secretary of the Nevada Farm Bureau, said that Joy was selected not only for his service to White Pine County agriculturists but those in the State as well. He pointed out that this was the first time that such an award had been given by the Bureau.

Joy has been on the Cooperative Extension staff of the University since 1959. He holds a bachelors and masters degree from the University of Wyoming.

The Broncos took the ensuing kickoff and went 65 yards to paydirt with Noel crashing over from the three on the fourteenth play of the series.

With a strong wind at their backs and a strong defensive display, the Broncos kept the Warriors deep in their own territory. The Bronco lead of 4 to 3 on penetrations spurred the Warriors, and with 4:22 left in the game they began to move from their own 13. They moved to the Bronco 37 yard line before they ran out of downs and Sonora took over.

The Broncos ran out the remaining fifty seconds and a single penetration won the thrilling, breath-taking contest for them. Many compared this game to the Fomey game of 1966 as far as thrills and solid football are concerned.

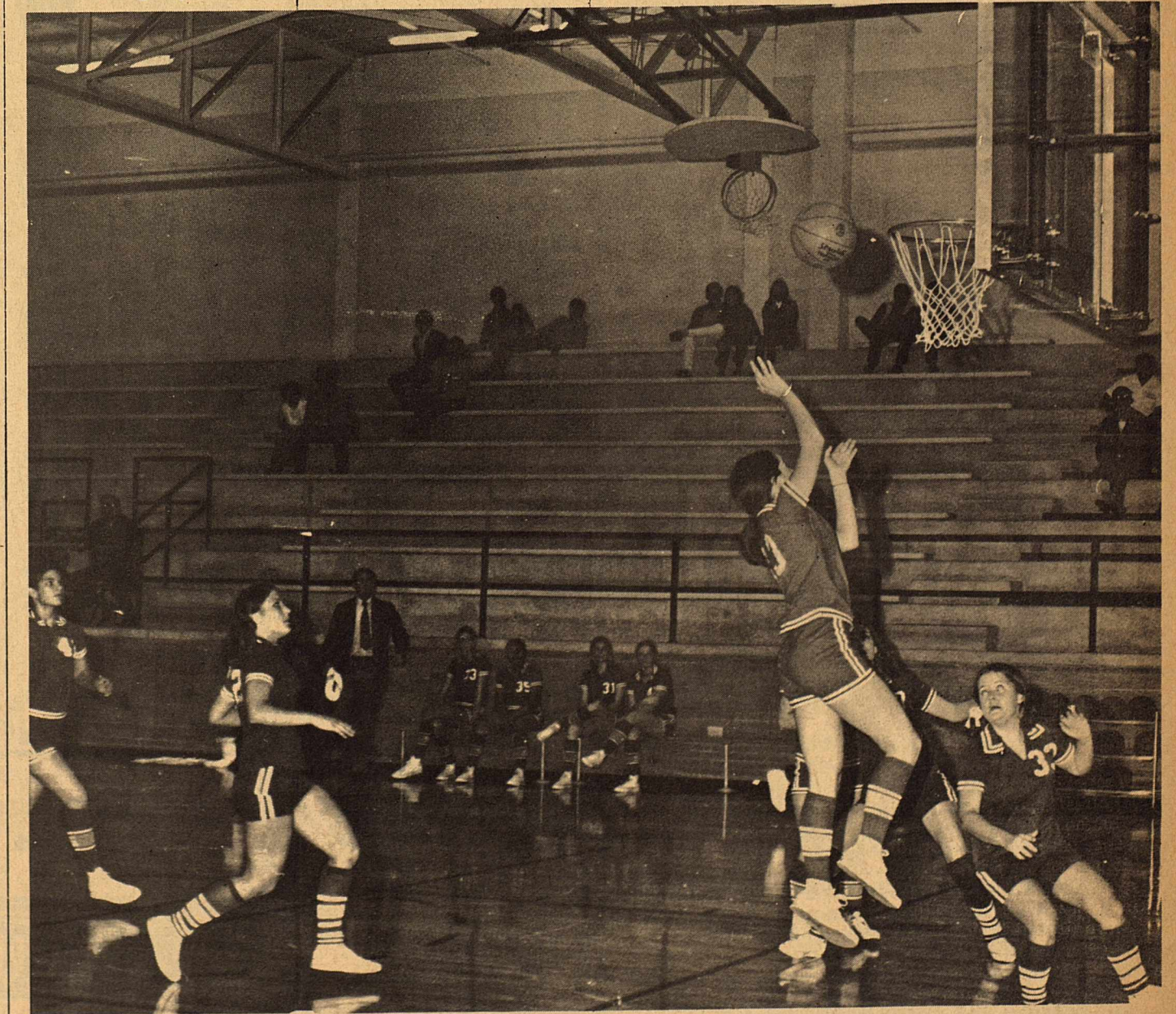

Verily, verily, I say unto you these people are great magicians and exceedingly cunning in many strange arts. Now in this land are exceeding high mountains and mighty lakes which knoweth not the color of water and are forever dry like unto an ancient bone. But the quality of the grass is good and it everywhere abounds; whereat the sheep rejoice muchly and the cow growth amazingly fat. And the stockman gathereth in much tin and waxeth exceedingly rich, and rideth about in road carts and putteth on much style, and sayeth, "Behold how mighty am I!" Selah.

And when the storm cometh and the rain descendeth in torrents he laugheth Ha! Ha! and sayeth, "Behold it maketh the grass to grow, and the weeds to flourish. Verily I have pitched my tent in goodly land, and here will I abide until I am called hence, and gathered unto my fathers."

And when the drouth cometh and the rain falleth not, he smileth unto himself and sayeth, "Verily, I careth not; for behold I have great stores of water laid by in my goodly cypress tanks. And have I not a well that is an hundred and ninety and nine feet deep, in the bottom whereof there is water sufficient for a great nation?"

### A Bishop Looks at Life

Is Christmas Revelant?

By Everett H. Jones Retired Bishop of the EPISCOPAL CHURCH

How can we possibly make Christmas vitally relevant to ourselves and to people around us in the world we are now living in?

One way, I believe, is to bring to this holy season (beginning well in advance) the deepest and most disturbing questions that are present in our minds and hearts.

