

The idiot box, known in polite circles as a television, has certainly had a marked impact on our society. It has transformed us into a nation of non-readers. It has also sharply curtailed the capability of imaginative visual ization. You do not agree? You are invited to look around you. Try to use the language above the two to three-syllable street level words and see how many young (or adult) people you can talk to. You'll find yourself a linguistic loner.

Take a look at the best seller to the laborious third-grade read anybody who can stretch his con-scandals, graft in high places ing technique an average house-fusion out over a full week is wife uses to read any best seller ity to attract her attention. There are exceptions, of course but those obscene, brutal fiction books did not get on the best seller lists because other books outsold them.

Even more appalling is the in tellectual level of television advertising. Look at it from a detached objective standpoint if possible. Do a little thinking about what the level has to say about the intelligence of the population it is directed toward We can look at a few specifics.

At last, by implication, after ten thousand years of search, man has found the aphrodisiac. It is smoking cigar tobacco wrapped in cigarette paper.

There is though, a fleeting impression that the logical choice ty and intrinsic value would have been the baby cat. The cruelty is evident when you con-thing other than shedding a little sider that the ad implies anyone light on human nature. can take on the esthetic appeal of the actor by smoking.

Is our national pastime, as implied, fondling toilet tissue? That is repeated so often it leaves that impression. We sit back and look, and wonder where all the sexual deviates come from. We raise heck about basis of his theories? pornography, but we let rubbish like that be heaped on developing minds hour after hour and never raise a finger.

What sort of social behavior is advocated as acceptable for your children? Making all possible mouth noises when eating cereal? Beautiful behavior for a sty, but somewhat questionable for the dining room. Day after day such rubbish is poured on the American children.

Look at the advertising position or social habit. For example, a young girl climbs into a car with a stranger and climbing out when he shifts incorrectly. Certainly it is not a procedure conducive to longevity in Boston, judging from their newspapers. Still, there it is on national T.V.

Unfortunately, there are certain inalienable laws which govern man. As a former professor of mine used to put it, "Man operates in an arena governed by three principle rules: 1. Man is universally lazy, and works out of necessity, not desire. 2. Nature is niggardly, it is mathematically impossible to get something for nothing, but the converse is easy. (If you ever think you are getting something for nothing--watch out you are about to be cheated). 3. The material wants of women are unlimited. 





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Game And Fish Law Hearings

Coming Up Tues. Sonora outranked all other Texas hunters and fishermen have approximately one billion dollars invested in their equipment, and soon they will have the opportunity to put their voices where their money is.

The opportunity will come when Texas Parks and Wildlife Department officials hold public hearings in counties across the state concerning changes in laws affecting fish, game animals and fur bearing animals. The meeting here will be held at the 4-H Center, Tues-

day, March 27, at 10 a.m. Clayton Garrison, executive director for the department, said the hearings are the first step toward setting the coming hunting and fishing regulations. The proposals will be set forth at the hearings, and citizen comments will be invited.

Detailed reports of the hearings will be submitted to the Texas Parks and Wildlife Commission. The reports will be used by the commissioners when they are considering changes in game and fish reg-

ulations. Garrison said department officials are hoping for a good tum-out at the public hearings. 'Citizen participation at these hearings is absolutely essential if we are to get a full picture of many variables affecting fish and wildlife programs," he said. "We sincerely urge anyone interested in our fish and wildlife resources

to attend these local hearings.

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
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
