## Eldorado Captures Tourney

After dropping a 57-56 decision to Alpine Friday, the Eldorado Eaglettes came roaring back Saturday to capture the Sonora Girls Invitational Basketball Tournament with a 62-45 win over Alpine Saturday night. Because it was a double elimination tournament, the

Eaglettes were able to revenge the earlier tournament loss to Alpine. Other Eaglette wins included two over Crane and one over Ft. Stockton.

The local girls won their first game of the tournament by trouncing Del Rio 59-25. The Sonorans lost their next

two games by a total of 3 points and both in the final seconds. Alpine handed the Broncos a 52-51 defeat and Crane rallied to a 36-34 victory to crush the Broncos' championship hopes. Becky Cavaness led all Bronco scorers with a 3 game total of 76 points while Gloria Gomez totaled 22 and Lucy Morriss 14.

All tournament selections were Cavaness and Martha Elliott of Sonora, Gynna Jay and Terry Garlitz of Eldorado and Alpine's Melanie Arnold and Michelle Espinosa. Irene Garcia of Eldorado was named the Most Valuable Player.

Plans continue for the proposed Community Park with election of park board and officers and appointment of committees. The location of this Community Park will be the Park Association race track and rodeo arena located on U.S. 290.

The Community Park Board consists of Tommie Whitehead, L. P. Bloodworth, Louis Powers, Preston Love, Vannetta Smith, Bob Nevill, Joe Friess, James Hunt, Norm Rousselot, Jim Cahill, Kit Weaver, Claire Powers, John Brittain, Virgil Polocsek, Joe David Ross, R. W. Wallace, and Rev. Michael Fernandez. Officers for the newly formed board are president, Joe David Ross; vice-president, Jim Cahill; secretary, Tommie Whitehead; and treasurer, Kit Weaver.

Virgil Polocsek, Joe Lane, John Brittain, Bob Nevill and Jim Cahill make up the Engineering and Topography Committee.

The Finance Committee includes Kit Weaver, Rev. Fernandez, Claire Powers, L. P. Bloodworth and Tina Whitehead.

Named to the Policy and Rules Committee were Preston Love, Joe Friess and Rev. Fernandez. The Maintenance Committee consists of Friess, Robert Duran, Bloodworth and Cahill.

Future plans are to level the center field of the existing race track to make certain that proper drainage will be maintained for the baseball and softball dia-

mond, rodeo arena, playgrounds, tennis courts, and picnic areas. John Brittain Construction Company, Brown and Root and Carl J. Cahill, Inc. have done some land clearing and site preparation work.

Committees have been organized specializing in each of the proposed uses for the park. The Community Pavilion will be in the hands of Love, Jim Berekky, Wallace, Norm Rousselot, Claire Powers, and Gloria Lopez. John Stokes, Louis Powers, Wallace, and Brittain were named to the Rodeo Committee. The Baseball Committee consists of M. L. Bounds, Sam Stewart, Vannetta Smith and Weaver.

Sewer and water lines will be established before any other construction will begin.

The open air community pavilion, baseball fields, rodeo arena and the family picnic areas are considered the top priorities according to the Community Park Board.

The board and committee meetings are open to the public and anyone who would like to serve on a committee or has suggestions is encouraged to participate. The finance fund will be started in the near future, even though businesses and individuals have volunteered cash or services.

Before the park can become a reality, legal steps must be finalized by the Sonora Race Track Association, the land donors, and the Community Park Board, city and county.

## A. W. Awalt Leaves His Mark On Sonora

In a large number of yards around town there stands lasting, living memorials to A. W. Awalt, more affectionately known to his many friends as "Big A". His contributions to the community are things of nature's beauty...trees, shrubs and lawns.

Big A's pride and joy are the huge magnolia trees flourishing around town...like the ones evident in his own yard, and at the Robert Hardgrave, Jo Nell Queen and the Bryan Hunt homes.

Awalt has retired from his job of planting and tending the many yards around Sonora that has occupied some twenty years of his life. He began his nursery business when he started doing a little yard work around town. He planted a few trees, added his fertilizer business and all of a sudden he had a full scale operation. He has been working for the Edwin Sawyers longer than anyone...15 years, and Awalt says they probably really got him started on his seasonal yard tending contracts.

Awalt will keep his fertilizer business but plans to do a lot of visiting around and just enjoy himself. He's busy this week gathering pecans from a pecan tree he planted some thirty years ago

when he and his late wife, Mamie, bought the home he still occupies. The tree this year has already produced more than 75 pounds of pecans which is rare in itself as very few trees in the city have pecans, due to an unseasonal freeze.

The Awalts, Big A, Mamie and small son, A. W., Jr., moved to Sutton County in 1923 where he went to work as a ranch hand for his uncle, the late, W. C. Bryson. Coming here from McCullough County, the couple had a lot of getting used to Sutton County. At that time there were no roads to speak of to the various ranches and Awalt remembers Mamie crying and wanting to go home. They stuck it out for awhile, moved to town in 1925 where he carried brick and mortar for the First Methodist Church. He later went to work for the VanderStucken Store, then Piggly Wiggly. He worked at these jobs until he started his nursery business.

