Progress on I-10 as it passes through eight states along the southern tier of the nation is reported in the current issue of "Highway User", a quarterly magazine published by the Highway Users Federation for Safety and Mobility in Washington, D.C.

At present, according to the magazine, I-10 is about 63 percent complete. Of its 2, 457 miles, 1, 544 miles are already open and in use. Another 429 miles are under construction: and 484 miles are in a stage where design plans are being drawn and right of way is being acquired.

be eligible to vote. Thus as of July 1, 1971, any registered Quartzite where I-10 is resumed 18, 19 or 20-year-old may vote in any election, federal, state, county, city, or other political subdivision".

In Florida, the magazine reports that a lot of work still needs to be done with only 158 miles open out of a total of 363 miles. From its start in Jacksonville, 1-10 heads due west to Live Oak, where the route comes to a halt. From that point the motorist is obliged to use U.S. 90 through Tallahassee and on to Pensacola and the state line.

In Alabama, there are 66 miles of I-10 planned and 49 of them are already open. Crossing the state line, the car stays on I-10 until a point just east of Mobile Bay before switching back to U.S. 90. The seven-mile viaduct style bridge, that will carry I-10 traffic over the bay is not yet built. Beyond Mobile, the switch is back to I-10 and along the Gulf Coast to the Mississippi line.

In Mississippi, progress on I-10 is slow. Of the 77 miles of superhighway planned, only three are presently open. The motorist is obliged to use U.S. 90 for his journey across the Magnolia State.

In Louisiana, 156 miles are open out of the state's total I-10 mileage of 275. One-hundred miles are under construction. Through New Orleans to Lafayette the motorist uses U. S. 90. Then I-10 is regained all the way to the state line at Lake Charles.

In Texas, there is still much to be done on I-10. Out of a total of 878 miles, 544 miles are open and in use with another 112 under construction. Crossing the Sabine, I-10, passes through Beaumont and on to Houston. I-10 continues from that point to Flatonia where the motorist again switch. es to U.S. 90. After 50 miles, I-10 is again regained for the trip to San Antonio. Heading into the Texas hill country, I-10 heads north west to Comfort, where the switch is to U. S. 290 and short, completed sections of 1-10. Eleven miles

straight ahead through desert country to Alhambra, through Los Angeles county to Santa Monica and the sea.

I-10, of course, is but one of several routes that will make up the 42, 500 miles Interstate Highway System now scheduled for completion in 1977. When it is finished, this network of divided, limited access superhighways will link up all major metropolitan areas, as well as

providing several safe, efficient and convenient routes coast to coast and border to border.

Accent On Health

Texas school children will soon be among the best immunized in the country.

The recent session of the Texas Legislature amended the Texas Education Code to require immunizations against certain childhood diseases as a condition for entering school. 'This new state law will

have great impact on the immunization level of the school population and, eventually, all the population of Texas," says Dr. J. E. Peavy, State Health Commissioner. "We are delighted with the law."

The Texas State Department of Health now has authority to set the rules and regulations for implementation of the compulsory immunizations. The Board of Health has set January 1, 1972, as the date by which all children's immunization series must have begun. School districts that have required compulsory immunizations in the past will still maintain their usual September deadlines for proving immunizations to enter school.

Elementary students will now be required immunized against diphtheria, tetanus, polio and smallpox. If there is no history of measles, that shot will also be required. All children under 12 years of age must also be

immunized against rubella. The number of required immunizations is fewer for junior high, high school, and collegelevel students. Junior high and high school requires immunizations against only diphtheria,


polio, tetanus, and smallpox. College requires full immunizations against polio if the student is under 19 years of age, and immunization against diphtheria, tetanus, and smallpox within the past ten years.

Nearly every student in the state will be covered by this broad law. Immunizations will be required of students in kindergartens that are associated with elementary schools, all the elementary and secondary public schools, private or parochial schools, academies, col-

only children exempted are those with religious conflicts, or medical problems--those that a physician determines would be injurious to health. Dr. Peavy said he "urged all parents to contact their physicians or public health clinics now and begin their children's immunization program long before they enter school."

Still, it is up to the individual driver to do his part -- slow down, avoid sudden stops or manuvers and make sure tires are in good condition.
