Susan Schwiening, Larry Finklea and Marsha Finklea placed first in senior wool judging; second in senior mohair judging and first in the overall wool and mohair judging contest. Kerr County 4-H placed second and San

Saba County 4-H placed third. Susan Schwiening placed third in mohair judging and third in the overall contest. Larry Finklea placed second in wool and second in the overall contest.

A junior team composed of Brett Johnson, Brad Johnson and Rex Surber participated in the junior division of the contest.

Mrs. Lawrence Finklea and Mrs. Jerry Johnson supervised the 4-H members at the judging contests.

## Foodway Store Being Remodeled

The Foodway Store is going through extensive remodeling that began early last week. Hershel Davenport, manager of the store, says that business will be carried on as usual as long as possible.

When remodeling is complete the food store will have all new self service meat cases, and clear door freezer cases and all new shelving and flooring, in addition to new produce cases.

Davenport says that only six feet of floor space will be added with the remodeling but that the new cases and shelving will give an appearance of more room.

One more check stand will be added and Davenport's office will be moved to the front of the store. All remodeling is expected to be complete by the last of June.

## Sutton Co. Gas Strike Reported

Sutton County gained a discovery and a confirmation, and a location was staked for a wildcat recently. Texland Petroleum Inc., of Fort Worth announced the completion as a shutin Canyon gas discovery on the George Wallace ranch, located 15 miles southwest of Sonora. The discovery was for an estimated, calculated absolute open flow of 2.7 million cubic feet daily, and is located 1 1/4 miles northeast of another well in the Wallace field.

Production was through perforations at 4,260-283 feet. MHM Operators of Midland will drill the No. 1 West-Foster, a 3,000 foot Strawn wildcat in Sutton County, located 28 miles east of Sonora, and 1 3/8 miles southwest of the marginal one 3000 Strawn Oil producer in the Fort Terrett Ranch multipay oil and gas field.

The Jo Nell (Canyon D) field of the county gained its fourth producer and a 5/8 mile northeast extension with completion of Phillips Petroleum Company. The producer is located on the Keene ranch, 20 miles southeast of Sonora and is for a calculated, absolute open flow of 3.3 million cubic feet of dry gas per day.

Wanda Neville was champion of the fourth flight and Jo Neville won championship honor in the sixth flight. Mary Barrow was consolation runner-up in the seventh flight.

## Margaret Trevino Honored At Baylor School of Nursing

Mrs. Trevino is a graduate of Sonora High School and Texas Woman's University. She is the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Joe F. Sanchez.

