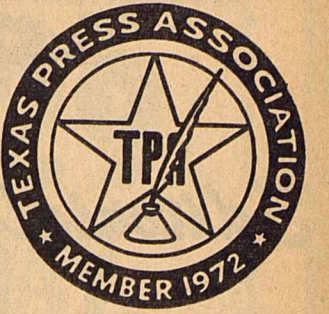

School Year Draws To Close With Grad Exercises Fri.

High school days end for the 47 seniors Friday night at 8, when diplomas will be awarded at graduation exercises to be held on the campus lawn.

Ric Hill, president of the senior class will preside. Junior class president, Teddy Coker will give the invocation, and he will be followed by Jessie McCutchen, third highest ranking student, who will address the assembly.

Rick Street will present the salutatory address, and Joe Nance, valedictorian, will give the main address. Nance had a four-year average of 95.761 ending Street who had a 95.625 average. Miss McCutchen, high ranking girl, ends her high school career with a 94.027 average, followed by Marilyn Morgan with 93.52.

The presentation of honor awards by James Pollard, high school principal, will precede certification of the class by Ken McAllister, superintendent of schools.

City Of Sonora Early-Day Mayor Dies In Washington

Mr. W. C. "Bill" Gilmore died May 21, 1972 in Sequim, Washington, following a lengthy illness. Memorial services were held in Sequim with burial following in Sequim Cemetery.

Mr. Gilmore was born August 4, 1900, in Carlsbad, New Mexico, and the Gilmore family moved to Sutton County in the early 1920's. He served as the city's first mayor when the city government changed from an aldermanic form of government to a commissioner form of government July 5, 1925. He served until 1928 and was reelected mayor in 1932, serving until 1942.

During the years he lived here he was president of the Sonora Lions Club and a charter member of the club. A member of Dee Ora Lodge, last month he was honored with the presentation of a 50-year membership pin.

Mr. Gilmore was a veteran of World War II, serving in the South Pacific with the Seabees. He was manager of the local West Texas Utilities at one time.

He left here in the mid-'40's and moved to St. Paul, Minnesota, where he lived for eight years, then moved to Sequim, where he has lived since that time.

Survivors include his wife, Helen; three daughters, Mrs. L. M. Roueche, Jr., of Hobbs, New Mexico, Mrs. Larry Shultz of St. Paul, Minnesota and Mrs. James D. Trainer. He is also survived by eight grandchildren and three great-grandchildren.