The Awalts later had another son, Sid, who now lives in San Angelo and is an engineer for the Texas Highway Department. They also have two grandchildren.

Sorrow came to the life of the Awalts in early December of 1944 when they received the news of A. W. Jr.'s death. He was killed on Leyte Island during World War II. In July, 1969 Big A and Mamie celebrated their golden wedding anniversary. They married in Mason County July 9, 1919. Mrs. Awalt died in January of this year after a long illness. They had been married almost 56 years at the time of her death.

Mrs. Awalt's illness brought a revelation to Big A. He stated that he couldn't figure out how women lived to be 25 with all the work there is to do around a house.

**Lice Weakens Cattle**

Lice can weaken cattle, stunt their growth and make them more susceptible to other diseases. That's why it's important to check cattle periodically for the tiny pests, says D. C. Langford, county agent for the Texas Agricultural Extension Service.

"It's especially important to check cattle in the fall, winter and spring months because lice are attracted to the cooler skin temperatures of animals," points out Langford.

Both bloodsucking and biting lice are parasites of cattle. Biting lice feed on pieces of hair, scabs and skin excretions of the animal and can cause cattle to scratch and rub off pieces of skin. The loss of blood caused by bloodsucking lice can keep young animals from gaining and can affect meat and milk

production in older animals, explains the county agent.

Lice are most numerous on the neck and shoulders of an animal and are more common on poorly fed cattle.

Lice can be controlled by spraying, dipping, dusting or a self-treatment rubbing device. The insecticide used depends on the application method and whether it is for dairy or beef cattle, says the agent.

"The most effective way to apply an insecticide is to wet the animal to the skin," says Langford. "This usually takes from one to two gallons of spray for mature animals with heavy hair coats."

The application should be repeated in two or three weeks and cattle should be inspected periodically after that, adds the agent.

## U.T. Enrollment Total Released

Fall enrollment at The University of Texas is 42,598, an increase of 757 over the previous fall.

Most of the increase, according to Dr. David E. Hershey, director of admissions and records, comes from larger numbers of former students returning to UT Austin.

The enrollment figure includes 24,631 men and 17,967 women. By classification, there are 8,746 freshmen; 7,404 sophomores; 7,575 juniors; 9,996 seniors; 4,533 master's students; 2,653 doctoral students and 1,691 law students.

## Heart Disease Listed As State's Leading Cause Of Death

Nearly 50,000 Texans will die of heart and blood vessel diseases in 1976, according to Mrs. J. F. Howell, president of Sutton County Heart Association. This number represents more than 50 percent of all deaths from all causes this year.

Mrs. Howell announced that in February, American Heart Month, the nationwide Heart Fund campaign will be conducted to educate the American public about the nation's number one killer—heart and blood vessel

diseases.

"These diseases will kill more than a million Americans this year," Mrs. Howell said. This is more than all causes of death combined. Aside from the suffering and loss of life, heart diseases cost the nation an estimated \$22.7 billion in lost wages and medical expenses each year.

## Cow Reduction Urged

The current economic crisis in which cattlemen find themselves is a clear-cut case of too many cows. Brood cow numbers must be reduced if cattlemen are to get back on their feet and run a profitable operation, emphasizes D. C. Langford, county agent for the Texas Agricultural Extension Service.

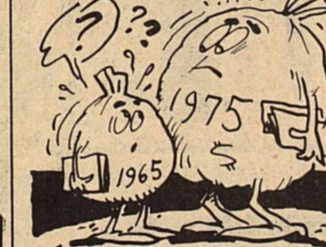
One thing that cattlemen need to look at in analyzing their operations is a "cow month of feed"—a term that has a definite bearing on the income derived from cattle. It refers to the total number of cows maintained in the herd annually divided by the number of calves weaned. For example, if a producer has maintained 100 cows for the past year and weaned 90 calves, then 1200 cow months of feed are divided by 90, resulting in 14.2 cow months of feed per calf weaned. As this figure increases, production efficiency per cow-calf weaned drops and this is money down the drain, points out Langford.

The number of calves actually weaned becomes an especially critical factor when calculating the cost of keeping open cows. Current total costs per cow per year run about \$204. This is a large investment if there is no return in the form of a calf weaned.

Using the total cow maintenance cost of \$204 per year, the cost per pound of calf with a 100 per cent calf crop weaned at 450 pounds per calf is 45 cents. This cost figure increases drastically as the number of calves weaned drops. With only 50 calves weaned from 100-cow herd, the cost per pound of calf jumps to 91 cents.

So, as the winter season approaches and cattlemen start planning their feeding program, the county agent advises giving close attention to culling those cows that are open. It doesn't make dollars and cents to feed them through the winter.

