

Final Rites Held For Gunshot Victim **Robert Bermea**

Final rites were held here Saturday for 27-year-old Robert Bermea, who died of gunshot wounds inflicted during an argument over a minor traffic accident in the parking lot of a night spot in San Jose,

A former resident and son of Mr. and Mrs. Alfred Bermea, the San Jose News reported that Bermea died at 1:15 a.m. Monday on the operating table at Providence Hospital in Oakland.

He had been shot in the chest. abdomen and wrist by Marcus L. Garcia, 51, of Hayward, California, according to police, who booked Garcia for investigation of murder. The incident began about

10:30 Sunday night during a break in the band's playing at El Torero Club, a Mexican-American night spot, where Bermea was a drummer. He also directed the eight-member "El Macho" (The Male One).

Bermea had parked in a noparking zone, and during the break went out to try to find a legal parking spot. He was driving around the lot slowly when his and Garcia's car collided, slightly denting the Garcia car.

The drivers both got out and began arguing. As the argument heated up, Garcia allegedly pulled a . 38 caliber revolver and fired three times, police

San Jose police said two other band members were with Bermea at the time. They ran into the bar and asked for help. Bar patrons chased Garcia through the parking lot. When they caught him, they threw him to the ground and began kicking him, according to the San Jose News account.

A former resident, George Hamilton, vice-president of LaCoste and Romberg, Inc. and one of the engineers of the firm helped to design a device that was a part of the Apollo 17 flight to the moon last Wednesday. He is the son of Mrs. Muriel Hamilton and a brother of Clayton Hamilton. that." The Austin firm was organized

in 1939 by a University of Texas professor and one of his students. They have manufactured a "gravity sensor" which forms part of the payload of scientific instruments which were left on the moon by the astronauts. The device was manufactured under a sub-contract with Bendix Corporation of Ann Arbor, Michigan, and described as a sensing device for the Bendix-

manufactured gravity meter left on the moon. It is approximately three inches long, two inches wide and two inches high, and has two purposes. Its first job is to measure the

difference between gravity on the earth and that on the moon. moon and test it.'



Currently, some 248 million acres of forest land are set aside in wilderness areas, national parks and other restrictive classifications that exclude wood product management.



Or think of how many cases suing politicians for falling down on their campaign promises. I've got a handful now if I can find a lawyer


who'll take them on a percentage basis. There are many other possi-