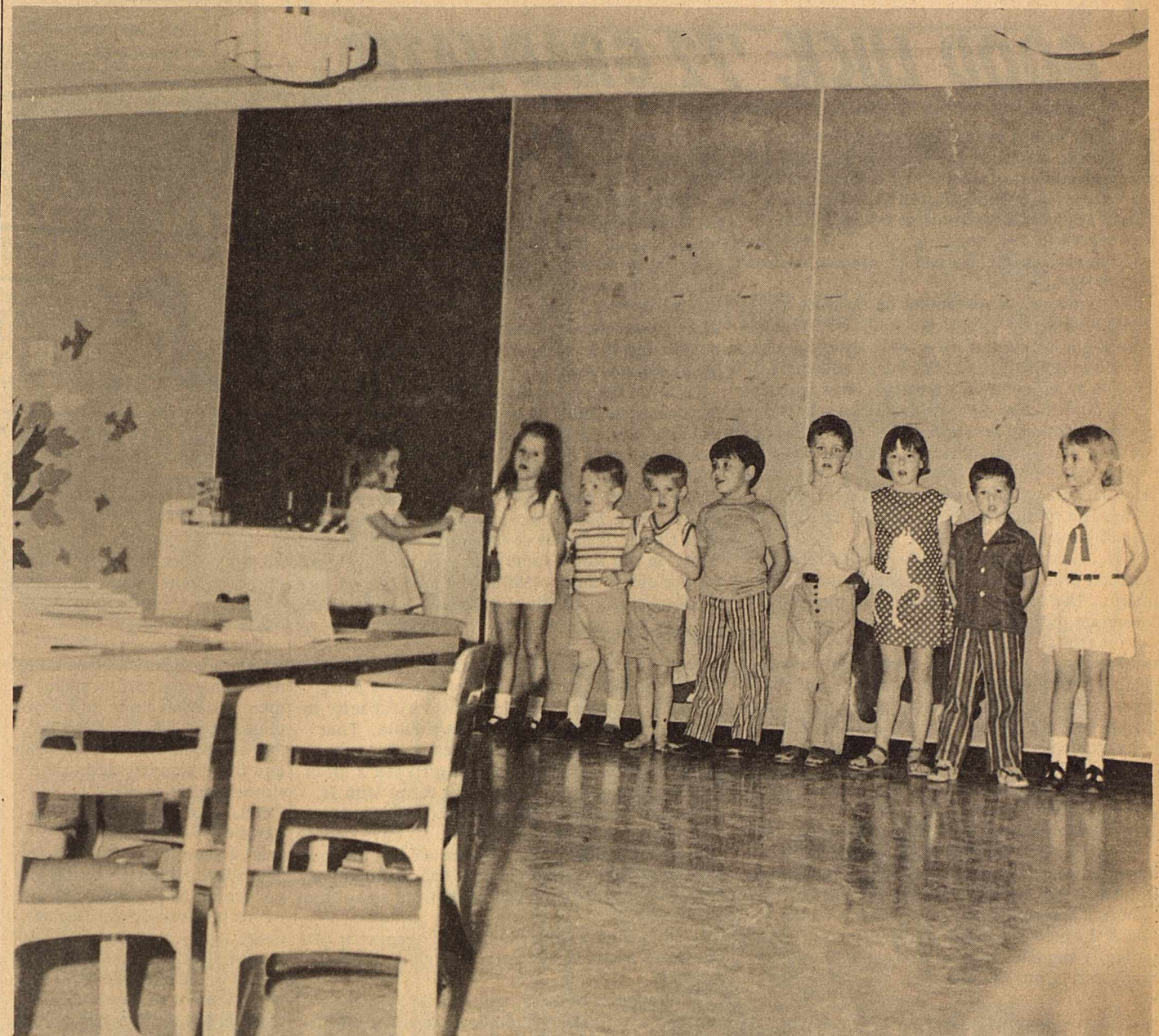
New Teachers Approved At Board Meeting Monday

TS&GRA President Allison Urges Screwworm Control

Officials of the Texas Sheep and Goat Raisers' Association, noting that screwworms pose a greater threat to the U. S. livestock industry than at anytime since the eradication program began in 1962, are calling on all Texas livestock producers to check their sheep, goats and cattle more closely to help stop this most serious outbreak.

Sutton Allison of Fort Stockton, TS&GRA president, said temperature and moisture conditions all over the Southwest are ideal now for the rapid increase of screwworm populations that are moving in from Mexico.

"The situation is critical," Allison said, noting that more than 1,045 cases of screwworms have been reported for the year through April, compared with only 639 cases for the same period of time during the high-

est count of any other year since the program started. "Livestock producers in areas that haven't had screwworm cases in years must now take every precaution to protect their animals," Allison said. "Only we producers can help stop this serious threat to our industry," Allison said. "We have stopped screwworm threats before and we can do it again. We are the ones that have the most at stake."

Lone Star Asks Local Rate Increase

Lone Star Gas Company today asked the city of Sonora to increase local residential and commercial natural gas rates by approximately 4% to enable the company to earn a reasonable rate of return on the fair value of properties used to serve the public, according to M. D. Geiser, Jr., Regional Manager.

The application for rate increase listed increased cost of buying gas, higher property and equipment costs, increased costs for employee compensation, higher interest rates on borrowed money and increased taxes as primary reasons for the income deficiency.