Such a question is this: Are we losing all the decencies of Christian civilization—are we headed for a time of moral degeneration and collapse?

There are many indications that this is happening, indeed has already happened. Look at the increase in crime and violence, the spread of alcoholism and drug addiction, the growing prevalence of pornography, the vulgar pollution of our language, the extreme permissiveness in plays and motion pictures, the lack of commitment and reverence in regard to marriage and sexual relationships.

We need to be reminded that Christmas is not unrelated to the lower levels of human nature. Christ came into a world where life was cheap; a Herod did not hesitate to destroy hundreds of children under two years of age as well as his own son and other relatives. It was a world in which there was adultery, violence, dishonesty and disloyalty, ingratitude and ruthless self-seeking. In fact, there were just as many sins then as we can count today.

Christ met this world by hating its sins and loving its sinners. He called into being a company of those ready to be forgiven and to begin life on a higher level in a new relationship with God and other people. They were to be in the world but not of it. They were not to conform to the world but to be transformed by God's inner renewal of their minds.

Sir Kenneth Clarke in his monumental study called "Civilization" says that it was the small, dedicated Christian colonies that kept civilization alive in the Dark Ages following the fall of

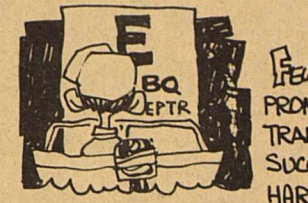

# STATE Capital NEWS

By VERN SANFORD

Legislative Budget Board staff members added little to the season's cheer for legislators with their estimate that even a rigidly-conservative 1972-73 budget will require a \$643.5 million tax bill.

Lawmakers, who report for the biennial session in January, must pass a \$51.4 million emergency finance measure to head off a 20 percent welfare cut in April, the Budget Board warned. And early approval of a constitutional amendment to raise the \$80 million welfare ceiling also will be necessary to avert eventual sharp reductions in aid to the needy.

Sharp growth in welfare rolls and long-range educational programs already enacted are primary reasons cited for the record tax need.

**BOUNDARY HEARING SET**—Texas-Louisiana boundary dispute will be argued before Judge Robert Van Pelt in the U.S. Supreme Court in Houston December 16.

Judge Van Pelt is a senior federal district judge for Nebraska.

Texas claims that midstream of the Sabine River, Sabine Lake and Sabine Pass were established in 1848 by Congress as the dividing line. Louisiana claims the entire river.

