The current recession has slowed growth of state tax revenues in nearly every state. As expected, politicians and bureaucrats in states without personal income taxes use the opportunity to "prove" that an income tax is necessary for the continuation of essential state services. Texas and Florida are the two largest states without an income tax; the other income tax free states are Alaska, Nevada, South Dakota, Washington, and Wyoming. Connecticut, New Hampshire, and Tennessee do not tax wage or salary income.

Certainly an income tax will fuel the expansion of state government. Based on the experiences of the eight most recent states to adopt an income tax, we can expect that adopting even a modest 3 to 4 percent state tax on personal income will increase state spending over 20 percent over the next decade. So if expanding the size and scope of state government is the goal, an income tax is a very effective way to achieve it.

But a state income tax is also a strong prescription for slowing economic growth. Taxing income discourages individuals and families from undertaking additional work or more demanding jobs, adding to their savings or investments, undertaking the risk of new enterprise, or expending more time and energy in generating new income. These disincentives are accentuated in state taxation because individuals and firms confronting state income taxes have the option of migrating to states without income taxes or initially locating new enterprises in these states.

A computer simulation undertaken for the Texas Public Policy Foundation estimated that a Texas state income tax would reduce personal income 8 to 9 percent below otherwise forecast for the year 2000, an annual loss of nearly \$40 billion to the citizens of the state.

Whatever the problems confronting Texas state government, they are certainly not caused by lack of tax revenue growth. State tax collections rose 98.6 percent from 1980 to 1988, while the cost of living rose 43.5 percent in that same period.

But if Texans are convinced that additional revenues are required, user fees and consumption taxes will have a much less damaging effect on the economy. The often-repeated argument that consumption taxes are regressive overlooks the fact that sales taxes in Texas and most other states exclude food, shelter, and medical costs-items that account for over 70 percent of the expenditures of low income families.

Of course, revenues from user fees and consumption taxes do not keep pace with state spending during economic recessions. Largely for this reason, politicians and bureaucrats regularly seek a more "elastic" source of revenue, that is to say, one that allows them to keep up spending during good times and bad.

But if American families must do a little belt-tightening during recessions, we might expect state governments to do the same. Indeed, a recession presents an opportunity for policy makers to undertake some serious government cost-cutting. Political leaders in Texas, Florida, and other states stand at crossroads. They can use the current budget squeeze to impose new taxes on their people, or they undertake the much more difficult task of making state government more efficient.

