\$5,000 Payment On New Classrooms Approved At School Board Meeting

A payment of \$5,000.00 was approved as partial payment on new classrooms to Ray Construction Company at the meeting of the Board of Trustees of Sonora Independent School District. The meeting was held Monday evening at the office of the superintendent.

Karla Mallonee was approved by the board to teach at the elementary level. Discussion was held regarding the employment of Mr. Wayne Garner as first assistant coach and high school teacher. The hiring was tabled until previous records are received and approved.

In other action by the board, the contract of West and West to collect delinquent taxes was approved; transfer of funds, ap-

proved; school and athletic insurance with Southwestern States General Agency, approved; Mrs. Bill Bundy's request for withdrawal of teaching position, approved; participation in the National School Lunch program, approved; purchase of three roasters for school cafeteria, approved; summer work projects, within budget, approved, and floor tile for new classrooms, was also approved.

Reports were heard from the Mexican American Advisory Committee, from Bob Snodgrass on needs of the science department, and from Bill Bundy, who reported on the athletic program, and his recommendations on the same.

Official recommendation was given to coaches and to band director John Butterfield, for a job well done in their respective groups.

The corrected budget for 1974-75 was presented to Ken McAllister who requested earlier in the meeting that the budget hearing be held in July.

It was also mentioned at the meeting that the equalization board will meet at 9 a. m. on June 11.

Soil Stewardship Week of Observance Schedule Special Services May 19-26

Soil Stewardship Week, a nationwide observance which emphasizes man's responsibility to protect and conserve soil, water and other natural resources, will be May 19-26 this year, W. B. McMillan, Chairman of the Edwards Plateau Soil and Water Conservation District, announced Monday.

This year's theme, "A Different Place", emphasized how the many changes now occurring in the nation affect our continuing responsibility to be good stewards of the land," said McMillan.

All churches in Sonora are scheduling special soil stewardship services.

The district sponsored a conservation tour for the local ministers at the Lea Roy Aldwell Ranch on April 24.

Mr. McMillan cited the energy shortage, environmental pollution, and the growing concern over land use as examples of changes and developments affecting the use of America's natural resources.

"We hope," said McMillan, "that during Soil Stewardship Week, millions of Americans will pause for a moment to consider their responsibility for the protection and use of the Lord's earth."

The district will provide local churches in Sonora with bulletin inserts, and copies of this year's observation booklet. The material was prepared by the National Stewardship Advisory Committee of the National Association of Conservation Districts. The advisory committee is composed of churchmen of different

faiths.

Nineteen-seventy-four will be the 19th consecutive year that the Edwards Plateau Soil and Water Conservation Districts, along with almost 3,000 similar districts throughout the nation, has sponsored soil stewardship week.

The custom of setting aside special rogation days for this purpose began more than 1,500 years ago in France, when French prayed for help after crop failures had brought widespread hunger.

The students were presented with a certificate in acknowledgement of achievement.