## Screwworm Cases Drop In November

A week by week reduction in number of laboratory confirmed screwworm cases in Texas animals was recorded during November, reports a U. S. Department of Agriculture (USDA) official.

Dr. M. E. (Cotton) Meadows of USDA's Animal and Plant Health Inspection Service (APHIS) is director of the Screwworm Eradication Program. He says 987 cases were tallied from 105 Texas counties the first week of November, followed consecutively by 968 from 96 counties, 521 from 79 counties, and 190 from 52 counties.

The 2,666 confirmed screwworm infestations in Texas livestock during November brought the 11-month tally to 16,278. This is second only to 90,567 for the same period of 1972, and far above the 6,836 on the books for the first 11 months of 1974.

Cool weather usually kills screwworm flies in all but the southern portion of Texas, explains Meadows. "They overwinter in warm areas of Mexico and south Texas. They migrate northward with warm spring and summer weather."

The APHIS program utilizes nuclear energy to take advantage of a unique factor in the screwworm fly's reproductive cycle. Female screwworm flies mate only once in their lifetimes -- if that mating is with a sterile

male any eggs she produces will not hatch.

During their pupal stage the millions of artificially reared screwworm flies produced in the APHIS insectary are exposed to a carefully measured dosage of nuclear

radiation. This leaves them sterile but sexually active.

Sterile flies are released among wild fly populations on a planned distribution system. When enough sterile to fertile matings occur, eradication is achieved.

## Airport Radio Navigation Beacon To Be Installed

Parts, equipment and wiring for the Sonora Airport non-directional radio beacon were delivered to the airport Monday morning. Installation should be completed by the first of the year.

The beacon, which will enable pilots to land at

Sonora under adverse weather conditions, was financed through contributions from local citizens, businesses and companies doing business in Sutton County plus a grant from Texas Aeronautical Commission. Recent contributors to the airport fund are, Guy Askew, Mrs. Alice S. Jones and Judge W. T. Hardy.

Houma Aviation Services Inc. of Houma, Louisiana, a charter flight company flying hunters into Sutton County each Friday, has made their late model seven passenger aircraft available for local weekend charter. Local residents desiring flights to football games, ski resorts, etc. may utilize this service during December to January 15. Airport manager Bill Chapman has further details.

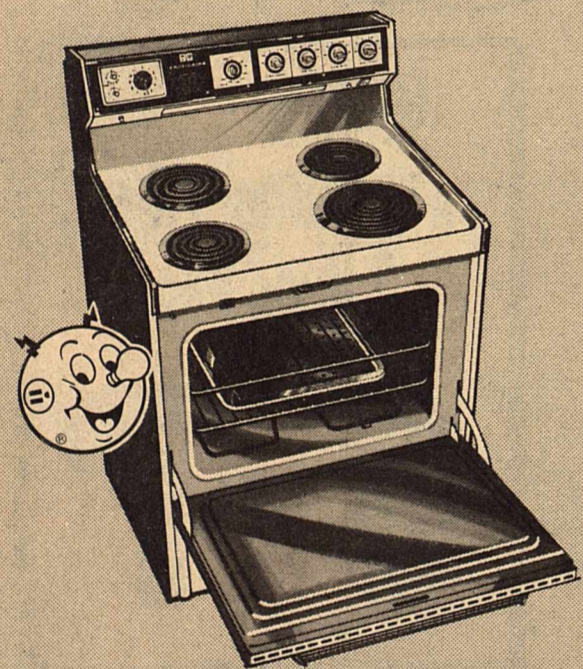

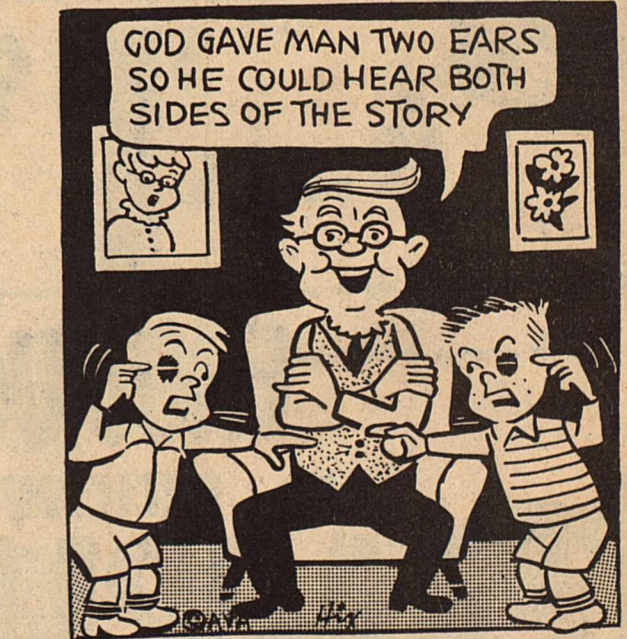