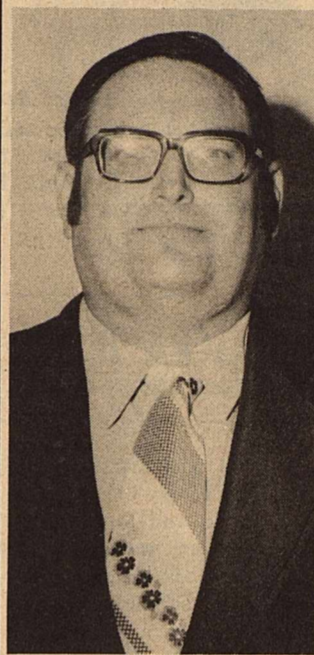
## OES Installation Held June 6

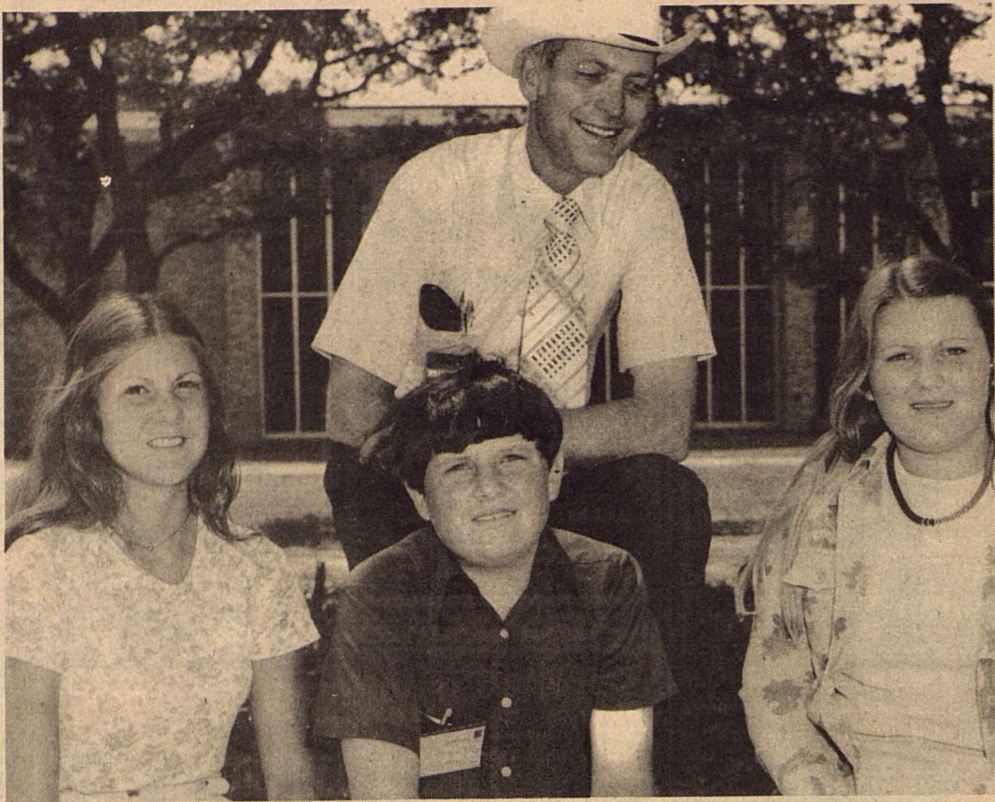
## Mrs. Ruby Robles Graduates May 16

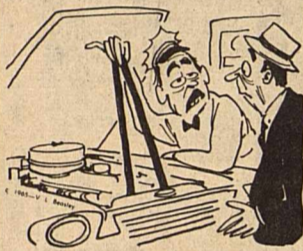

Lt. Clay Puckett was assigned to the Third Marine Division Headquarters in the Pacific.