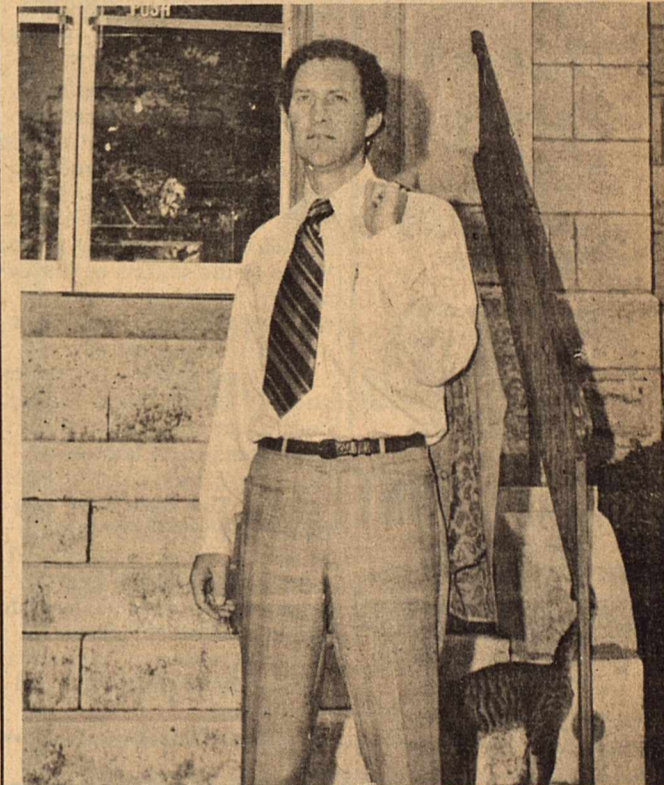
Juliet Wells Dies In San Antonio

Grand Jury Indicts Six

Six persons were indicted when the Grand Jury of the 216th Judicial Court of Sutton County met May 7.

Among those indicted was Steve Vargas, charged with possession of marijuana. He was charged with the offense in early April, along with two other Sutton County men, when the trio was apprehended following information received by the local sheriff's office,

regarding a cache of marijuana hidden in a culvert off Interstate Highway 10.

Others indicted by members of the Grand Jury were Jackie D. Harris, charged with carrying a pistol on licensed premises; Jesse Galinda Martinez, aggravated assault; Israel Sanchez, aggravated assault; and C. W. Browning and Robert Pleau, both on charges of worthless checking.

Six cases were no-billed by the grand jury because of insufficient evidence. Among these six were the other two previously charged in the marijuana possession charge, along with Vargas. The cases of Billy Greer,

charged with theft of a goat; and Charles Elvin Bishop and Charles Waters Scott, both charged with possession of cocaine, were passed on by the jury.

TAPES! TAPES! TAPES! Being hard pressed to find evidence to sustain an impeachable offense against the President, both the Senate Watergate committee and the House Judiciary (impeachment) committee have relied largely upon the hope that taped recordings of private confidential conversations between Mr. Nixon and members of his official family, might reveal something the impeachment group could hang on to.

Responding to the clamor for tapes, the president had 1300 pages of his chit-chat with subordinates transcribed, and furnished copies to each Congressman and the news media. The public can buy copies.

The results? Both good and bad, depending on interpretations and the viewpoints of those who read the material. Some think the conversations tend to bolster a case against the President; others think otherwise. Privately, some of the pro-impeachment Congressmen concede the taped evidence is inconclusive and is more exculpatory than incriminating; others, dead set on impeachment with or without tapes, read all sorts of inferences into the recorded dialogues.

One thing the tapes confirm is that President Nixon had no advance knowledge of the Watergate burglary, and showed shock and disgust at such stupidity. And although there are signs during some of the conversations he may have suspected something was going on, like coverup activities, it was not until March 21, 1973 that more details were given to him, and he then learned the names of some of his aides who had been involved. He then removed the suspects.

The tapes could also be used to indicate a conspiracy among White House staffers and subordinates, designed to prevent the President from finding out about coverup activities.

The issue will be debated to and fro, up and down. The impeachment committee, with 42 impeachment lawyers on its payroll, hasn't started hearings yet. This thing may drag on for another two or three months... which is bad for all concerned. There is every reason the committee, now that it has substance of all the material requested, should analyze what is before them and take a vote.

A TERMINAL ILLNESS

One day after his thirty-fourth birthday Dr. Thomas A. Dooley died in New York City. He was a victim of cancer but a victor over the tragic circumstances of his life.

Dr. Dooley gave himself unreservedly to the very end in behalf of the destitute people of Vietnam. When he heard the verdict "malignant" he refused to stop his work, explaining his action in this way: "The words of Camus rang through me. 'In the midst of winter, I suddenly found there was in me an invincible summer.' Maybe I could not be tender in a better way."