"In addition," stated Geiser, "Lone Star has a commitment to its customers to vigorously compete for supplies of natural gas to keep its reserves in a favorable position. While other sections of the country are ex-

periencing some shortages of natural gas, Lone Star has maintained favorable supplies. The gas cost adjustment portion of the application placed before the City Council today, continued Geiser, "will help Lone Star maintain its favorable gas supply position and assure our customers of natural gas service for the future."

Approval of the company's application would increase the average monthly residential gas bill by approximately 28¢, he added. Lone Star serves more than 900 customers here.

GOOD LUCK, '72 GRADUATES

Another school year filled with educational assignments and so many achievements for this group of graduates especially, coupled with extra-curricular events is rapidly coming to a close. Many of these students entered elementary school in 1960 together, and have progressed to the scholastic plateau of graduation from Sonora High School.

Each graduate is embarking on the first level of adulthood. Up to now the student's life has been a gay mixture of days and nights of laughter and song, balanced with books and study. They have enjoyed bull sessions, cross country races, and studies along with parties requiring dress-up clothes, as well as the informality of sweaters and jeans. Quizzes, term papers, exams, band concert, many football games, track meet... all combine to round out the joyous life of each student, and all are a great part of growing up.

Now... comes the seriousness of decision... decision that will effect and determine the rest of life. The many things that have seemed all important during school year, soon become almost trivial. The worlds of college, work and establishing a place in the adult realm require mature attitudes, emotions, control and much more thought than has been required heretofore. Things begin to change rapidly and growing up comes quickly to some, and not so quickly to others.

All of which brings to mind the following taken from the book "Words to Live By": "Meet Trouble As A Friend" by Isabel Leighton "A little more than 20 years ago I spent a treasured afternoon with Justice Oliver Wendell Holmes at his Beverly Farms home just north of Boston. Lingered on the threshold as I took my leave, I asked if I might publish some of the typically rugged, earthy observations he had made during our tea together.

With a firmness that built the gentle smile dancing at the corners of his mouth, he replied, "In my more than 90 years I have never allowed myself to be quoted, nor will I revise my pattern at this late date. But write your interview,

child, and if, after 20 years from my going, anything I have said still seems to serve a useful purpose, it is yours to do with as you wish."

During those hours, two decades ago, we spoke of many things: the granite on which he built his home—and his life; the bayberry bushes he never tired of seeing from his windows; the mystery stories he devoured; and, finally, more dismal matters. Was he not deeply concerned, I asked, over the depression, threats of war and the matter of security in the world? He shook his head indulgently.

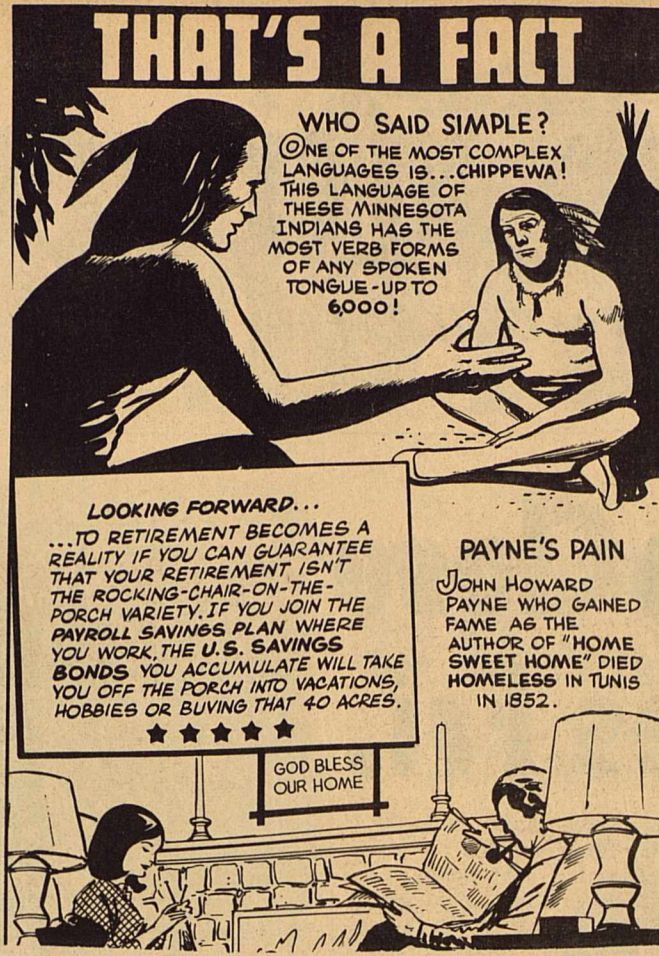
"Oh, you young people, you think you have discovered trouble. If you want to live without trouble, you will have to die young! One thing is for sure, it is that trouble has always been with us and always will be.