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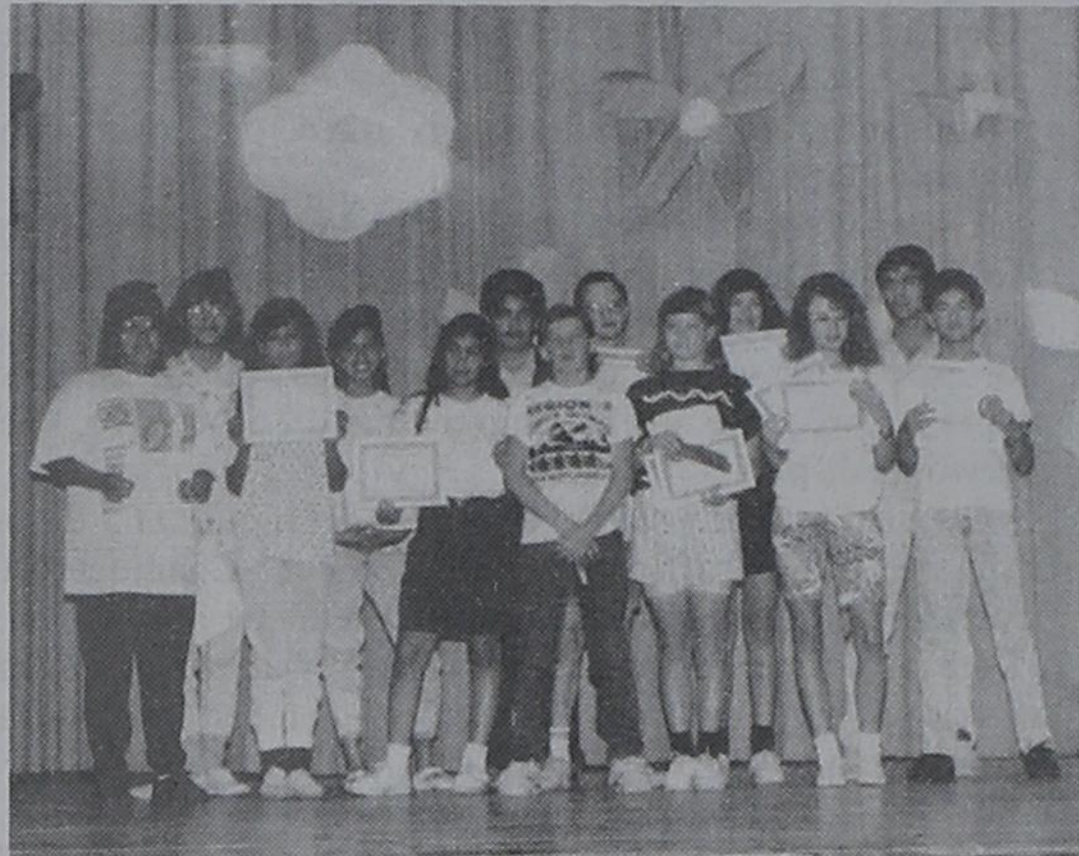
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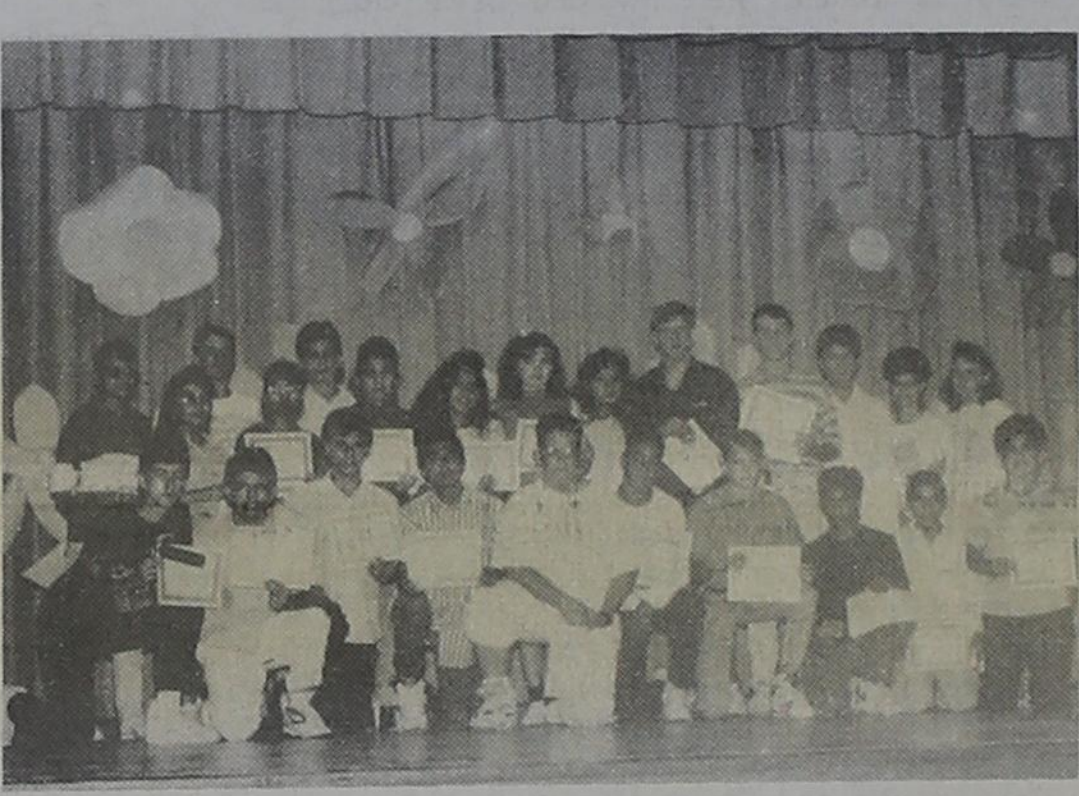

Delegates To Attend Confab

More than 1,000 United Methodists will gather June 3-6 at Polk Street United Methodist Church in Amarillo for the 82nd session of the Northwest Texas Annual Conference.

The event, an annual meeting of clergy and elected lay delegates from United Methodist congregations, is the official business and policy-making session for the denomination in the Northwest Texas area.

Delegates from the Bovina congregation will be Bob Owen and Durward Bell.