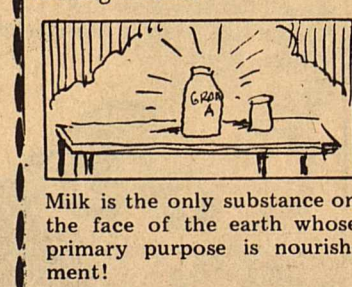
It has been pointed out that each one of us has a terminal illness. It is called "living." Sooner or later the life we know in its present form will be over. All of us face the questions Dr. Dooley faced: What shall I do with the time that remains? How can I make the most of it?

Robert Frost must have had these questions in mind when he wrote these lines: "The woods are lonely, dark and deep, but I have promises to keep, and miles to go before I sleep, and miles to go before I sleep."

The essence of victorious living is the resolve to keep the promises we have made to our best selves and to God. It is to rise above every temptation to escape, to despair, to give up the journey.

Once a person decides on the quality of life he is determined to live the matter of quantity becomes unimportant. He does not dread the termination, he does not fear, for his mind is on higher things.

The late Archbishop of Canterbury, William Temple, put the faith of a Christian in a memorable statement: "The Lord does not promise that anyone who keeps His word shall avoid the physical incident called death... but death will be irrelevant. It may be truly said that such a man will not 'experience' death, even though it will happen to him. It will matter to him no more than the fall of a leaf from a tree under which he might be reading a book."



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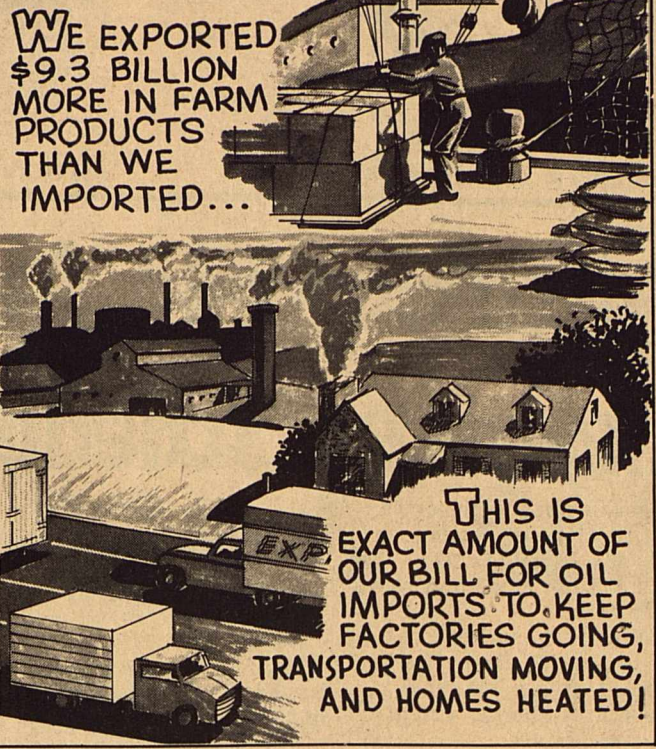

Viewpoint

Capitalism is a strange economic system spawned by Christianity, or at least they have a common ancestor. It is based on the principle of free enterprise, involving investing one's capital in hopes of receiving more assets than were invested. A gamble? It could hardly be considered otherwise. The odds? Considering that two out of three new businesses fail, the odds could hardly be called anything but two to one against the gambler. A poor bet at best, but it is the basis of the whole system.

The stock market is the same thing, but in that instance the gambler bets on somebody else's business. The real value is not in the stocks, but in the public opinion of them, influenced by politics, diplomacy, the interest rates, and alas, unguarded mutterings in major brokerage houses. A gamble? Precisely, on the order of a blind deaf mute playing mumblety-peg for money. True money can be made, but the risk is ever present. I have made some bets, at my broker's suggestion, which would have been more beneficial if I had gone to Churchill Downs and placed a win bet on a three-legged jackass.

Ranching? In the environment of fluctuations of cattle and natural fiber prices, spirals of feed prices, variations of rainfall, parasites, bitterweed and a long list of others it would have to be considered a long shot. Considering at best the return of 3-4%, gamble is too loose a word. It is more like shooting craps in a Kankakee, Illinois clip joint using "house" dice.

