

Even then, the President can, by a veto, overturn a decision of the

democracy that people must convince one another and work together to form policy. That is what Members of Congress do: hear testimony, listen to constituents, weigh various suggestions, convince one another, and then pass laws.

Any expectation that a legislative body can or should act hastily and without careful consideration of policy alternatives is misguided. It shows a misunderstanding of the very tasks of Congress and the President as defined by the


(2) This House has worked more days, been in session more hours, taken more record votes, and passed more major legislation during its first 20 weeks than any Congress since World War II.


