A. Z. Joy Receives Award in Nevada

A. Z. Joy, Cooperative Extension Agent in White Pine County, Ely, Nevada for the past 13 years, was recently among those honored by the National Association of County Agricultural Agents. He attended the local schools and is a son of Mr. and Mrs. Artie Joy. Joy received the association's highest honor, the Distinguished Service Award, at the annual awards banquet climaxing the group's yearly meeting held November 6-9 in Atlanta, Ga. The Nevada agent and his wife, Vivian, were on hand during the banquet for the awards presentation.

In receiving the award, Joy joins a select group of about two percent of the association's total membership of over 5,000 that are so honored each year. He was nominated for the honor by the Nevada county agents recognition and awards committee and by Dr. Joseph F. Stein, associate director of the Cooperative Extension Service, College of Agriculture, University of Nevada, Reno.

Top achievements registered by County Agent Joy that contributed to his being honored included his participation in bringing electric power to the largest remaining unserved area in the continental United States. The project, a major part of which has just recently been completed, provides power to a number of rural areas in White Pine and Eureka Counties of Nevada. He assisted in organizing an electrical co-op through REA financing and helped in obtaining a 15.1 million dollar loan. Additionally, Joy has compiled a long list of notable achievements that have contributed to the betterment of the livestock industry not only in his county but statewide.

In recognition of these and other efforts Joy has been honored a number of times previously. The Nevada Farm Bureau named him outstanding Nevada county agent in 1970. The National Wool Growers and the United States Post Office Department recognized him in 1971 for his effort in the first commemorative stamp to the wool industry. His outstanding work for the sheep industry in Nevada earned him recognition in 1970 by the Nevada Wool Grower's Association. He has also been accorded a number of other awards.

Joy obtained his BS degree in animal husbandry, 1955, from the University of Wyoming and followed this in 1957 with a MS in agricultural economics, also from Wyoming. He has held a number of offices including president of the Nevada County Agent's Association, and has served on the western region public relations committee for the national.

He and his wife and their children, Yvette, Trudie, Bret and Robbie Anne live in East Ely, Nevada.

Literature Course To Be Offered

Smith Neal, high school English teacher, has announced that if the school board approves in the January 15 meeting, he will offer a course in eclectic literature for adults. 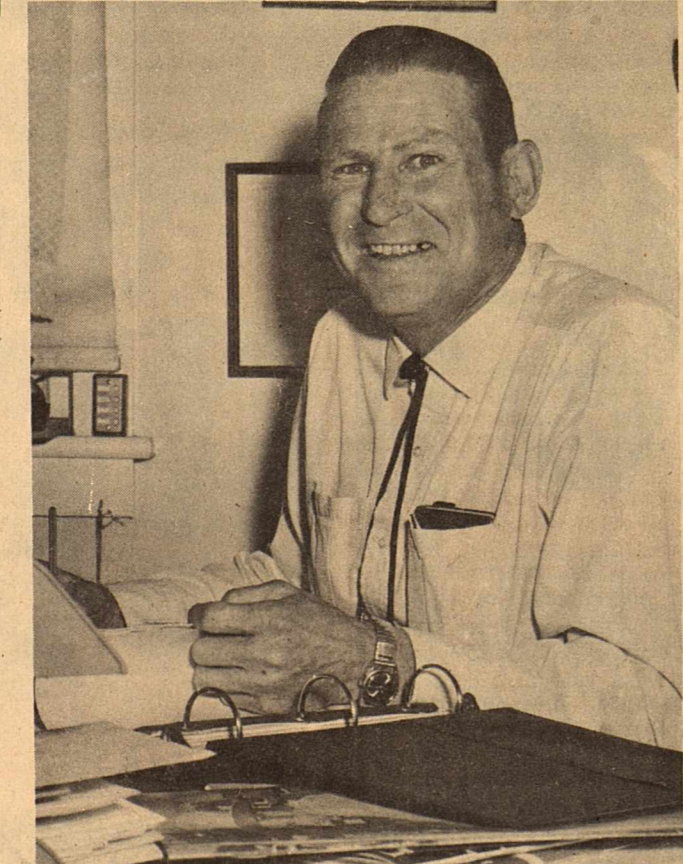

Sonora High School track team placed second overall in the Ballinger meet with 68 points.

