Winners of the Gold Star Awards, which are presented to the outstanding 4-H girl and the outstanding 4-H boy in each county by the Texas Agricultural Extension Service were Susan Schwiening, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Harold (Corky) Schwiening, Jr., and Mark Van Hoozer, son of Mr. and Mrs. Calvin Van Hoozer.

Miss Schwiening has been a member of the Sutton County 4-H Club for the past seven years. She is secretary of the club, a member of the 4-H Council and a junior leader for wool, mohair, range and plant judging.

Mark Van Hoozer has been a member of the club for five years. He is parliamentarian of the club, a member of the 4-H council and a junior leader for livestock, wool, mohair, plant and range judging.

Marsha Finklea and Larry Finklea, daughter and son of Mr. and Mrs. Lawrence Finklea, were co-winners of the 1975 Fred T. Earwood Memorial Trophy. This award is presented by an anonymous donor to a senior 4-H member who has an outstanding 4-H record and who has encouraged other boys and girls to participate in the Sutton County 4-H program. Because of the outstanding record compiled by this sister and brother team, the awards committee decided that co-winners should be selected this year.

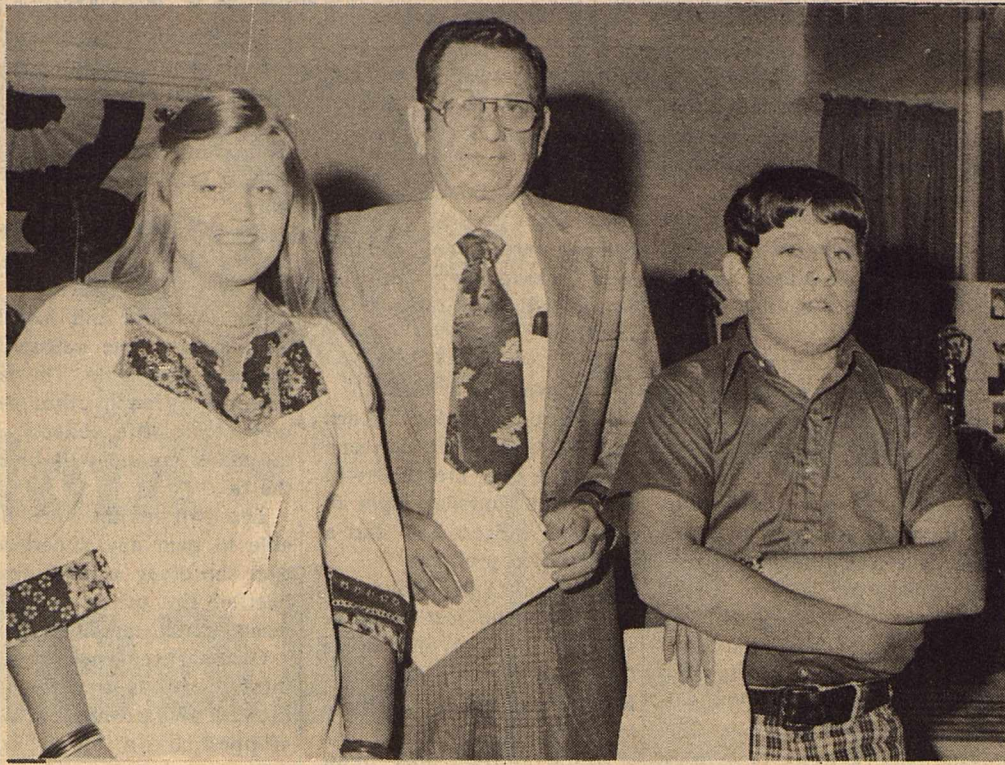

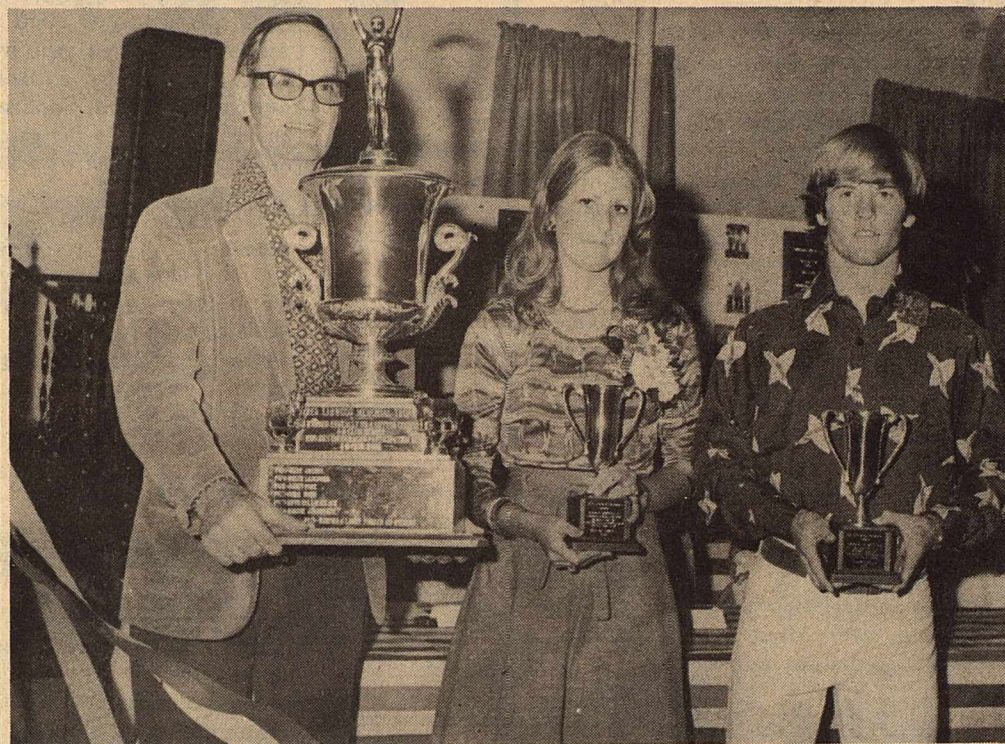

## Antlerless Deer Permits To Be Issued Oct. 29-30

Parks and Wildlife Department biologists have finished their deer census work and antlerless deer permits for the upcoming hunting season will be available to landowners in Sutton County on October 29-30 at the Courthouse in Sonora.

Wildlife officials at P&WD urge landowners to pick up their permits at the designated place and time since P&WD officials will be on hand to answer any questions they may have regarding the new permit system and issuance rate.

Permits this year are based on current deer censuses by designated compartments in the county. Maps outlining the compartments and rates of issuance will be available to the public at the county courthouse prior to the issuance dates.

## School Air Conditioning Bid Awarded To Sutton Electric

The board of trustees accepted a bid from Sutton Electric to furnish and install air conditioning units for the lunchroom, Jr. High, and Senior High Schools. The lunchroom will be cooled by three five ton roof-top units while window units will be installed in the other buildings. It is anticipated the work will be completed in November.

A curriculum director was authorized for the district. This person will work directly with teachers in preparation and revision of curriculum guides, selecting instructional

materials, coordination and improvement of teaching, direct in-service programs and coordinate the instructional program between grades and between schools.

Mrs. June Ferguson was elected as teachers' aide in elementary school. She has two years of college plus experience as school secretary, legal secretary, and substitute teacher.

The enrollment reached

1082 during the first six weeks and the average daily attendance for the period was 1033.16. Last year at the same time, the enrollment was 1034 and the average daily attendance was 925.

School will be closed next Monday, October 27, for in-service training. Teachers will attend professional meetings in Brownwood during the annual district T.S.T.A. meeting.