The point? It is that every American is steeped from childhood in the theory of free enterprise capitalism. From the richest to the poorest, we are capitalists, and we are faced by continual examples which say "You cannot make it big by work alone, but must risk your assets to gain a margin of increase." So, to a man, we go down and put our assets on the line, in hopes of a gain, more often than not realizing a total loss. Are we deterred? We are not! All we know is an economic system based on a gamble. There is always another time, so we go down, and bet our capital on another enterprise with the degree of risk we face decreed by our available capital and our personal economic objectives. If this characteristic is stifled, capitalism is as dead as last year's turkey. Risk is the lifeblood.

We the Texas voters, have just decreed that betting (risking our capital for gain) on horse races in Texas is illegal. Does that deter it? Go to the small races in our substandard tracks in Texas and watch the drunks waving a handful of fifties and draw your own conclusions. If that does not convince you, check with your area "bookie" who replaces his bets with organized crime--they both salute us for our support, clip our betters on odds, and vanish in the event of heavy losses. Judging from history, gambling cannot be restricted in one area--it can only be driven back into the environs of organized crime as a lucrative subsidy.

In our rejection of pari-mutuel betting, how much money are we talking about? It is estimated at 60 million, but let's look at that. Suppose you go to Ruidoso for three days and lose \$60 at the track. Motel bill \$75, food \$40, amusement \$30, and incidentals, \$10 mount up. It becomes apparent that the betting is only a drop in the bucket. A better estimate might be a 250 million dollar drain on Texas. When this is considered, you can see why the people of Arkansas, Louisiana, and New Mexico are laughing at the astuteness of Texas voters. It is just roaring, peeling, side-splitting laughter--all the way to the bank.

In the gambling environment of capitalism, I'll make you a bet. When a Texas state income tax comes, as come it must if we keep rejecting such lucrative sources of state revenue, the loudest screamers will be those who voted against pari-mutuel.