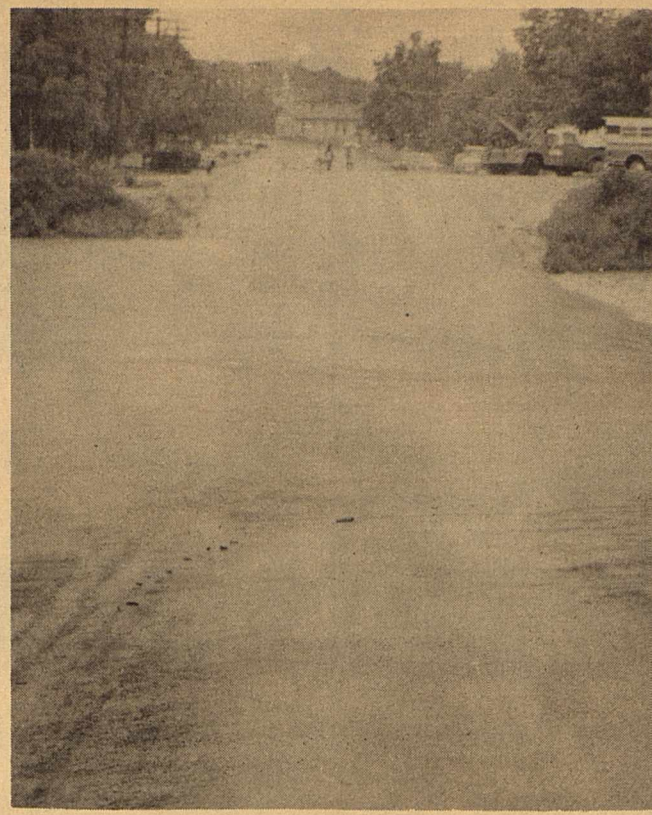
From Coffee Break-It's nice to report that 15 persons visited the Junior High School during Public School Week, and a total of 81 visited the elementary school.

