

I am looking towards the yearly Texas Legislative Conference to be held this weekend in my home town of New Braunfels. This conference, which has been held during each of the past ten years, brings together state, local, and federal officials with citizens from Texas to discuss some of the important issues that concern all Americans. Two years ago it was defense; last year, energy; this year, "Government: More or Less", a question of governmental regulation. Among those expected to be present this year will be John Poerner,



WATER SHORTAGE It is said that, "Still water runs deep". But how can it run, if it's still?---The fact is, our water is not still. We are running out of it.

In the U.S. the annual supply of fresh water is about 500 billion gallons per day. Already we are using 350 billions of it. A serious shortage is foreseen; brought on by population growth, and added needs by industry and agriculture. If ocean water could be desalted at reasonable cost, there would be no problem at

Many scientists and engineers around the world are testing varied ways to desalt water. In the U.S. the largest sea-water conversion plant is at Freeport, Texas, which turns Gulf of Mexico waters into drinking water at the rate of 1 million gallons per day.

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As I write my weekly Director of Education Recolumn in Washington today, sources for Governor Briscoe; State Attorney General John Hill; U.S. Congressman Jim Collins (R-Tx.) as well as the regional director of the FTC. and the president of the Houston Chamber of Commerce. We will all be considering, with the citizens attending, the question of whether we need more or less

government. I suspect that the consensus of the panel will be that we need less. And I am confident that the consensus of our district and of the citizens who will be present at the conference will be that we need less. The question will then be "How to Achieve

The federal budget that President Ford has just presented to the Congress is four times as big as the federal budget which President Johnson presented to the Congress just twelve years ago. Probably your income, like that of most Americans, has not grown four times as large during that period. Certainly mine has not. But it will not be possible to bring about less government without also having less spending. That, in addition, will sometimes mean fewer services of some kinds to which we have become accustomed. It is immensely difficult to undo a program or disestablish an agency once either has begun. One problem is that people write to their legislators asking for less government and less spending in general, but more assistance and more spending as it concerns their particular needs. Clearly we cannot have it both ways. And I believe that most people recognize that and are willing to support governmental policies that will result in less government spending and less growth in governmental

To achieve that end, your representative needs to receive specific suggestions on ways to cut back: specific programs that you see in your areas which are not successful, specific policies which could be changed to bring greater efficiency. A repre-

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work for the goals which he was sent to Washington to address, but to do so, he needs your help.

A conference such as the 10th Annual Texas Legislative Conference, which brings ogether people across the community to meet with people in government, is a good means of bringing grass roots responsiveness and mutual understanding to the government we share. ### He Can't Understand The Point Of The Presidential Primaries

Dear Editor:

I don't know about you, but don't understand Presidential Preference primaries, the things the newspapers and television networks are reporting every week as though they were professional football games leading to the Super Bowl.

In the first place, they're supposed to be selecting delegates to the two national nominating conventions, but in at least one state it's just a popularity contest, with no delegates actually going to the candidates. In lots of other states about half the delegates selected are uncommitted; they can go to the convention and vote for just anybody, a choice they sometimes have.

Or take New Hampshire, whose primary is held in January, the first in the country. Although the state hasn't got as much population as a lot of cities, its Presidential primary attracts nationwide attention, some people say nationwide significance, because it's the first one held. New Hampshire is so proud of the honor that it has a law saying its primary will be held one week ahead of any other state's primary,

regardless of when that happens. Thus if say Idaho wanted to try to be first and set its primary in December, New Hampshire's would be held perhaps in November. If enough states entered into the joke, this could go on until New Hampshire was holding its primary four years before the next Presidential election, meaning of course hat candidates would have to announce four years in advance. This might prove to be an advantage to the voters, because where's the candidate who could stand four years of being investigated by the newspapers? The ideal situation for some candidates would be to announce only one week before the election. How much could you find out about them in that short a

By the way, I heard a politician say once more the other day when he was asked a question he didn't want to answer: "I'll cross that bridge when I come to it." I have observed however that when politicians do come to that bridge, most of them veer and go downstream hunting for a place they can cross without being noticed. Yours faithfully,

### A Bishop Looks At Life

By Everett H. Jones, Retired Bishop of Episcopal Church GOD'S WORK **INCLUDES SALVAGE** 

Parents, ministers and eachers get their greatest reward in life when they see a young person in whom they have been deeply interested grow into useful and mature

This is a joy I have in a young minister friend of mine, the Rev. Larry Hall, who comes from San Antonio and who began his ministry as assistant rector of Christ Church in this city. He now has a very responsible position as rector of St.

David's Church in Austin. A few days ago I came across some words Larry wrote in his church bulletin: 'No longer does the word salvation' sound overly-pious or offensive to me. It is simply a word used to express a fact of existence and is a major concern of

every important thing we do. 'For example, the purpose of schools and colleges is to provide salvation from ignorance. Hospitals and physicians attempt to save us from sickness and disease. Philanthropic and certain government agencies attempt to save us from misery and poverty. Salvation from the common' is derived from art galleries and symphonies. Friendships save us from loneliness. The Gospel of Jesus Christ saves us from ourselves and from the depths we experience when we choose consciously or unconsciously to be the center of every situation."

It is clear that Larry's Lenten purpose is similar to mine: to bring vitality and fresh meaning into the overly-familiar terms of our religious heritage.

It has always interested me that the root meaning of salvation" both in Hebrew and Greek is the same as that for "health." To be saved is to have the kind of health in body, mind and spirit that only God can give.

Another synonym for salvation is wholeness. Jesus frequently said to people, 'Your faith has made you whole." More and more today doctors and ministers are working together to give people this kind wholeness.

At the end of World War II there sprang up around the country a great variety of 'Salvage Stores.'' They offered for sale materials discarded by the military which had been reclaimed and redeemed for civilian use. God's work in the world is a continuous "salvage operation" taking lives that are bent, broken, scarred and maimed and restoring them to strength, beauty, and


