A new church building for St. Ann's Catholic Church was dedicated in a service held at 4 p. m. Celebrant at the service was the Reverend Stephen Leven, Bishop of the Diocese of San Angelo.

Mrs. L. P. Bloodworth Sr. and Mrs. Ben Cusenbary set the first work date for work on the rag rug for the Miers Home Museum. The authentic furnishing of the bedroom of the Museum is a project which has been undertaken by the Sonora Woman's Club.

Erma Lee Turner, County and District Clerk of Sutton County announced that she will seek re-

election to the position she has held since November, 1964.

The Sonora Broncos opened their 1970 basketball season with the Menard Yellowjackets.

First place winners in the Sutton County's 4-H carcass lamb show included John David Cook who took the top spot in the finewool division with a lamb bred by Tom Davis. Philip Jacoby took first place in the crossbred division.

Mrs. Lucille Hutcherson announced her candidacy for re-election as county treasurer, a job she has held for approximately ten years.

Sonora boys selected on the Class A All-State football team included Erasmo Lumbreras,

linebacker, Jim Elliott, lineman; and Jesso Cook in a secondary position. David Wuest was honored with a second team quarterback position.

Justice of the Peace, Alfred Cooper announced he will not be a candidate for reelection to that office but will retire at the completion of his term.

George Brockman, local ranchman was in a San Angelo hospital recovering from an injury to his eye after being kicked by a calf.

The Busty Halbert award, a new award added to the show this year was awarded to Mike Stewart for his quality mohair fleece. The award was presented by B. M. Halbert III, of Andrews.

John W. Fields, son of Mr. and Mrs. Herbert Fields, was named a Distinguished Student in Veterinary medicine at Texas A&M University during the fall semester.

Mid-January Date Set For Local 4-H Show

The twenty-fourth annual Sutton County 4H show and sale will be held Saturday, January 16 at the 4H Center.

Selection of the twenty lambs to be slaughtered for the Lamb Carcass Classes will be at 3:45 p. m., Monday, January 11 at the 4H Center. James A. Gray, Extension Animal Husbandman, Dr. Frank Orts, Texas A&M University Extension meats specialist and Bill Sims, executive secretary of the Sheep and Goat Raisers Association will select the lambs to be slaughtered and judge the carcasses.

Lamb carcasses will be displayed and results of carcass judging will be announced at 11:30 a. m., Saturday, at the show. Thirty-five boys and girls are feeding 114 lambs for the lamb classes. The First National Bank is sponsoring the carcass lamb show and providing trophies for the champion crossbred lamb carcass and the champion finewool lamb carcass, as well as prize money for the top ten lambs in each class.

The regular livestock show will start at 9 a. m., Saturday, January 16 with judging of club lambs (trimmed lambs.) The market lamb classes (show

lambs) will be at 9:30 a. m. followed by the breeding sheep classes and lamb carcass exhibit at 11:30 a. m. The breeding heifer class will be at 1 p. m.; the Angora goat show at 1:30 p. m.; the barbecue supper at 6 p. m.; the auction sale of lambs at 8:30 p. m. and the presentation of awards at 7 p. m.

William "Dub" Day, county agent from Rankin, will judge lambs, breeding sheep and cattle. Stanley Lackey, Angora goat breeder of Roosevelt, will judge Angora goats and Joe Stewart of the Experiment Station will judge showmanship.

Forty-six 4H members will be exhibiting about 258 head of livestock in the show. Members of the livestock show committee are Philip Jacoby, chairman, Armer Earwood, Laurence Finklea, Wallas Renfro, Bill Whitehead, Edgar Glasscock, Herbert Fields, J. D. Cook, Gene Wallace, Corky Schwiening, George E. "Bud" Smith, George Wallace and Norman Rousselot.

Weighing committee members are Bill Whitehead, Bill Morriss and Bill Stewart, and announcing will be Jimmy H. Harris.

Show ring assistants named are Preston Love, Hoot Nix, Turney Fries and Robert Allison.