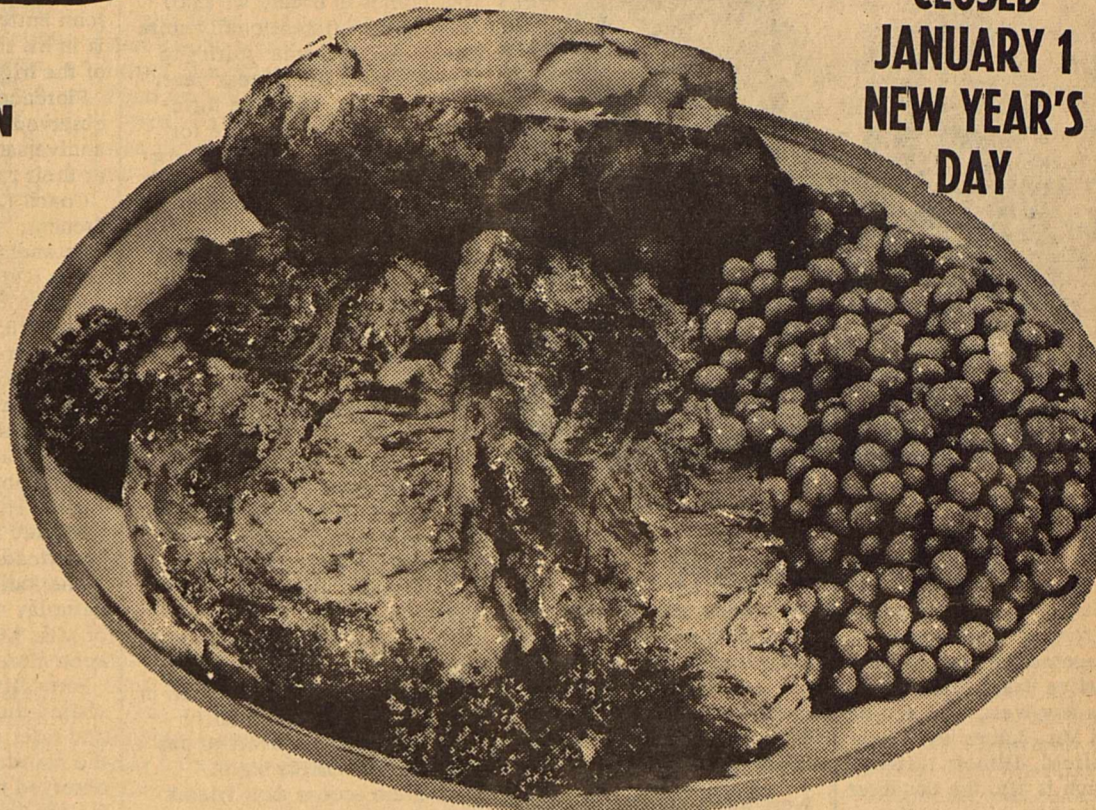

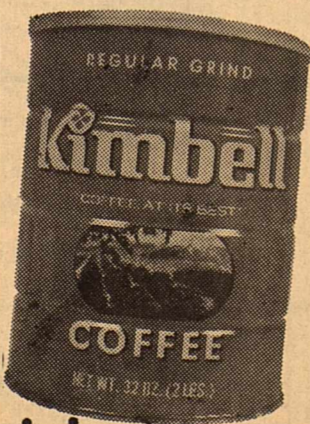

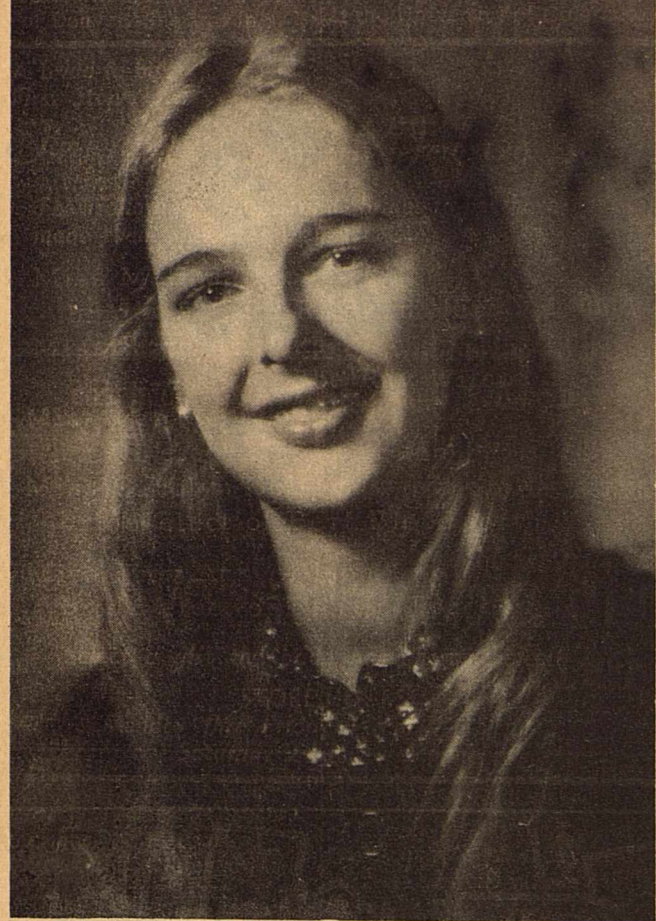

A Bishop Looks at Life

Must Christmas Die?

Retired Bishop of the
Episcopal Church

One of the great dangers facing all of us is that as we clear away the Christmas decorations, take down the tree, and put our homes in order, we shall also quite unintentionally store away the Christmas spirit—to be taken out again next year.

It has always seemed fortunate to me that our date for celebrating the birth of Christ is followed so quickly by the beginning of a new year. This sequence ought to help us start out on a new level, with new goals, as the beauty of Christmas lingers in our minds.

If we mean seriously to keep Christmas alive one step we can take is to remember what makes Christmas the great feast that it is.

Almost all the things we do in this holy season are related to the fact that God put His love in outward and visible form. "The Word became flesh." So our presents, our cards and notes, our visits to those we have neglected are ways of putting our love in action. Christmas is continued when in our family and community life there is new effort to put caring into visible form.

In these recent days friends have told me what joy they have had in doing things as a family. In one case it was going to the woods for the Christmas tree; in another designing a family Christmas card; in another tapping creative resources in the family to make presents for each other. Christmas is continued when there is a rebirth of family solidarity, a recognition of the wonder and joy that we are born into families—just as Christ was born into a family at Bethlehem.

It is not enough in these days of rapid change and shifting moral standards for children to have only fleeting and casual contacts with their parents. There is need for regular times of being together for fun, for listening to each other, for mutual support and understanding. There has never been greater need for a maturing young person to go into the world knowing who he is and what he stands for.

One of the great memories for many of us is that we celebrated Christmas together as a family in God's House. This may be the best way of all to see that Christmas remains alive throughout the year.

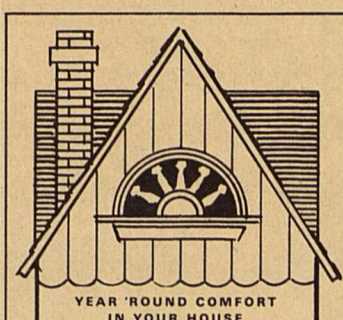
