Each county clerk records for his given county only, so many producers may need to record brands in additional counties if their operations are extensive. The owner has the right during this six-month period to file the mark and brand now recorded in his name. In the event it cannot be determined from the records who first recorded the brand and mark in

the county, then the person who has been using such mark and brand the longest will have the right to have the brand and mark recorded in his name. It should be noted that it is

illegal to brand livestock without first properly recording the brand with the county clerk in the county in which the livestock are held.

Sentence Set **After Local Youth Enters Guilty Plea**

be recorded or re-recorded as provided by the new law. It is the obligation of the county clerk to assure that no more than one brand of a kind be recorded on the same location on the animal in each county. Therefore, no two people in a county may record the same brand in the same lorequirements of this law govern- cation. It is also the responsi-

bility of the county clerk to make certain that in recording any brand for a person, that the part of the animal on which the brand is to be placed be designated. Failure to do so is punishable by a fineable offense of not less than \$10 or more

than \$50. (Article 1486 P.C.). The Act is published in full in this issue of the Devil's River News.

Motorists Warned Of New Laws

A new State law that went into effect August 30 will no longer permit Texas motorists to stop and then pass a school bus which is loading or unloading children.


Colonel Wilson E. Speir, director of the Texas Department of Public Safety, said the new law, passed by the 62nd Legislature, applies in both cities and rural areas and requires motorists moving both directions on the same roadway with a school bus to stop and remain stopped as long as the flashing lights on the bus are in operation.


Under current law, which applies only in rural areas, drivers must stop for a stopped school bus, but may then proceed around it at a speed of not more than 10 miles per hour if safe to do so.

The new law will not require those vehicles on another roadway of a divided highway to stop, and stops are not required if the bus has stopped in a loading zone of a controlled access highway where pedestrians are not permitted to cross. Speir noted that provisions of

the new law will be strictly enforced to afford maximum protection to the school children of Texas.

Speir called for motorists to avoid drinking while driving, avoid fatigue, and modify their driving speed in accordance with expected heavy traffic conditions.

In an effort to hold the toll down, the DPS and local law enforcement agencies, in cooperation with the news media of Texas, will conduct "Operation Motorcide" -- a public awareness program designed to focus attention on the traffic problem. Special reports on fatal traffic accidents will be prepared at DPS Headquarters and released three times daily during the holiday period which runs from 6 p.m. Friday,

September 3 to midnight Monday, September 6. All available uniformed officers of the Department of Public Safety will be on the highways during the holiday to enforce state traffic laws, and maximum use will be made of radar and breath testing instruments, Speir said.

The Traffic Safety Committee reported to the Governor on drunk driving tests made last month at Pan American Speedway in San Antonio. The tests were supervised by the Southwest Research 200000000

Colonel Wilson E. Speir, director of the Texas Institute's Department of Automotive Research in Department of Public Safety estimates that traf- support of the Governor's Traffic Safety Program. They were an outgrowth of a program initiated by the San Antonio Association of Insurance Agents.

The demonstration revealed that . 10 percent blood-alcohol content, the presumptive limits for intoxication, is entirely too generous," said John Clark, SWRI director. During the tests, professional race car drivers consumed controlled amounts of alcohol and their driving skills were carefully tested. "Three of five drivers were highly intoxicated at the . 10 percent level," Clark said. "The fourth driver's proficiency was severly impaired, and the fifth was making five to 15 times more driving errors than when he was sober," Clark said.

"Although all five were professional drivers, they would have been a hazard to themselves and other drivers had they been on the public highway," Clark concluded.

Homer Conley, president of the sponsoring Insurance Association, said "It is time for lawabiding citizens to become aroused over the drunk driver and the habitual traffic violator, and demand that these irresponsible drivers be removed from the road.

Dear editar: In these days of price freezes couldn't help but get interested in a bill approved by the United States Senate a couple of weeks even before any freeze was announced.

In a bill to control and limit spending by candidates, some of whom spend ten to twenty times as much getting elected as the office pays, the Senate voted a ceiling of "10 cents per voter on the amount a can didate for any Federal office can spend on any kind of advertising".

I don't know that the Senate intended it this way, but it looks to me like they're saying my vote is not worth more than a dime, or if you want to figure it another way, mine is worth ay 2 cents and yours could be

inflated to 18 cents. Either way, they'd still be within the 10cent-per-voter limit.


On the whole, I suppose this is a good bill, but it doesn't go far enough. I'd like to add an amendment.

Not only should a candidate not be allowed to spend more than 10 cents a vote to get elected, but once elected should himself not be paid more than 10 cents for his vote. It's not

only the cost of electing somebody that's high, it's also the cost of keeping him on your side after he's in.

Wool, Sheep Income Averages Told

by D. C. Langford, County Agent been produced by Rambouillet Cash receipts for wool and sheep for the past 31 years as recorded by the Texas Crop and Livestock Reporting Service, reveals that the income from wool averaged 53.1 percent and the income from sheep averaged 46.9 percent for the period.


In 21 of the last 31 years growers income from wool exceeded their income from sheep and lambs.

During the past six years sheep and lamb income has exceeded the income from wool each year but the difference has not been as great as many growers believe.

The past six years average income from sheep and lambs was 56.6 percent and the income from wool was 43.4 percent or a difference of only 13.2 percent.

These figures indicate that wool is still an important factor in determining the overall income from sheep.

Research is available to show that finewool sheep can be selected to produce lambs with desired carcass qualities, size and wool producing ability. For the past two years the top lamb carcasses at the Sutton County 4H Lamb Carcass Show have

The greenish-white seedheads primarily spreads to bare ground which somewhat resemble the or heavily grazed rangelands. whiskers of threeawn or needlegrass, are the "seed" by which burrograss spreads. When the seedheads mature and become dry they break into segments and are easily blown by wind often lodges in small soil cracks

and the seed is already planted when the rains come. Most new burrograss invasions in the Edwards Plateau soil con-

servation district are small, and can be quickly dug, sacked and burned. When patches are too large to dig they may be sprayed with commercial grass

and weed killers such as dalapon, methanearsonate and others. Retreatment to kill grass roots might be necessary. Small spots may also be effectively killed with varsol or gasoline. Extreme safety precautions should be taken if flammable liquids are used.


