Bob Krueger's Weekly Report

tions become so unnecessarily and to prevent Texans from complicated and outdated paying more for our own that the idea of setting these regulations aside entirely begins to merit consideration. With that recognition in mind, I succeeded this last week in getting a 19-19 tie vote on a bill that would allow a seven-year suspension of federal regulations on the transportation of interstate natural gas, that is, natural gas moving from one state to another.

For about forty years the federal government has regulated at the wellhead the price of natural gas produced ' in one state and sold in another. At the same time, intrastate gas, or gas produced and consumed within the same state, remained unregulated. For many years, intrastate gas could be purchased more cheaply than interstate gas because supply was abundant and gas was essentially viewed as an unnecessary byproduct found in drilling for oil. As the shipment of natural gas became easier, however, and as natural gas began to be used for heating, fertilizer, synthetics and many other purposes, its price began to rise. The availability of large supplies of natural gas in Texas brought one-half of the nation's petrochemical industry to our state. Meanwhile, the federal government set the price of interstate gas at an artificially low level, and consuming states, dependent upon producing states for their supplies of natural gas, began to fall short. Tuesday night the Broncos traveled to Iraan and dropped a 61-47 game to the Iraan Braves. After jumping to a 15-8 first quarter lead, Iraan came back and dropped 22 points through the nets in the second quarter and took 30-27 halftime lead. The Broncos were never able to come back as Iraan outscored the Broncos in the second half 31 to 20 and gave the Broncos their first loss of the season.

District 9 — Brown, Eastland, Comanche, Erath, Stephens, Palo Pinto, Jack, Parker, Hood. The referendum and election will be held by physical ballot

with voting place to be at each county ASCS office in the re-ferendum area or in the county courthouse in counties that do not have ASCS office facilities. Polls will be open at 7 a.m. and close at 7 p.m. Producers who will be away from their particuar voting box location on election day may obtain an absentee ballot from county agent offices, wool and mohair warehouses or from the Mohair Council of America. Absentee ballots must be mailed in the self-addressed envelope to the central balloting place at P.O. Box 222, San Angelo, Texas 76901, before midnight

three days prior to the election date. Any person within this referendum area engaged in the busi-ness of producing or causing to be produced mohair for com-mercial purposes is eligible to vote, including owners of ranches and their tenants and sharecroppers, if such person would be required to pay the assessment proposed.



Fall enrollment at The University of Texas is 42,598, an increase of 757 over the previous fall.


Most of the increase, according to Dr. David E. Hershey, director of admissions and records, comes from larger numbers of former students returning to UT Austin.

The enrollment figure includes 24,631 men and 17,967 women. By classification, there are 8,746 freshmen; 7,404 sophomores; 7,575 juniors; 9,996 seniors; 4,533 master's students; 2,653 doctoral students and 1,691 law students.

Cow Reduction Urged

The current economic risis in which cattlemen find hemselves is a clear-cut case of too many cows. Brood cow numbers must be reduced if cattlemen are to get back on their feet and run a profitable operation, emphasizes D. C. Langford, county agent for the Texas Agricultural Extenion Service.

One thing that cattlemen need to look at in analyzing their operations is a "cow month of feed"--a term that has a definite bearing on the income derived from cattle. It refers to the total number of cows maintained in the herd annually divided by the number of calves weaned. For example, if a producer has maintained 100 cows for the past year and weaned 90 calves, then 1200 cow months of feed are divided by 90, resulting in 14.2 cow months of feed per calf weaned. As this figure increases, production efficiency per cow-calf weaned drops and this is money down the drain, points out Langford.

The number of calves actually weaned becomes an especially critical factor when calculating the cost of keeping open cows. Current total costs per cow per year run about \$204. This is a large investment if there is no return in the form of a calf weaned.

maintenance cost of \$204 per year, the cost per pound of calf with a 100 per cent calf crop weaned at 450 pounds per calf is 45 cents. This cost figure increases drastically as the number of calves weaned drops. With only 50 calves weaned from 100-cow herd, the cost per pound of calf

the Screwworm Eradication Program. He says 987 cases were tallied from 105 Texas counties the first week of November, followed consecutively by 968 from 96 counties, 521 from 79 counties, and 190 from 52

The 2,666 confirmed screwworm infestations in Texas livestock during November brought the 11-month tally to 16,278. This is second only to 90,567 for the same period of 1972, and far above the 6,836 on the books for the first 11 months of 1974.