Highlights of the event will include election of eight delegates--four clergy and four laity--to the 1992 General Conference. The General Conference, held every four years, is United Methodism's top policy-making body.

In addition, ten representatives, five clergy, five laity--will be chosen as delegates to the 1992 South Central Jurisdictional Conference, set for July 13-16 in Fort Worth.

At 7 p.m., Monday, June 3, by Bishop Louis W. Schowengerdt, area bishop of the Northwest Texas/New Mexico Area since 1980, will address the conference during the service of worship. The giving and receiving of new pastoral appointments for 1991-92 will also take place during the worship service at Polk Street UMC, located at 1411 S. Polk Street, in downtown Amarillo.

A conference-wide celebration and rally are set for Tuesday, June 4 in the Amarillo Civic Center, expected to draw thousands of United Methodists from across the Northwest Texas area. The Festival of Sharing will be held from 4-7 p.m., featuring booths and tables highlighting United Methodist ministries from the local to national levels.

The Vision 2000 Rally will begin with a hymn festival at 7:15 p.m. in the Civic Center auditorium, followed by the rally at 7:30 p.m. A 250-voice choir, composed of vocalists from Amarillo and the surrounding areas, will be featured.

The service of ordination and consecration will be held Wednesday, June 5 at 7:30 p.m. Three persons will be consecrated as diaconal (lay) ministers, four will be ordained deacon and 11 ordained elder during the service.

Featured preacher for the annual conference will be Dr. Joe Harding, director of evangelism and church growth ministries with the United Methodist board of discipleship.

The church growth specialist is author of the new denomination-wide Vision 2000 program, being used nationally by annual conferences in United Methodism, as a vehicle for strengthening local congregations as they move into the 21st century.

Screening Program Scheduled Locally

The Breast Cancer Screening Program of the Don and Sybil Harrington Cancer Center and High Plains Baptist Hospital of Amarillo will continue community outreach clinics for early detection of breast cancer.

Funding is available through the Texas Cancer Council for screening mammography for Texas residents qualifying for financial assistance.

Early detection of breast cancer is the major goal of cancer control for each woman seen in the clinic. The clinic provides low cost screening which includes a breast exam by a Registered Nurse trained in breast cancer detection, teaching of breast self-examination and a mammogram.

Currently, the most effective method known to win the battle against breast cancer is early detection. Early detection is best done by following the guidelines recommended by the American Cancer Society for breast cancer screening for women who have no signs or symptoms of breast cancer. The guidelines are:

1. Learn and perform breast self-examination every month.
2. Have a physical examination

every year.
3. Have a mammogram according to the recommendations by age. Ages: 35-40, one baseline mammogram; 40-50, a mammogram every 1-2 years; over 50, yearly mammograms.

A clinic will be held in Friona on Wednesday, June 19, from 10 a.m. to 2:30 p.m. at the Parmer County Community Hospital. Exams are done by appointment only. 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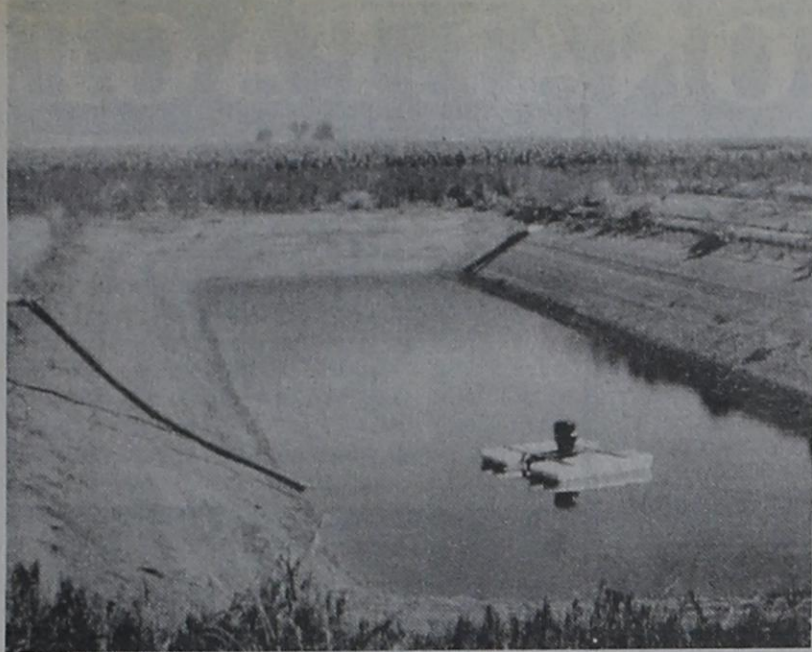

