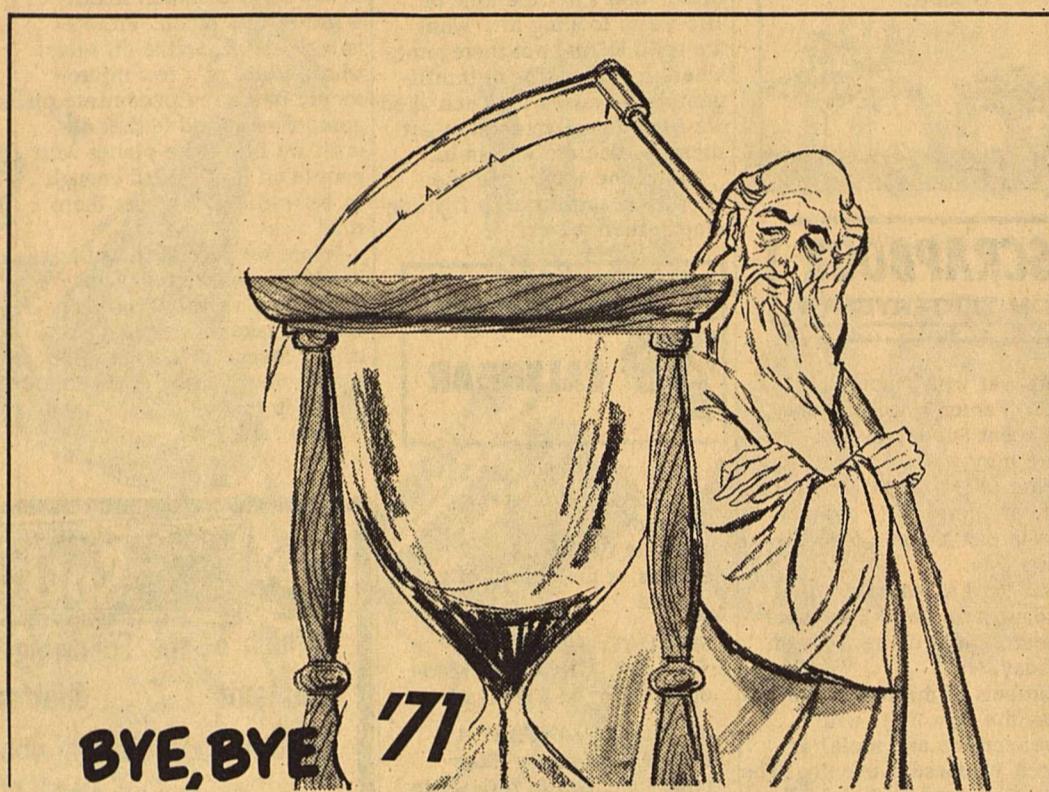

An Ozona mother, Mrs. Margaret Villarreal gave birth to the first child, a boy born in Hudspeth Hospital January 2. Marty Martinez, 20, died December 31, 1970, in Austin of injuries sustained in an automobile accident November 29 at Oak Hill, near Austin.

Sonora firemen elected Darcy Carroll as fire chief for the coming year.

Mr. and Mrs. Alfred Schwiening, well-known, longtime Sonorans, celebrated their 60th wedding anniversary December 30, 1970.

Services were held December 31, for Mr. Victor Garcia Chavez, 92, who died at his home following a long illness.

The 1970 hunting season officially ended January 3, and the Branding Iron Smoke House and Whitworth's Drive in reported a total of over 1,000 deer were placed in storage in the two places during the season.

Santa Fe Railway filed a request with the Interstate Commerce Commission in Washington for permission to discontinue rail service on the line from Tom Green County to Sutton County.

The 1970 Texas Sports Writers Association Class A All-State football team included four players from state champion class A winner, Sonora Broncos. Mike Taylor and Scott Jacoby were named to the first team of defense; Kerry Joy, first team defense, and Sammy Perez, second team defense.

The highly successful record of coaches Jerry Hopkins and Dennie Hays came to a close as they moved to Class 4A Seguin. Their ten-year tenure in Sonora stands 108-23-3, winning three state championships in the Class A division. Sonora won the state title in 1966, 1968 and 1970.

Sutton County 4-H Show And Sale Set January 14-15

The annual Sutton County 4-H Show will be held at the 4-H Center Friday and Saturday, January 14 and 15. The auction sale of lambs will follow a free barbecue lunch at 12 Saturday.

Thirty-six Sutton County 4-H Club members plan to exhibit 201 head of livestock in the show. Twenty-nine lambs or lamb carcasses will be sold in the auction sale and one lamb will be sold in a Chinese auction to raise money for 4-H club activities and the 4-H Center.

Other 4-H activities supported by funds raised at the annual show and sale include a junior 4-H Horse Show, 4-H Ball, District and County 4-H Camp, State 4-H Range Camp 4-H Round-Up, 4-H Achievement Banquet, State 4-H Center and many other special 4-H activities.

The 4-H show and sale is the only fund raising activity of the Sutton County club.

Judges for the 1972 show will be Crawford Mitchell, Rocksprings, Angora Goats; James A. Gray, San Angelo, breeding sheep and W. M. "Dub" Day, market lambs.

Gray, along with Dr. Frank Ors, College Station, Bill Sims of San Angelo and Allen Turner of San Angelo, will judge the carcass lamb classes. Col. Don Cooper, former Sutton County 4-H club member from College Station, will be the auctioneer. He will be assisted by Herbert Fields, Jimmy Harris, Lin Hicks and Nathan Donsky.