"Terrifying, you think? Rubbish," he scorned, "it has never faded me. Be almost grateful for it at times. It makes us one with every human being in the world—and unless we touch others, we are out of touch with life. You might as well be dead as stop growing and if you are unwilling to feel, yes, feel, deeply, you are only halfway alive.

"If I had a formula for bypassing trouble, I would not pass it around. I would not be doing anybody a favor. Trouble creates a capacity to handle it. I do not say embrace trouble. That is as bad as treating it as an enemy. But I do say meet it as a friend, for you will see a lot of it and had better be on speaking terms with it. "No, trouble is not the scourge of the world. The world has its ups and downs. So have people and all the specifiying that breath can produce will not change things or make the millennium come an hour sooner. You cannot run away from trouble."

He smiled now more benignly. "Accept it. Do not worry about it. Have faith—and do the needful."

So, graduates of 1972, go with God's speed and when you are knocked down encountering trouble (and you will encounter it) let's hope that you can learn from your errors and the experience. All you need to do is get up and start over again.

Editor's note: The Dry Devil's Philosopher on his bitterweed ranch on Dry Devil's River seems alarmed over a trend he claims he's spotted.

Dear editor: It's hard for me to figure out, but as I understand it a new problem has arisen in this country which a lot of people haven't noticed because when you've got as many problems as we've got a new one has to wait its turn to get recognized. We're probably two or three hundred behind now, backed up all the way from Sonora to Washington and points east.

The new problem is, where to hold a national political convention. Nobody seems to want one.

It's a fact. The Republicans first decided on San Diego but were frozen out and then had to change to Miami Beach, and when they did the Mayor, Police Chief, and the people of San Diego generally cheered happily, as though a tornado which had been sighted coming their way had suddenly veered

Coming on down, what'd happen if... whoa, I won't go any further as this might get too close to home.

Anyway, you see what an unsettling thing it'd be if nobody wanted any politicians settling down in their town, temporarily or permanently. What would we do with them?

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A Bishop Looks at Life

A DREAM REALIZED

By Everett H. Jones, Retired Bishop of the Episcopal Church

Crete—In August 1966 Mrs. Jones and I read an article in "The New Yorker" by Joseph Alsop headed "Kato Zakro." It told in detail about a new archeological discovery at the eastern tip of the Greek island at Crete.

The author had visited the site of this newly-found ancient place together with Dr. Nicolas Platon, senior Greek archeologist in charge of the excavation, and Mr. and Mrs. Leon Pomer-

ance of Great Neck, Long Island who has helped to finance the project.

He wrote of the excitement he found "in the slow, painstaking recovery of the forgotten human past from the protecting, all-concealing earth." He made us want to see this relic of a brilliant period 3500 years ago! This dream has now been realized.

Elm Leaf Beetles Now Active

Homeowners with highly valued elm trees in their yards should keep a watchful eye on the trees to spot infestations of elm leaf beetles, suggests County Agricultural Agent D. C. Langford.

The beetles are a serious pest of elm trees as they eat the surface of the leaves, leaving only the veins. The skeletonized leaves turn brown and eventually fall from the trees. The damage weakens the trees and makes them more susceptible to borers that attack elms.