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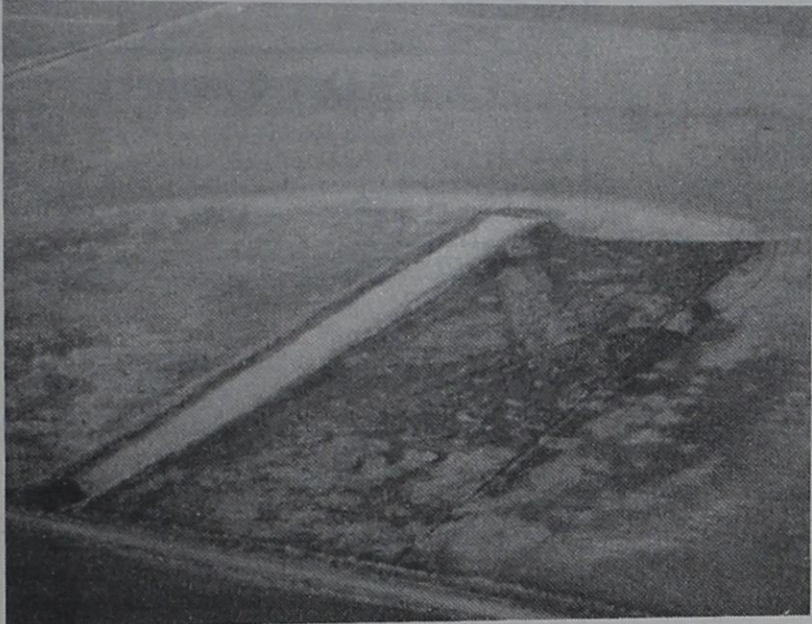

Tailwater Pits, Lakes Stop Waste

Approximately 1,444 tailwater return pits and 1,289 modified playa basins are currently being used to capture irrigation tailwater and rainfall runoff for reuse within the 5.5 million acre High Plains Underground Water Conservation District No. 1 service area, according to a recent district inventory.

Deaf Smith County leads the water district with 451 tailwater return pits, followed by Parmer County with 338 and Castro County with 309.

There are approximately 300 modified playa basins in Floyd County. Castro County follows with 263 modified playas and Parmer County has 186.

Excess irrigation water, or "tailwater," running off the end of a field has been a serious concern of the High Plains Underground Water Conservation District No. 1 since its creation in 1951. The primary cause of tailwater were furrow runs in excess of about one-half mile which required large flow rates to literally "push" the water through the furrows.

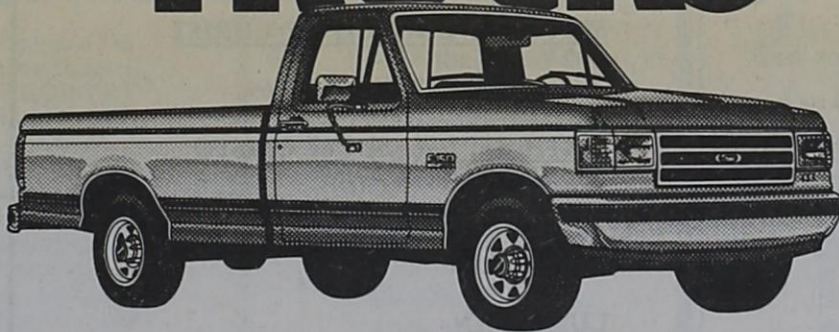
In the mid-1960s, the water district constructed V-notch weirs and placed them in county bar ditches to measure actual tailwater losses. Flood gauges installed in front of the weirs measured the height of the water flowing through the weir. Signs showing the conversion of the inches of water passing through the weirs into gallons per minute were placed inside each installation.

The district's study concluded that as much as 20% of the volume of water pumped by an irrigator could be lost as irrigation tailwater. In addition, it was discovered that tailwater waste encouraged soil erosion.

Since then, the district has actively promoted the use of tailwater return systems to stop accumulation of silt in bar ditches, flooding of county roads, damage to neighboring fields and to conserve precious groundwater resources.

The water district designed and constructed several tailwater return demonstration systems in the 1960s. Public tours of these demonstration systems was one method used by the district to promote the adoption of this water conservation technique. The positive results obtained from these first tailwater return pit installations convinced many irrigators to install and use tailwater return systems on their farms.

