



show such little fear of persons. The female bird was discovered on the concrete floor of the fireplace. It seemed a little frightened, but never fought back. She was perfectly calm -her plummage was a beautiful black with a shade of brown. Scientific information shows the Swift to be one of the most graceful and tireless fliers. Because it lives entirely on insects it is among our most valuable birds. They fly tirelessly all day returning at night to the chimney, cave, cliff or hollow tree, where they normally live in colonies or roost in flocks. Their odd nests of sticks are cemented together

with saliva. Some of the nests are almost entirely made up of saliva, as are the bird nests of eastern Asia which people eat.

In perching, the swift, or Chaetura pelagica, clings to the wall with its feet and braces

The odd nest was given to the Biological Department of Angelo State University, presented by Mrs. H.D. Hardlan of San Angelo, after Mr. Babcock had given it to her. Mrs. Hardlan and Babcock are doing some work at the college.

Babcock says that further research work is yet to be done on this beautiful bird and its habits


Probation Officer Sought For Area

Why Me ? By Everett H. Jones Retired Bishop of the EPISCOPAL CHURCH

"Why did this happen to me?"

A Bishop -

Looks At Life

This is a question we all ask at some time. We may ask it out loud or we may brood on it in our own souls. We may ask it about an illness, an accident, or a sorrow. We may ask it about a fire that destroys our home, a business failure, or a thankless child.

In some ways it is an unanswerable question; it is a part of our finite human condition that we do not understand all the mysteries of God's universe. However, there are some an-

swers that help toward understanding and acceptance. It is important, first of all, to reject certain false answers. One of these is that God has singled out me for punishment.

Father revealed to us by Jesus Christ. Jesus' own life is proof that suffering comes to the best as well as to the worst of God's children.

Another wrong reaction is for me to feel that my suffering means God does not love me. Long ago Job struggled thru this problem and came to a deeper faith in God despite his affliction: "Though he slay me, yet will I trust in him."

The very wording of this question, "Why me?", reveals a false assumption that because I believe in God I ought to be spared the ills that come to others. Nowhere in God's word is there such a promise. Indeed, we might well reverse the question and ask, "Why should such a thing not happen to me?" Why should I not share in the fellowship of







Why are young people the greatest victims of accidental poisoning? The pre-school child has an inquisitive nature. Closets and cupboards are great places to hide and investigate. A child will taste, bite and swallow anything he can reach, and teething time calls for chewing on furniture, toys and window sills.

At about the age of two, a child will take to "mountain climbing", using stairs, tables or stools to open medicine cabinets and other reachable places Accidental poisonings don't just happen. They take a special mixture of factors which normally have a formula which reads: A contributing thing, plus a contributing surrounding,

plus a contributing individual. The result of this formula is Many of us are unaware of the

potential dangers of medicines and other household substances. Even salt and pepper may produce an injurious or deadly effect when used in large amounts. A five-year-old youngster in Rhode Island died after swallow ing about two tablespoons of ordinary pepper. In another tragedy, a 22-month-old baby died after inhaling a large amount of talcum powder.