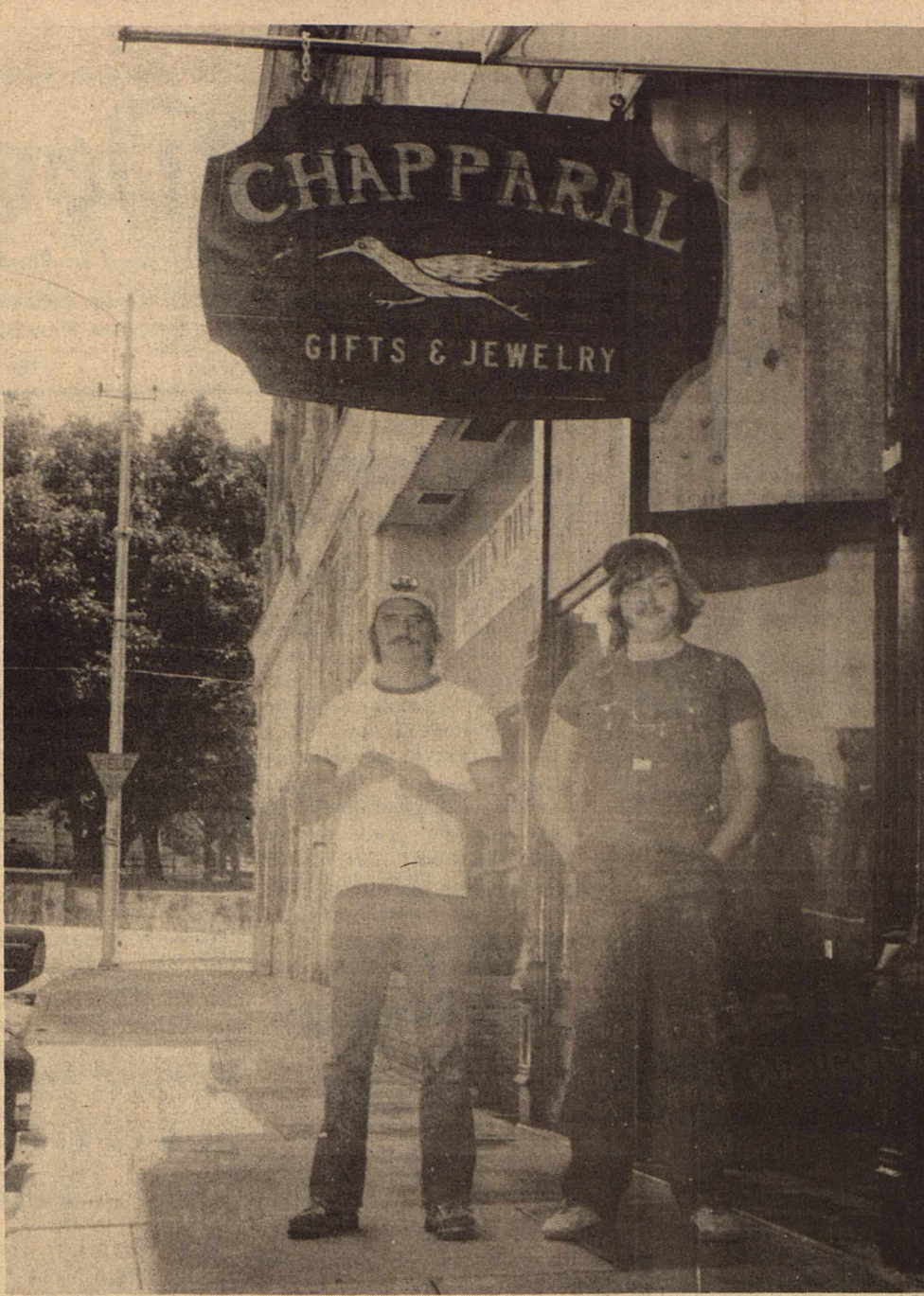
**63 Years Ago**

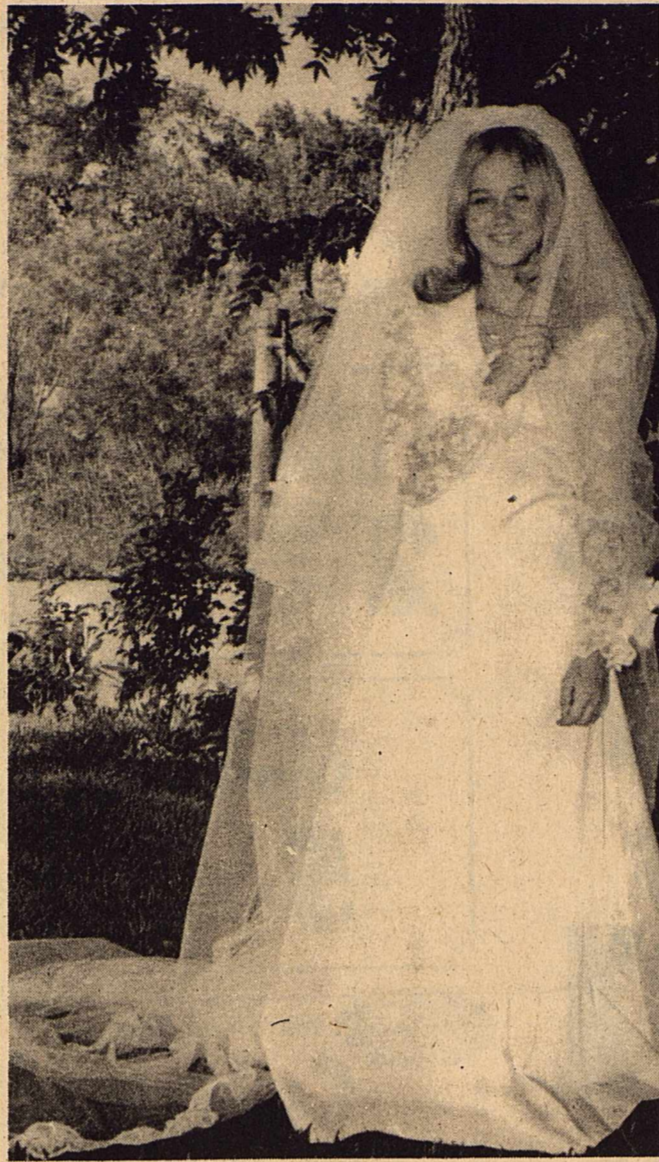

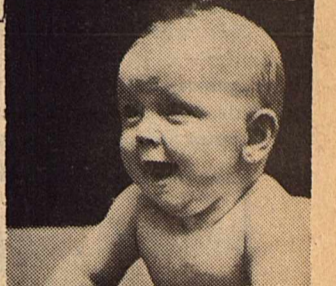

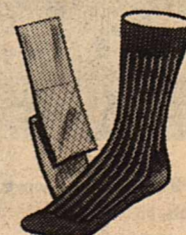

### Our News Letter

By Bob Krueger

While standing under the pecan trees behind the Court House in San Angelo last week, I was asked the same question that had been asked earlier at a meeting with the San Antonio Personnel Management Association: how accurate is the President's comment that the Congress is moving too slowly? My answer is: not very accurate. If anything, the Congress probably moves too fast, and doesn't consider legislation carefully enough.

Let's look at the facts. (1) The last session, when Mr. Ford was Minority Leader in the House of Representatives, the House did not get organized, and did not make committee assignments until March. The 94th Congress was organized in January and had passed a number of major bills by March.

(2) This House has worked more days, been in session more hours, taken more record votes, and passed more major legislation during its first 20 weeks than any Congress since World War II.

(3) In the Executive Branch, one person, the President, makes final decisions. Once he has decided, wheels can be put in motion. But a legislative body like the Congress, is different. It must be slower and more careful in the making of laws than the President can be in executing them.

A President can decide for a nation. A Congressman can only decide for himself, after listening to his constituents. He must then work to convince his colleagues of the rightness of his position. There are 435 Members of the House and 100 Members of the Senate. This group must reach some general agreement on policy before it can make laws. Even then, the President can, by a veto, overturn a decision of the Congress.

It is in the very nature of democracy that people must convince one another and work together to form policy. That is what Members of Congress do: hear testimony, listen to constituents, weigh various suggestions, convince one another, and then pass laws.