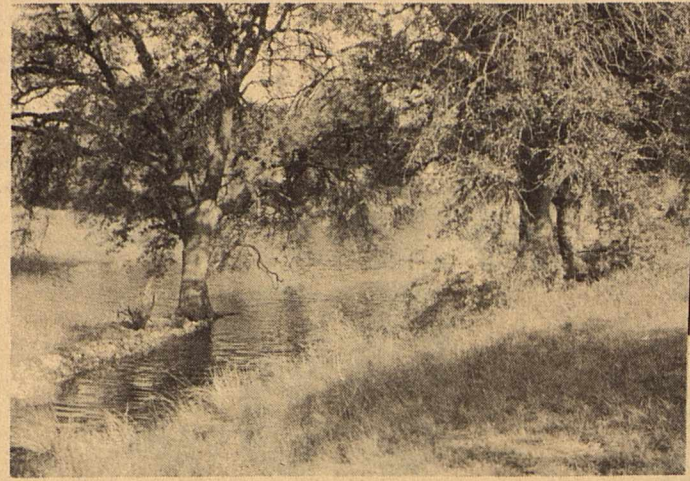

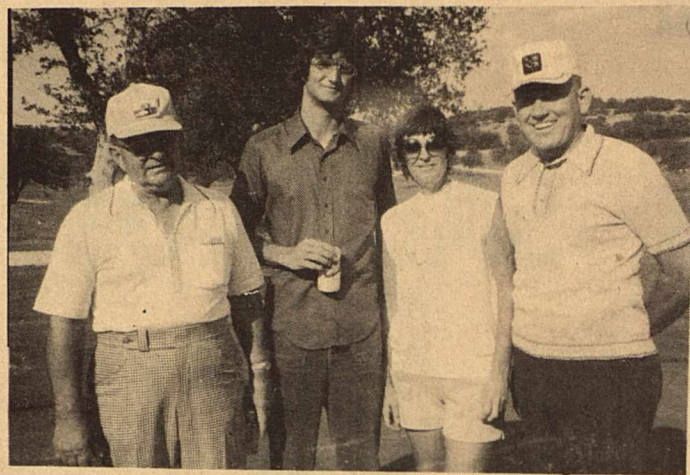

Mop Sauce For Chicken B-B-Q

WORCESTERED BARBECUED CHICKEN

- 1 bottle (5 oz.) original Worcestershire sauce
- 1 cup water
- 3/4 cup lemon juice
- 1/2 cup firmly packed light brown sugar
- 3 tablespoons cornstarch
- 1 1/2 teaspoon salt
- 3/4 teaspoon ground ginger
- 6 pounds chicken pieces

In a medium saucepan combine all ingredients except chicken. Bring to boiling; reduce heat; cook and stir until mixture thickens, about 3 minutes. Place chicken on rack over slow charcoal fire; grill 30 minutes turning occasionally. Brush with sauce; grill 20 to 30 minutes longer, turning and brushing with barbecue sauce frequently. Yield: 8 portions (2 1/2 cups sauce).

The Consumer Alert

Some time ago, our column mentioned problems a few Texans have had with in-state land deals.

Other Texas consumers have expressed concern about pro-

visions for out-of-state land developments and how to avoid difficulties in such transactions.

Responsible land developers are concerned, too. They say the keys to avoiding trouble with out-of-state land buyers are to deal with a reputable company or individual and to investigate carefully before entering into any agreement or commitment.

It's always a good idea to view any land development in which you're contemplating making a sizeable investment. If it's worth several thousand dollars of your money, it's worth the extra cash and time it would take to see it.

But what makes such rules difficult to follow in purchasing land in another state is that it is sometimes impossible to travel to the state to inves-

tigate the property, and the company offering the deal may be unknown to the consumer.

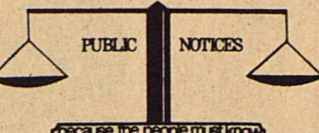
If, for any reasons, you cannot inspect land that you are considering purchasing you can find out certain things about it by asking the land developer for a property report.

Since passage of the Interstate Land Sales Act, developers of tracts of more than 50 subdivided lots that are promoted as a unit must file a property report with the Department of Housing and Urban Development.

This report gives the exact location of the land, clearly outlines the method of financing to be used, tells how much money is backing the project, and discloses whether or not the promoter actually has clear title to the land.

So if you're considering the purchase of out-of-state land that you can't go see prior to the sale, ask for a property report. You can also check with the Department of Housing and Urban Development for possible information about the land promoter.

If problems arise, get in touch with attorneys in our Consumer Protection Division or your local county or district attorney.

Lawns Require Management

The secret formula for a healthy dark green lawn calls for plenty of good management, water and fertilizer. And, as far as fertilizer is concerned, nitrogen is the key to maintaining the green color.

points out D. C. Langford, county agent for the Texas Agricultural Extension Service. A continuous supply of nitrogen must be available throughout the growing season. This requires topdressing fertilizer in the early spring when the grass begins to grow and at six to eight week intervals during the growing season.

If fertilizer containing special slow release nitrogen materials is used, higher rates per application can be used to extend the interval between applications.

