25-Year Increase In White-Tailed **Deer Gratifying**

by E. B. Keng, SCS Technician One of the gratifying developments in the wildlife field during the past 25 years has been the increase in whitetailed deer. Not only have numbers increased greatly, but deer have spread over a wide

On my way to meet a 6 a.m. bus at San Angelo today, three groups of deer were grazing in the roadway some 10 miles south of Christoval. Deer are frequently seen in the vicinity of Eldorado-a relatively new development.

In 1938 deer in Sutton County were limited to a small pocket in the Vander Stucken-Stewart and Wade area. A few were present on the Mayer T-Half Circle ranch in the western part of the county. Other areas were either completely devoid of deer, or numbers were extremely limited.

Quilting Has Changed Since Grandma's Day

Those who July 16, 1853, and first came know her well would not really be taken by surprise as they might quickly realize that she is merely assembling work for another beautiful quilt. Most persons eighty-four-years old would find it difficult indeed to sit on the floor to create such handiwork-for that matter most women much younger might find it impossible!

Laura Merck Odom was born December 2, 1887, in that part of Sutton County that was then known as the Lost Lake country. The name grew from the discovery of a large body of water by early settlers, but time dried the lake and it became simply "Lost Lake". Her parents, the late Samuel

If you drop in to visit Laura | L. Merck and Mattie A. Smith, The late Mr. Merck was born to Texas in 1872. He lived in Kimble county for a time and moved to this county about 1890, to begin drilling water wells. He served as a peace officer for several years here. Mrs. Odom had ten brothers and sisters, seven of whom are still living. A sister, Mrs. J. B. Renfroe also lives here in the old family home in west

Mrs. Odom married Ban Odom May 19, 1920, and he died July of 1946. They have one son, Sam, and one grandson, Sam M. Odom, Jr. Like most women of her

era, she learned early the art of sewing, baking and quiltmaking. Quilting has certainly come a long way since her mother taught her daughters the art. Quilts were then made strict-

ly for warmth since blankets were not commonly used at the turn of the century. Cotton batting was used between two layers of cotton material, flannel or even scraps of wool material for added warmth. Now most of the quilts are made for the beauty and unique. ness of design. Synthetics have taken over the quilting Filling material of polyester

fibers is exceptionally springy, lightweight, dust-free, completely washable and quick drying. Mrs. Odom says quilting is much easier to do with these lightweight materials than the former cotton batting. Once she has decided on the pattern, she cuts and assembles the embroidery work first. She recently finished a beautiful Iris-patterned quilt and is now working on a daisy design. Large white daisies with green leaves are cut out then sewn on a light blue background with embroidery work finished before the delicate work of the

quilt design is undertaken. Mrs. Odom says she has some of the old style quilting frames that were hung from the ceiling but she prefers to pin the quilt to a twin bed and completes the quilting patterns sitting in a chair next to the bed.

She spends a great deal of

but Sunday afternoons when most people are visiting with families, or following their favorite pasttime, she usually passes the time quilting. Active in the community.

she has been faithful in keeping the library open for the past thirty years at the Woman's Club, where she will be found each Wednesday and Saturday afternnon. Recently she was honored with a clock gift and presented a corsage by the women of the club for the many years she has devoted to the library work. She is also a member of the Order of Eastern Star and a Past Matron of the local chapter.

Remarkably agile and seemingly healthy, she stays busy in this house where she has lived for more than fifty years, where her son was born and where her husband died. She cherishes the ability to continue with activities that keep her youthful in spirit andhappy as well as contented.

A many-colored quilt she recently finished for one Sonoran is known as the "Calico Tree" and another she made is known as the "Tree Of Life". Both are characteristic of her own "tree of life". Fortunate are those who are enjoying her handiwork and are in possession of some of the quilts. Most likely her nimble fingers will continue to create artistically as is evident by the many projects one can see in her home waiting to be started, or those in the process of completion.

Wrong. Despite the impressive antlers, in many cases he may be barely more than a

year old. A buck's rack is a good indicator for judging the animal's health, but it can be misleading to the average hunter.

A white-tailed deer which had poor nourishment when a fawn will develop into a "spike buck," or one with short, undeveloped forked antlers after a year of maturity. Conversely, a well-fed buck might develop into an eight-pointer in one

Therefore, biologists say, it's a mistake to protect spike bucks from hunting pressure. When you protect spikes and kill the larger bucks, you are killing the better brood stock and leaving the inferior animals, they point out.

In a recent nine-county survey in East and Central Texas, biologists examined more than 1,800 buck deer. Three-fourths only 291 were spikes. (Biologists consider an 18-month-old deer a yearling, although ranchers call cattle under one year old yearlings.)

The spikes average weight was only 64. 5 pounds, compared to 72.6 pounds average for the bucks with three or more points.

Spike bucks probably would occur rarely under ideal range conditions. This was apparent







protection and care, deer numbers exploded. Deer are now found in large numbers over practically all of Sutton county, and are rapidly increasing in other counties. Deer are frequently seen now, for example, in Brown and Hamilton counties-where they were never found only a few years ago.

The rapidly increasing population has brought increased hunting pressure, and a corresponding jump in economic returns from deer. In the 1940's only a dozen or so ranchmen allowed any deer hunting, while now probably less than a dozen ranches are not hunted to some extent. The opening of hunting season now brings an army of hunters to townand more leases are needed. Deer compete with domestic

ivestock for range forage. They have grazing habits similar to goats, taking browse, weeds and grass. Deer numbers should be included in range stocking rates, with management to provide good deer

forage year-long.

Brush control plans should consider deer needs for food and cover. Liveoak, shinoak and cedar should be controlled to leave adequate strips of undisturbed brush. This practice will increase grass and weeds and will also increase browse

production in reach of deer.