The adult beetles are oval and about a quarter of an inch long. They are yellowish to olive-green in color with a black stripe along each side of the wing covers.

The beetles lay yellow eggs on the undersides of elm leaves. Full-grown larvae are about half an inch long, dull yellow in color with black stripes on the back, and have a distinct black head.

Although many insecticides will kill the adult and larvae beetles, the major problem is through coverage of infested trees, points out Langford. Trees often have to be sprayed several times because there are at least three or more generations of beetles a year.

High-pressure, high-volume sprayers are necessary to completely cover the foliage. Some degree of control can be obtained by spraying the trunk and lower limbs when the larvae move down to the ground to pupate.

For information dealing with chemical treatment of elm leaf beetles, single copies of L-199, "Texas Guide for Controlling Insects on Ornamental Plants" are available at county Extension offices, adds Langford.

We tried to make careful preparations. A friend gave us a copy of Dr. Platon's handsomely-illustrated book "Zakros" just published by Scribner's. We had a helpful interview in Athens with Dr. James Wiseman of the University of Texas, who teaches at the School of Classical Studies and also supervises digs at Corinth and in Yugoslavia. We were fortunate to have some time with Dr. Stilianos Alexioudis, director of the Museum in Heraklion and overseer of all excavations on Crete.

After settling in the attractive and unspoiled resort town of Aghios Nikolaos, we secured a small car and began thru minor excursions to get the feel of a gear-shift machine on the Cretan mountain roads. Then we set forth on the three-hour journey to our goal.

The drive was often hair-raising but always beautiful. To one side were the mountain slopes covered with olive trees and occasional vineyards; on the other side we looked down on the waves as they crashed on the jagged coast.

Kato Zakro is a tiny fishing village with a population of 12 persons. It is a secluded place, open to a spectacular harbor with protecting rocky arms on either side. As we drove down the last bit of bumpy, winding road we thought we had never seen a more beautiful place. In our mind's eye we could see the ships of that Minoan king who once lived here as they sailed forth to Egypt, Asia Minor and the Greek mainland.

All visits of this kind require informed imagination, and that is why preparation is so essential. While the excavation is still incomplete, we could identify the great central court of the palace, the central sanctuary, the apartments for the king and queen, and many less important auxiliary rooms. Some other palaces found on Crete are larger, but already this excavation covers 240,000 square feet.

To see the advanced stage of artistic skill achieved at the palace it is necessary to visit the Zakros Room at the Heraklion Museum. Here the bits and pieces found at the dig have been put together by experts. The result is an impressive display of such treasures as sanctuary rhytons, vessels used for pouring ritual libations; delicate chalices, pottery of exquisite shape and varied designs, and a frieze that once adorned a palace wall. There is an old song, "I dreamt that I dwelt in marble halls." We feel, in some mysterious way, we have dwelt in this Minoan palace dating back 1500 years before Christ!

Crop Reports From Farmers Needed

During the last half of May, some 22,000 Texas farmers will receive a crop acreage questionnaire from Charles E. Caudill, Agricultural Statistician for the Texas Crop and Livestock Reporting Service, Austin.

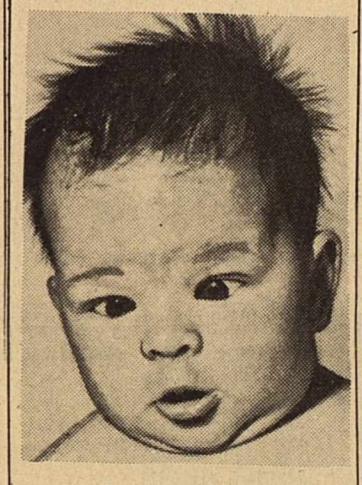
This information will be the basis for determining the planted acreage for the State of Texas and for each county. There are 254 counties in Texas, and reports are needed from many farmers so that each county will be well represented. Accurate estimates are of great importance to farmers in planning production and marketings and in providing an unbiased picture of Texas agriculture.