Millions in oil lease income are at stake. **TEXAS FOURTH**—Texas now is the fourth most-populous state in the nation. New census figures show 11,298,787 population which includes 102,057 Texans abroad.

California is No. 1, with more than 20 million. New York remains second with 18.2 million and Pennsylvania third with nearly 11.9 million.

Texas barely nosed out Illinois for fourth. Illinois' head count is 11,184 million.

**TURKEY PRICES HOLDING**—Price of the Christmas turkey in Texas will be about the same, or maybe even less than in 1969, Agriculture Commissioner John C. White figures.

A wire service story November 25 stated that prices of Thanksgiving turkeys over the nation were nine percent higher this year, but White

said this was not true in Texas. White based this statement on a survey of prices in leading markets of San Antonio, Houston and Dallas.

About 19 percent more turkeys were produced in Texas this year than in 1969.

**COURTS SPEAK**—Reversing itself, the State Supreme Court upheld a \$10,000 libel judgment against a Denton publishing company as the result of an erroneous report (which the Court said was not privileged). Story reportedly stated that a local developer was bankrupt. In an earlier opinion, the High Court, by a 5 to 4 vote, had held for the newspaper publisher. Newspaper had quoted a statement made at a city council meeting but through oversight did not say who made the statement.

**SOME RECENT OPINIONS**—of Attorney General Crawford Martin—

\*Law prohibiting deer hunting with artificial lights was not repealed in Smith County by the Uniform Wildlife Regulatory Act.

\*Maximum salary for Orange County Court at Law judges is \$6,600 a year.

**APPOINTMENTS**—Gov. Preston Smith has recommended Col. Melvin N. Glantz of Plainview to succeed the late Col. Morris Schwartz as State Selective Director.

**SHORT SNORTS**—

A sub-panel of the Speakers Committee of the House has recommended bullet-proof glass to seal off the House chamber from the gallery.

Former Vice President Hubert Humphrey will head a list of dignitaries attending the December 15 appreciation dinner here for Sen. Ralph Yarborough.

Norman Newton of McAllen announced he will resign as executive director of State Republican party about December 23, when William M. Steger of Tyler will step down as state chairman to accept a judgeship.

Veterans Land Board has authorized the sale of \$25 million in veterans land bonds—if buyers can be found at the 4 1/2 per cent interest limit.

Amistad elevation Sunday was 1074.96 feet, up .06 from Friday. Depth at Amistad Dam was 174.96 feet, up .06 from Friday. Water storage amounted to 1,439,356 acre feet, an increase of 1,927 acre feet from Friday. Water surface measured 33,806 acres, an increase of 41 acres. Downstream release was 522 second feet, the same as Friday.

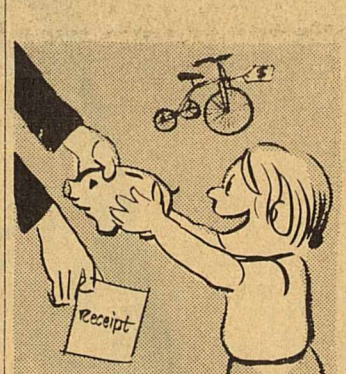

**Selling To Minors**

By scrimping and saving, 14-year-old Freddie accumulated a nest egg of almost \$400. One day he spent the whole thing on a shiny new motorbike that he had been eyeing in a store window.

A few days later, after a sobering talk with his parents, Freddie took the motorbike back to the store and asked for a refund. The merchant refused, but finally had to give in when the matter was taken to court. The judge reminded him that a minor has a legal right to back out of his contracts.

"Always," said the judge, "the courts have attempted to protect persons of tender years from the wiles of those who would take

advantage of them and from the effects of their own folly."

This safeguard for the youthful purchaser, this "right to disaffirm," has been a part of Anglo-American law for centuries. It extends to anyone not yet of age, which usually means anyone under 21. In most states, it applies even if the merchandise has been damaged or destroyed—that is, even if Freddie had negligently smashed up the motorbike in an accident. His negligence, too, would be considered a part of his immaturity.

However, the right to disaffirm does not apply to the purchase of necessities, such as food, clothing, and medical supplies. A teenager might be able to cancel a purchase of costly, custom-made boots, but not a purchase of everyday shoes.

Furthermore, there are now growing doubts about the whole notion of a right to disaffirm. Today's youth, observed one court, are often more sophisticated than their parents—hence less in need of special protection. Certainly it isn't as easy to think of them as babes in the commercial woods when they are wielding a buying power of perhaps 25 billion dollars per year.