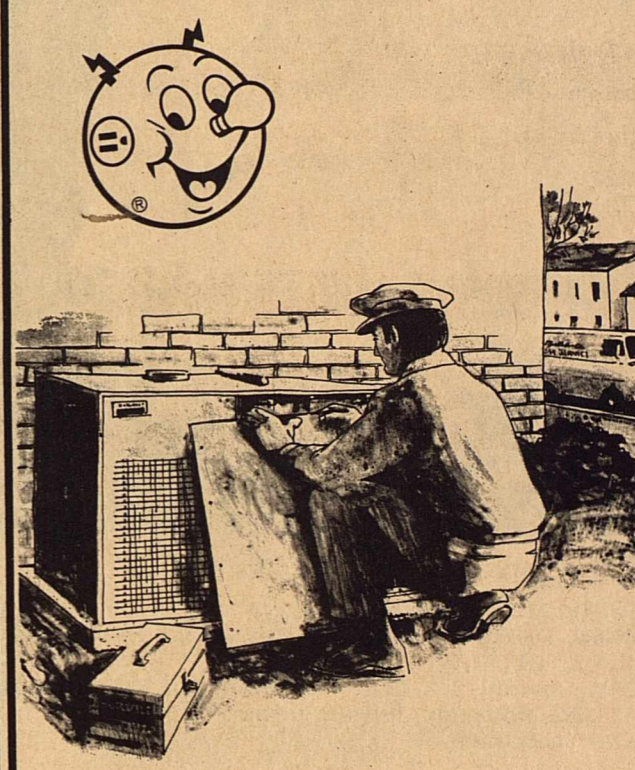
Each time you fertilize, apply enough material to supply 1 1/2 to 2 pounds of actual nitrogen per 1000 square feet, suggests Langford. Two pounds of nitrogen requires 15 pounds of 12-12-12, 10 pounds of ammonia sulfate or 6 pounds of ammonium nitrate. The amount of nitrogen needed depends on the composition of the fertilizer. The first number in the composition shown on the fertilizer bag is the percent of nitrogen.

Use fertilizer containing phosphorus and potassium in the spring and fall. After several years of fertilization, these materials will generally build up so that only maintenance amounts will be needed annually.

Lack of nitrogen is the main cause of grass turning light green and yellow. Other causes are disease or insect damage, iron chlorosis or acidity. Iron chlorosis is common in St. Augustine grass growing in alkaline soil such as we have in Sutton County, advises the county agent.

A Monster Waxes Fat

Although he is retiring with this session of Congress, the veteran Iowa solon, H. R. Gross, is not letting up on his protests against a mounting bureaucracy. He says:

"Most of us have, at one time or another seen one of those Hollywood science fiction movies featuring a supernatural monster which grows inexorably to enormous size by feeding voraciously on everything at hand."

"Such a monster is loose in the land today. Its name is welfareism and its rate of growth is both frightening and paralyzing. Most federal officials in Washington have apparently either thrown up their hands, abandoned any effort to control welfare's explosive growth, or are aiding it."

"Last year, welfare spending in the U.S. topped \$1,000 per capita . . . a figure Senator McGovern used in his campaign for the presidency, and the Department of Health, Education and Welfare wants to spend the almost unbelievable sum of \$111 billion of your money this year alone."

"Social Security benefit levels have gone up almost 70 per cent since President Nixon took office and will go another four per cent next month. The increase is more than twice that of the cost of living during the period and the food stamp program has ballooned since 1965. Under certain circumstances a family of four can now obtain \$1,700 in food stamps."

In the two previous year's match ropings, Jim Bob Altizer won over Olin Young with the best total time on six calves.

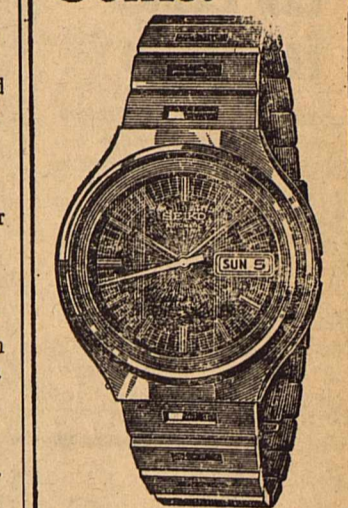

Sutton Among Counties Approved For Texas Farm To Market Program

Work in Sutton County is included in the 1974 Texas Farm to Market Road Program approved recently by the Texas Highway Commission.

This work includes an extension of RM 1691 from its end 13.0 miles south of US 290 in Sonora, Southeast a distance of 5.3 miles, according to D. R. Watson, District Engineer for the Texas Highway Department in San Angelo. The proposed project of grading, structures, and surfacing is estimated to cost \$194,800.