The Texas Legislature has provided a program of estimates for each county. Texas covers such a wide area that State totals alone do not provide adequate information on Texas' most basic industry—agriculture. This is a cooperative effort of USDA's Statistical Reporting Service and the Texas Department of Agriculture.

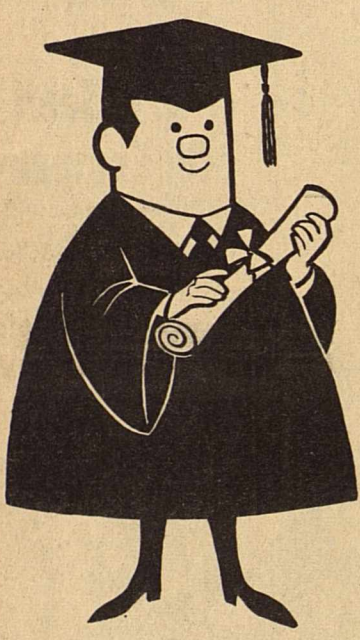

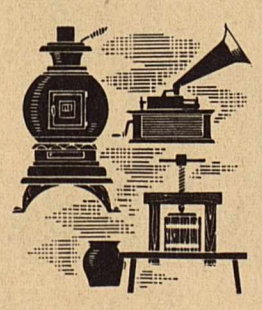

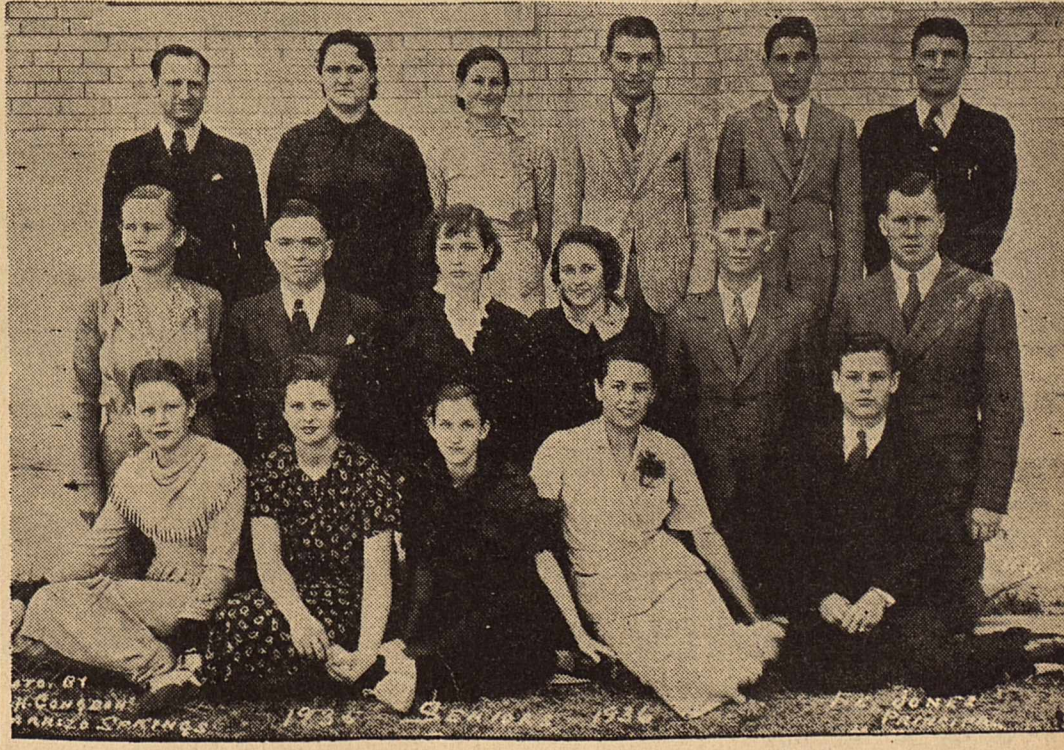