Our Constitution decrees that we should have separate and equal branches of government. The Congress legislates, the President executes, the Judiciary arbitrates.

Any expectation that a legislative body can or should act hastily and without careful consideration of policy alternatives is misguided. It shows a misunderstanding of the very tasks of Congress and the President as defined by the Constitution.

I disagree with a good deal of the legislation passed by this Congress. But comments that this Congress is inactive and unresponsive are simply erroneous. I would not, by and large, want the Congress to act more hastily, but rather more carefully. That would be in the national interest.

Whatever a man soweth, that shall he also reap.

### Krueger Aids Amendment Passage On Safety Commission Firearms Control

Congressman Bob Krueger recently helped pass an amendment preventing the Consumer Products Safety Commission from controlling firearms and ammunition. The amendment which Krueger spoke for and helped to pass would insure that ammunition and firearms cannot be declared hazardous substances by the Consumer Products Safety Commission. Although fireworks can still be regulated by this Commission, firearms cannot.

"The Consumer Products

Safety Commission should continue to direct its attention to those areas where Congress intended," Krueger said, "but we do not need its intrusion into an area that Congress never intended to give it authority over. I know that many people in the 21st District have been concerned about an earlier court ruling that gave the Consumer Products Safety Commission authority over ammunition, but this legislation, if passed on the floor, as I believe it will be, will now make the intent of Congress clear. I'm pleased to have been on a committee where I was able to represent the interests of my constituents in the matter," he concluded.
