When yarn-spinning time comes, J. D. Stevens is one of those talented individuals who moves toward head of the class. As a matter of fact, he might move all way to head of class instead of just toward it. He's only man of our acquaintance who ever received a trophy for his ability to tell stories.

Stevens was awarded a prize for being champion bull thrower. Presentation of the trophy was made at an assembly at school last spring. And he'll admit that it was a well-earned trophy.

"Some people tell story after story," Stevens says, "and never have anything to show for it. Me? I have a trophy to prove I'm a good story teller." And who can argue with a man who has a trophy to prove his point?

During week prior to the game, the Lorenzo coach did something that was highly unpopular with his players. We wal't relate here in print the stunt he pulled because Stevens didn't tell us if he (Stevens)

had proof of the charge or not. Nonetheless, this horrible thing the coach did made the boys try to find some strange way to retaliate.

They found a strange way. They lost the game with Spur 186-0, Stevens says, and he has a newspaper clipping to prove it. "They would have won the game, anyway," Stevens admis, "but certainly they wouldn't have beaten us that

The score set a record for a shellacking taken, or given, by any one team. The record, however, has since been beaten, Stevens believes.

Bovina's champion story teller says some boys had to be pulled from Lorenzo's team during the game because they were too slow. That probably happens to a lot of footballers and isn't too unusual. But these boys were pulled because they weren't fast enough to get out of ballcarriers' way and were forced to make an occasional tackle. As a sidelight of the main story -- and all good storytellers have sidelights -- he told about one of Lorenzos smaller defenders who jumped on the back of the opposing team's big fullback and rode, piggy-back, the entire distance of a long touchdown run. After crossing the goal line, the fullback, Stevens says, shook off his rider and commented, "All right, you rode down here but you're going to have to walk back!"

There were few fans present at the game at its start and they all left in disgust before the half.

While the honor of playing on a record-setting team was, in this case, a dubious one, Stevens asked us how many players we knew who had played on a team that set a state and possibly a national record.

We had to admit he was the only one we knew. * * * *

If freezing temperatures hit within the week, cotton production would be reduced in the county by between 10 and 18 per cent and grain would be reduced by about 8 per cent, according to averaged estimates of gin managers, grain elevator operators, farmers, bank representatives and Deryl Coker, county agent.

The average freeze date for this area is Oct. 17.

In an effort to beat the cold weather, several farmers are applying dessicants and defoliants to their grain and cotton fields as soon as it reaches suitable maturity for appli-