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Home Owners To Receive Assistance

The Farmers Home Administration (FmHA) has implemented a new program to assist rural residents to become successful home owners.

In addition to its direct housing loan program, the federal agency is now authorized to guarantee commercial loans to purchase single-family housing. "This expands our ability to provide financing for homes in rural areas," notes Sox Johnson, FmHA state director.

Under this new program, FmHA guarantees a loan made by a qualified lender against a percentage of possible loss. Loans may be made by any lender, including state housing agencies, which is approved as a mortgagee for federal housing mortgage insurance. Additionally, lenders approved by FmHA, the Federal National Mortgage Association (Fannie Mae), or the Farm Credit System may qualify for the program.

FmHA is authorized to guarantee up to \$100 million in loans for single-family homes during the current fiscal year. This assistance is available for new or existing rural housing, located on individual tracts or in subdivisions.

Many rural residents eligible for direct FmHA loan assistance may also qualify for the guaranteed loan program. Applicants with low to moderate incomes may be

eligible for loan guarantees, and low-income applicants may qualify for the agency's interest assistance program, which brings down the cost of the monthly payment.

Applicants must be without safe, decent and sanitary housing and unable to obtain a loan without the FmHA guarantees at rates and terms they can reasonably be expected to repay. "Loans may be guaranteed for up to 100 per cent of the cost of acquiring the house," said the state director.

Individuals interested in the new guaranteed loan program should contact their commercial lenders or the local Farmers Home Administration county supervisor.

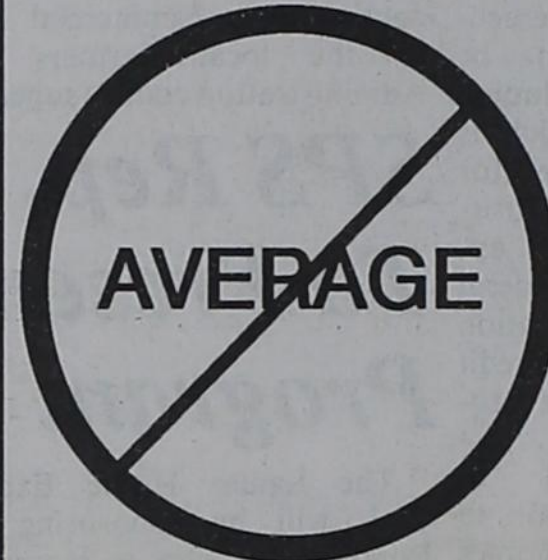

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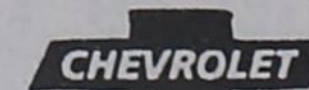

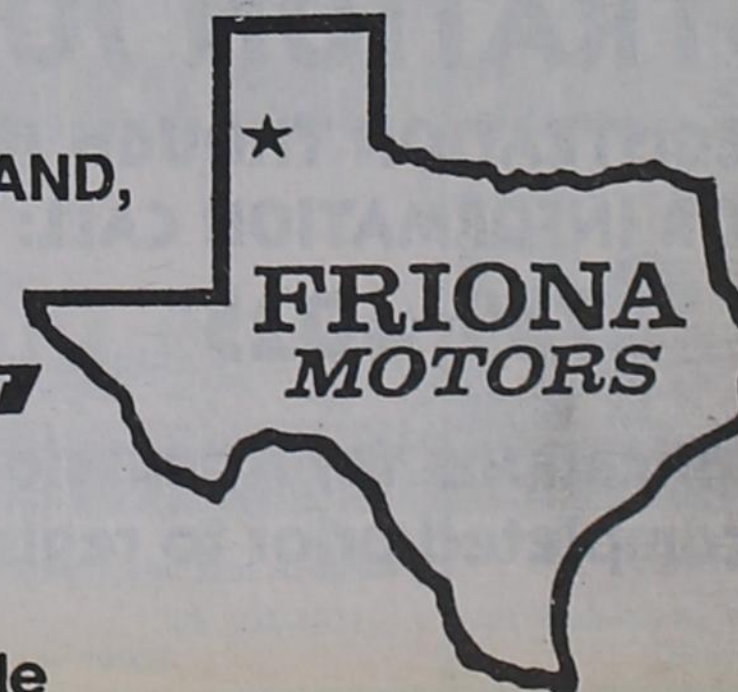
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
