## **Rainfall Report**

by E. B. KENG, SCS Technician A rainy weekend was indeed welcome to Sutton County residents, even though it was generally far below droughtbreaking proportions. Thunderstorms rumbled around Sonora on both Friday and Saturday nights.

Heavy, runoff producing rains fell on a rather narrow strip along the south and west lines of the Edwards Plateau soil conservation district. Dan Cauthorn measured 5.00 inches, Mrs. John Cauthorn 4.20 and the Hospital ranch received 3 to 3.5 inches for the two day total. The Juno road was closed at several low water crossings. Most of the heavy precipita-

tion occurred in Val Verde and Edward counties. Heavy downpours were reported on the Whitehead and Altizer ranches. Armer Earwood received 2.5 inches, and 4.0 inches fell on the Albert Ward (Cauthorn) ranch.

Rainfall was generally much lighter across the northern two thirds of Sutton county. Most gauges showed slightly over one inch for the two day period. Sonora received about 1.5 inches.


The rain was critically needed to keep the grass green and freshen the vegetation, but good followup rains are necessary to produce any substantial growth.
