New Ball Game Due For Texas Hunters Soon

The 1971-72 hunting season will be a brand new ball game for Texashunters but opportunity for temporary confusion runs riot. Don't be confused! It's going to be simple with earlier game law digests available, to be sure.

The Governor has signed into law a bill to permit hunting from a vehicle. Hunting from a vehicle does not mean hunting from a public road. It does not mean hunting on land without permission. And it certainly does not mean that hunters will be able to take doves or migratory waterfowl from a vehicle. On the permitted list are such native species as quail, deer, antelope, etc. Hunting licenses will go up a

dime, from \$3.15 to \$3.25, the 25¢ to be retained by the license deputy who writes your license.

And if you're in service, and have been in Texas for a period of thirty days, you do not need a non-resident license, but may hunt with the regular \$3.25 resident license. Texas has no non-resident fishing license, so if you live out of state and come to Texas to hunt, the regular \$2.15 license is all that's required.

The Circuit" notes that, "Scientists have... discovered that mosquitos definitely do prefer dark skin to light when looking for a bite. The little rascals go for humans with rela tively high skin temperature,

tion make railroads the most important mode in the movement of high density, bulk commodities... Most agricultural products heavily depend on rail transportation. In areas without access to water transportation, rail is the only economically feasible alternative for the movement of bulk traffic. " -- Reginald N. Whitman, Federal Railroad Administrator.

"Can driving over broken pottles solve an ecological problem?" The Marathon Oil Company reports that, "A 600 foot strip of roadway at the University of Missouri's Rolla campus might provide a positive answer to that question. The roadway, heavily traveled by students, faculty and visitors has been surfaced with 180 tons of crushed glass... Of course, the glass has been mixed with asphalt so tire dealers in the vicinity shouldn't hope for a sudden sales bonanza. The experiment may offer one way to dispose of the waste glass that has become a national

plague. About 720,000 old bottles and jars took the place of the gravel and stone usually mixed with paving asphalt. Researchers will test the resulting product, called glasphalt, for skid resistance and durability. Glasphalt may someday pave the nation's roads while helping to solve the important

In an article I ran across in a newspaper last night, this fel-low Ralph Nader was arguing that Congress ought to pass a law to stop the automobile industry from changing models every year and take the money saved and invent a car that's pollution free.

I'm in favor of pollution-less cars, but I'm not sure Mr. Nader understands the economy of this country. A fast turnover seems to be the key to a boom ing economy.

Take pianos. The piano industry has rocked along for generations without ever hitting on the idea of coming out with a new model every year and as a result it considers itself lucky if it sells a family one piano in a lifetime, and how many people does it employ? Just a few thousand, compared with hundreds of thousands in the auto industry. Piano workers could strike tomorrow and the economy would never know it. Or take the plumbing industry. Have you ever stopped to think how much bigger an industry it'd be, how many more people it'd employ, if it'd convince housewives they ought to change bathtubs every year? It never occurred to the industry all it had to do was change fender designs, add hide-away fawcets and maybe add safety belts.

Also, blacksmiths haven't changed the style of horseshoes in a hundred years, and how many blacksmiths are still around?

Or take probably the worst example, trains. You ever hear of the railroads changing model on engines and passenger cars

Electric heating, air conditioning, humidifiers and de-humidifiers enable you to live in cleaner, more comfortable indoor environment. A variety of air cleaning devices, such as filters in heating and air cleaning systems and electronic air cleaners, remove smoke, dirt, pollen and other impurities from the air you breath.

Exciting new electrical uses offer valuable benefits in protecting our natural resources by reducing pollution. In the future, electric automobiles and electrified rapid transit systems may remove much of the pollution now created by internal combustion motors.

Many other exciting new uses for electricity are on the drawing boards or in the experimental stage. In the near future, electric energy may be increasingly used to dispose of waste, re-cycle waste, remove salt from sea water, and treat sewage. Electric heat and climate control devices may be the means to stimulate the abundworld population.

To continue its present contributions to a cleaner planet and fulfill its future responsibilities, the electric industry will have many technical problems to solve, and research efforts must be stepped up. Electric generation plants must be built which more efficiently deal with adverse effects of discharging heat, gases, liquids and particulates to air and water. And, new technology to transmit and distribute power will be needed in the years ahead, if we are to satisfactorily solve environmental problems.

With careful planning and determined efforts, clean electric energy will be a positive force in protecting and enhancing environment today and for generations to come.

tax deferment, you must fully meet the conditions that the law lays down. For example, your second house must be not only bought but actually occupied within the one-year limit.

In one case, a man moving to another city bought a house that needed remodelling. The work took considerable time, and his family was still living in a rented apartment by the time the year was up.

Nevertheless, he tried to get a ax deferment by arguing that at least his intentions were clear by the time of the deadline.

But a court turned him down. The judge said the law was based not on what a person intended to do but on what he did.

In another case, a man failed to buy a second house within the year solely because of a sudden illness. Was this an acceptable excuse? Again, a court said no. The court said the law "is unambiguous and leaves no room for interpretation because of unfortunate circumstances," adding:

"We are powerless to rewrite the statute.' What if you decide to build a

new house, instead of buying one already in existence? In that case, the law does give you an extra six months' leeway, so long as you have at least started construction within the 12-month period.

One would-be builder bought a lot, arranged a loan, and obtained a building permit - all within the year. But actual work on the house had not yet begun. Had he started "construction" in time to qualify for the tax de-

ferment? Yes. The Treasury decided that, with so many tangible steps already taken, it could not fairly turn him down.