Five more cases of screwworms have been reported in the county during the past week indicating that all surgical operations should be postponed until after frost.

The five cases during the preceding week were reported on the Philip Jacoby, Vestel Askew, Lea Roy Aldwell, Frank Bond and Robert Halbert ranches. Four of five cases were in the navel of calves. County Agent, Clint Langford advises all ranchers to check newborn calves regularly in order to treat fly blows before they hatch and spread fertile screwworm flies.

## Broncos Lose To Crane

The Crane Golden Cranes were able to come up with the big plays before a Crane homecoming crowd Friday night in Crane, giving them the opening victory in 7AA play by a score of 21-14.

The tempo of the game was set early in the contest as the Broncos fumbled on their first offensive play. Crane recovered on the Bronco 19 yard line. Three plays later Ronald Jeffery, the 165-pound right halfback speedster, crashed over the left side of his offensive line from three yards out, to draw first blood in the game. Terry Marshall stepped back and booted the PAT to give Crane a 7-0 lead after three minutes and 57 seconds had elapsed in the game.

The never-say-die Broncos came right back after starting a drive from their 39 yard line and scored twelve plays later as Quarterback John Elliott hit Robbie Hard with a three yard scoring play and John David Cook kicked the PAT to tie the game at 7-7 with 2:35 left in the first quarter.

Early in the second quarter the Golden Cranes scored on a one-yard run by their ace back, Willie Neal, with 9:21 left in the second quarter. Terry Marshall's attempted kick for the extra point sailed wide to the right to give the Cranes a 13-7 lead.

The missed try for the extra point must have given the Broncos a boost because David Snodgrass returned the kickoff to the Crane 46 yard line. From this point the Broncos went to work and drove to the Crane 46 yard line. The big play in the drive was a 36 yard pass play from Elliott to Robbie Hard for a 36 yard gain. With a first and goal situation from the Crane three yard line, the Broncos were unable to dent the Crane defense and gave the ball up on downs on the one yard line.

In three plays, the Cranes drove the ball out to their 14, taking advantage of the Sonora letdown because of the missed scoring chance. Ronald Jeffery scooted around his left end behind a good block, cut back to his right and picked up a five man wall of blocking and scampered 86 yards for a TD

that turned the game completely around. Neal added the two point conversion to boost the Crane lead to 21-7 which stood up until halftime.

Again the Broncos showed they had a lot of spunk as they took the second half kickoff and drove 77 yards climaxed by a three yard run by Snodgrass. Cook added the extra point and the score stood, Crane 21, Sonora 14, with 4:58 left in the third quarter.

Although the Bronco defense stiffened from this point on and thwarted any serious scoring threat by the Cranes, they were not able to mount any scoring threat and Crane won 21-14.

The Broncos fought hard and those present had to be proud of the way they conducted themselves. I feel the Golden Cranes have two of the best backs in the country in Willie Neal and Ronald Jeffery and to contain these two fellows is a real challenge for any team. You may score on their defense, but Neal and Jeffery will keep them in any game with their running abilities.
