# **Devil Rates To Increase**

Due to drastic increases in printing, paper supplies, and postage, the Devil's River News has been forced to raise subscription rates. This will be the first raise in newspaper prices in a number of years.

New rates will become effective September 1 and will be as follows: Sonora subscribers, \$5 per year; out of county subscribers, \$6.30 per year, including tax; and out of state subscribers will be charged \$6.85 including tax. No tax will be charged on Sonora subscriptions.

Those readers purchasing newspapers from newsstands will be asked to increase their cost to 15c per copy. These papers are not taxable. Subscribers buying from the many newsboys that deliver papers on Wednesday afternoons will be charged 16c, which includes tax.

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
# Sonoran's Father **Dies May 28**

Graveside services were held May 29 for Dr. Paul Harold Heiser, father of Mrs. Lin Hicks. Services for Dr. Heiser, 71, were held at Fairmount Cemetery with Dr. Jerold McBride, pastor of First Baptist Church of San Angelo, officiating. He died May 28 at San Angelo's Clinic Hospital.

Dr. Heiser was an oral surgeon and had lived in San Angelo since 1947. He was a graduate of Baylor Dental School.

Other survivors include his wife; one son, Paul Harold Heiser, Jr., of Sacramento, California; one brother and two sisters. Also surviving him are Hicks and Clay Hicks.

John Murrell of Calgary, Alberta, Canada, actor and director, has received two distinguished awards for his playwriting ability.

Murrell's three-act play, 'Power In The Blood'' brought him the University of Alberta's Cliford E. Lee Award, which not only involves a \$1,500 prize, but guarantees a full-scale production next season by the University's drama department.

"Power In The Blood" ran for a four night stand in the Pleiades Theatre in Calgary. The play deals with the issues of religion and loneliness of the main character, Charity Shepherd.

# A Bishop Looks at Life

By Everett H. Jones, Retired Bishop of the Episcopal Church

> Where Is The **Backbone of America?**

I have a friend who is a sculptor. His name is Malcolm Alexander, and he is the stepson of Mrs. Donald

Alexander of San Antonio. In the past Malcolm has made a name for himself both as a painter and as the creator in bronze of athletes in action. (One of his athletic figures was given to the late Avery Brundage, former chairman of the Olympic Committee, on his 35th birthday and will soon be placed in the Olympic Museum n Olympia, Greece.) Malcolm is now making his

contribution to the Bicentennial celebration of America thru a new series of sculptures called 'The Backbone of America.' He explains the project in