Planning and construction of the project will be under the supervision of Joe W. Lane, Senior Resident Engineer in Sonora.

Across the state, the program includes work on 565.9 miles at an estimated cost of 21.4 million.

Projects in the program were proposed by counties in consultations with District Engineers of the Texas Highway Department. The FM program

is a partnership effort between the counties and the Highway Department, with the counties providing necessary right of way and the Highway Department providing for construction and maintenance.

Texas has some 40 thousand miles of paved Farm and Ranch to Market Roads, probably the most highly developed system of secondary roads in the nation.

Originally conceived to get the farmer out of the mud, the FM system provides all weather roads for agriculture in the state. Now, FM roads also serve many recreational areas in the state, as well as providing access for new industrial development in many smaller cities and towns.

Sutton 4-H'ers Enter District Judging Contests

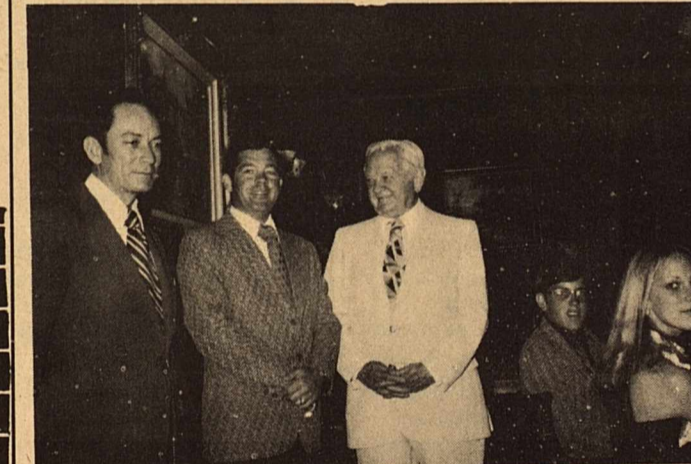
Five Sutton County 4-H Judging teams participated in the District 7 4-H eliminations contest held in San Angelo and Abilene.

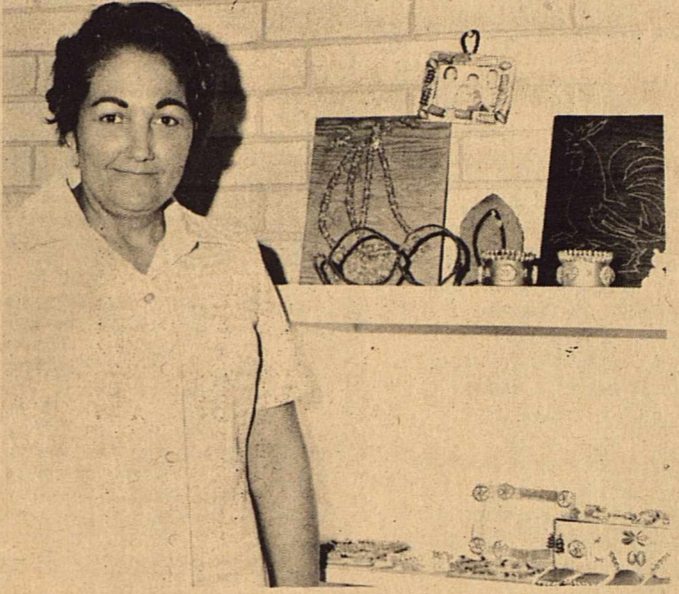

4-H parents and leaders interested in adding 4-H breeding heifer classes to the annual Sutton County 4-H Livestock Show for 1975 met and set the following general rules:

1. Calves must be born on or after September 1, 1973.
2. Classes will be divided by age and breed, provided entries justify added classes. Four or more heifers will justify an added class.
3. Heifers must be owned a minimum of five months prior to the show.
4. Heifers may be registered, grade or crossbred.
5. Heifers must be halter broke and may be groomed for showing.
