

Ted Dallas Fish has earned 'Distinguished Student" ranking at Texas A&M University, announced registrar Robert A. Lacey.

The undergraduate honor is awarded students who have excelled academically. Recipients must earn at least a 3.25 grade point ratio (out of a possible 4.0) during the grade period.

In addition to a 3.25 or higher GPR, a student qualifying for "Distinguished Student"

honors must have been enrolled in a minimum of 15 hours and have no grade lower than a "C" 'Distinguished Student" ranking is limited to 10 percent of Texas A&M's undergraduate enrollment.

Seeks Reelection In 25th District

Senator W.E. (Pete) Snelson of Midland announced that he is a candidate for reelection to the Texas Senate from the 25th District, which includes 35 counties in West and Southwest Texas.

Senator Snelson is currently serving as President Pro Tempore of the Texas Senate and as such is second in line of succession to the office of Governor. He served as the acting Governor of Texas on two occasions last year when the Governor and Lieutenant Governor were absent from the state.

"I am seeking to return to this office on the basis of my record of service to the people of the area and state," said Senator Snelson.

"Representing the largest sen-atorial district in the nation and its diversity of interests is a challenging and rewarding experience, and I am grateful for the confidence which the people have expressed in my past service," said Senator Snelson.

"The Sample Case" notes that batteries lose a lot of their power when they get cold. So much, in fact, that a healthy, fully charged battery at 80 degrees will have only 65 percent of its power at freezing, and only 40 percent at zero. To keep your battery up and in top shape, the publication recommends the following: keep the top of the battery clean; be sure the cables are free of corrosion (a greenish-white buildup that is easy to see); coat the connections with grease or other corrosion inhibitor to prevent this build-up, and make certain the engine is in good condition. Even a strong battery cannot start an engine that needs a tune-up.