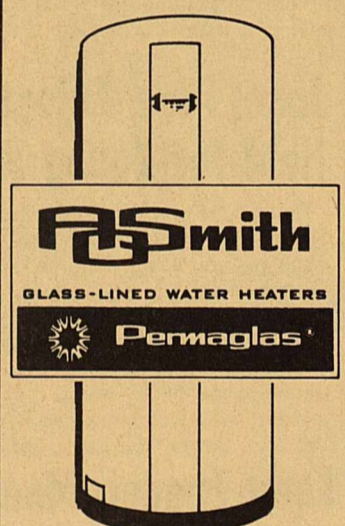

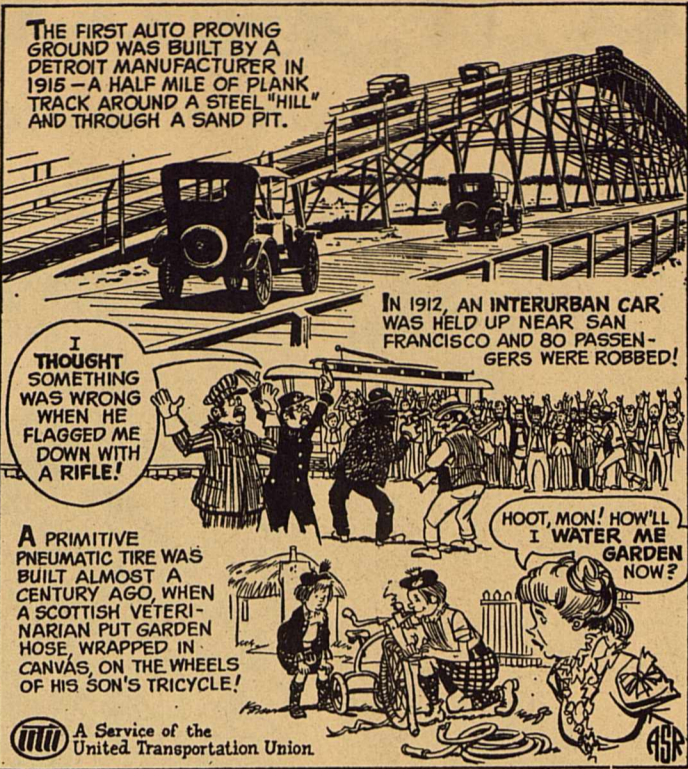

DECEMBER, 1960
Herman E. Moore assumed duties as Sheriff and Tax-Assessor of Sutton county December 31. Moore, who carried the Democratic primary last May, was elected in the November general election and was sworn into office December 30.
Cloudy, damp weather, with slow soaking rain marked the last week of December, bringing the monthly rainfall total to 2.55 inches at the Sonora Wool and Mohair Company. With a long time average of about one inch for December, last month became one of the wettest Decembers on record.
Rainfall during 1960 generally fell very slowly.
Sonora firemen answered two calls during the last two weeks of 1960. Two of the fires resulted in only minor damage, one being only damage to a flue. The third fire was in the home of Mrs. Muriel Hamilton who was vacationing in the home of her son in Washington.
More than 800 deer, including approximately 70 does, and about 160 turkeys had been counted at local storage plants as the 1960 hunting season ended.

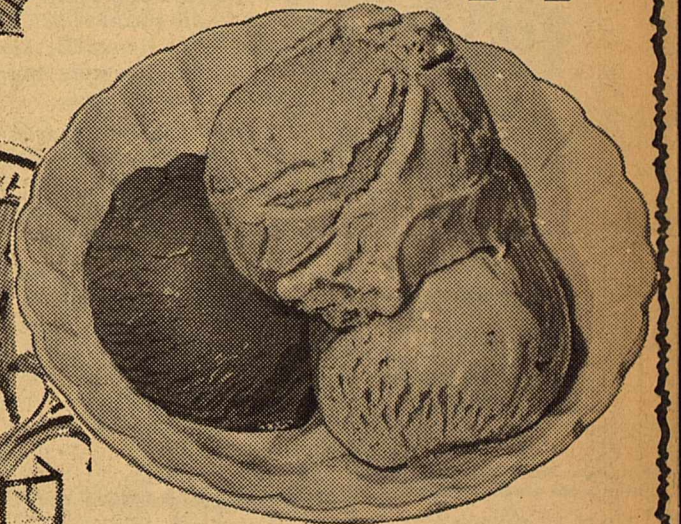

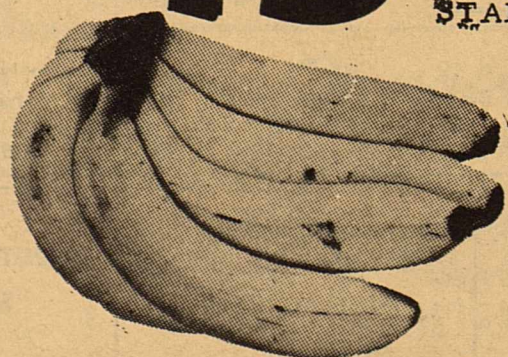