Accordingly, in varying degree, state legislatures have been getting stricter with young people. One way has been to hold them fully responsible for certain types of contracts, such as educational loans. Another way has been to lower the age of maturity to 18. Still another way has been to deny the cancellation privilege to any youth who has deceived the merchant about his age.

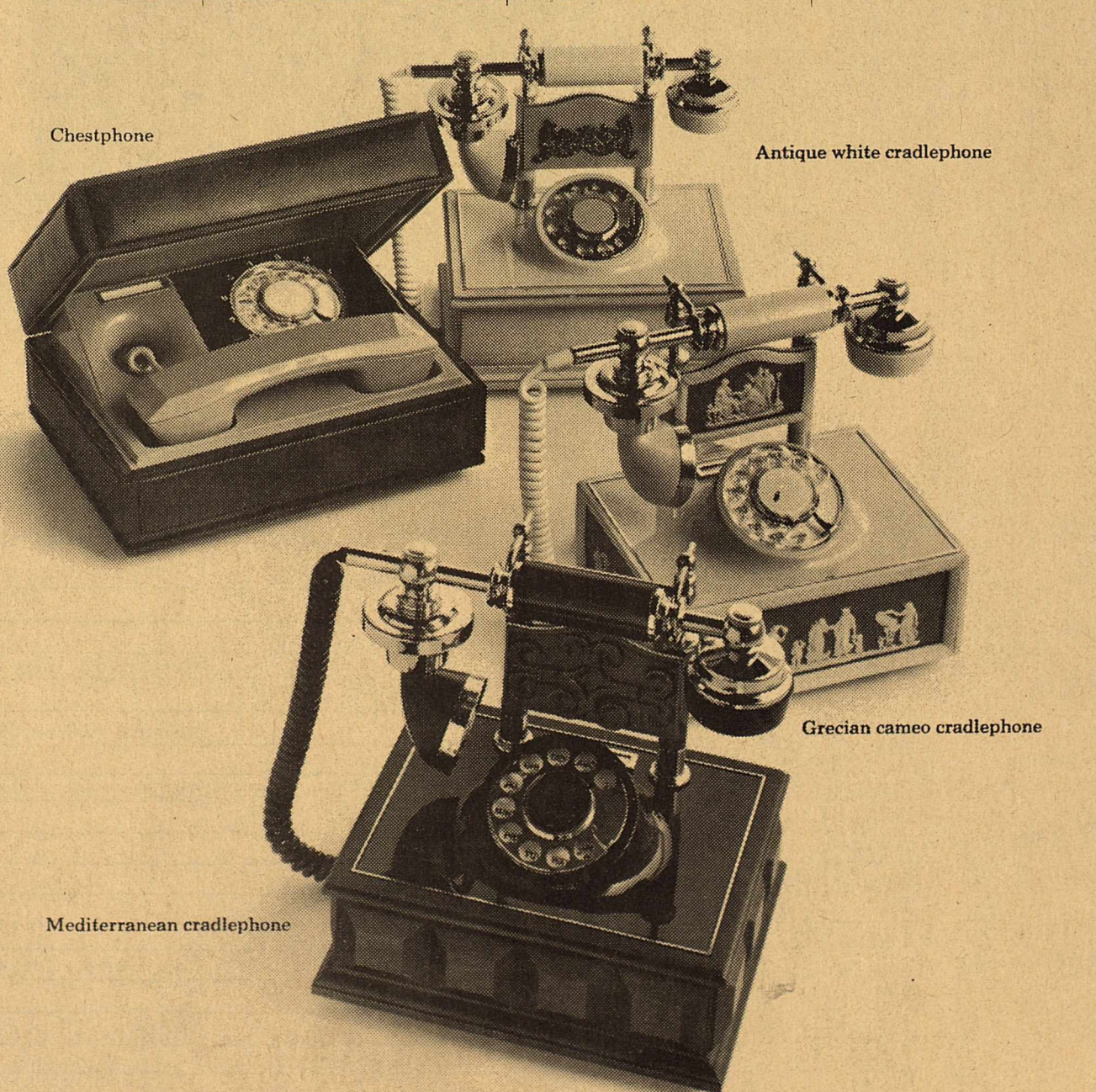
"The privilege may be used as a shield to protect the (minor)," said one court, "not as a sword to inflict injuries upon another."
