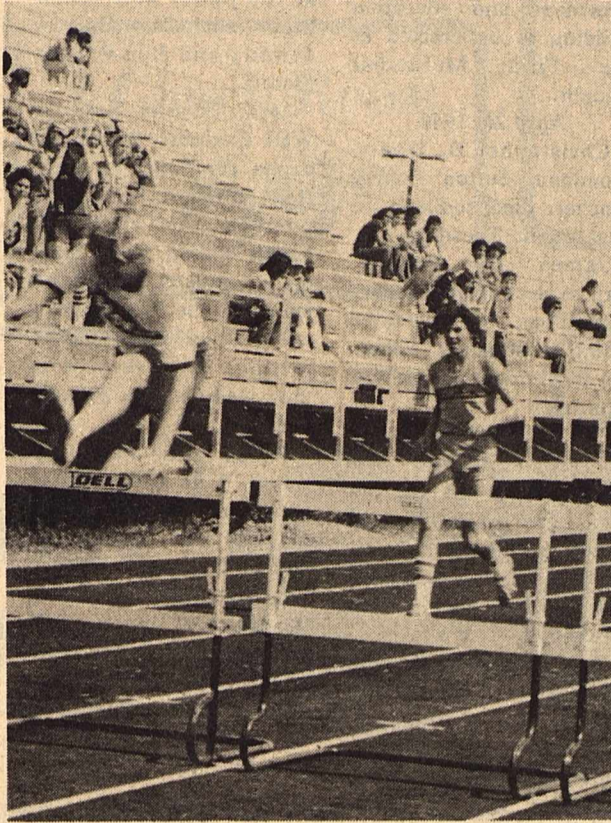

Broncos First In Local Meet

Sonora's Bronco track team compiled a total of 119 points Friday to take a first place win in Bronco Stadium.

The Broncos scored 33 points in the field events Friday afternoon and trailed Crane by only one point as they entered the final running events.

After reeling off a victory in the 440 yard relay, the Broncos held their first place lead throughout the meet. Precision handoffs by team members, Will Wallace, Jimmy Waters, Larry Jones and Garry Jones, gave the Broncos their first trophy of the evening.

The Broncos continued their winning streak as Larry Jones posted wins in the 120 yard high hurdles and the 330 yard intermediate hurdles. Waters also took a first place in the 220 yard dash to round first place showings for the Broncos in the running events.

Wallace placed second in the high hurdles and Chip Savell ran a 4:45.6 in the mile run to place

second in that event.

Robbie Hard paced the Broncos in the field events taking first in the pole vault and fourth in the long jump. Wallace also added points in the field events, coming in second in the pole vault.

Placing second in the meet was Ozona with 91 points; Crane, third; Reagan County, fourth; Wall, fifth; Junction, sixth; McCamey, seventh, and Eldorado placed last.

The Broncos will not be participating in a meet this week but will host a practice meet with Junction and Eldorado beginning at 4:30 Thursday (today). Junior high, junior varsity and varsity teams will travel to McCamey April 24 where they will participate in the district meet. Time of the meet will be announced at a later date.

Sanitation Dept. Eyed By Council

Discussion of the entire sanitation department was held when City Council met in a called session Monday morning. Relocation of the sanitary landfill as well as the new garbage ordinance consisting of collection, disposal and rates, were main topics.

Council is in the process of contacting land owners in the proximity of Sonora for a site to re-locate the sanitary landfill.

A side load truck for all commercial customers and as many residential customers as conditions will allow, was discussed at length. An appointment had been made with EMCO Corporation to be in Sonora Monday, April 10 to demonstrate the use of the side loading truck and containers. The demonstration will begin at 10 a.m. across from the city hall on the Methodist Church parking lot and all interested citizens are invited to attend.

Total anticipated cost of this system is \$119,000.00. Based upon information from several cities now using the EMCO System, council expects the labor savings and rate increases

to amortize the cost of the truck and containers in 4 1/2 to 5 years.

No definite rate changes were decided upon at the meeting, but in order to provide a better collection services, the council recognizes that the rate structure must increase.

Present at the meeting were Mayor Norman Rousselot; Aldermen Jack Kerbow, Lemuel Lopez, James Trainer, Doyle Morgan; and city manager Bob Nevill and Mrs. Pat Robbins, city secretary.

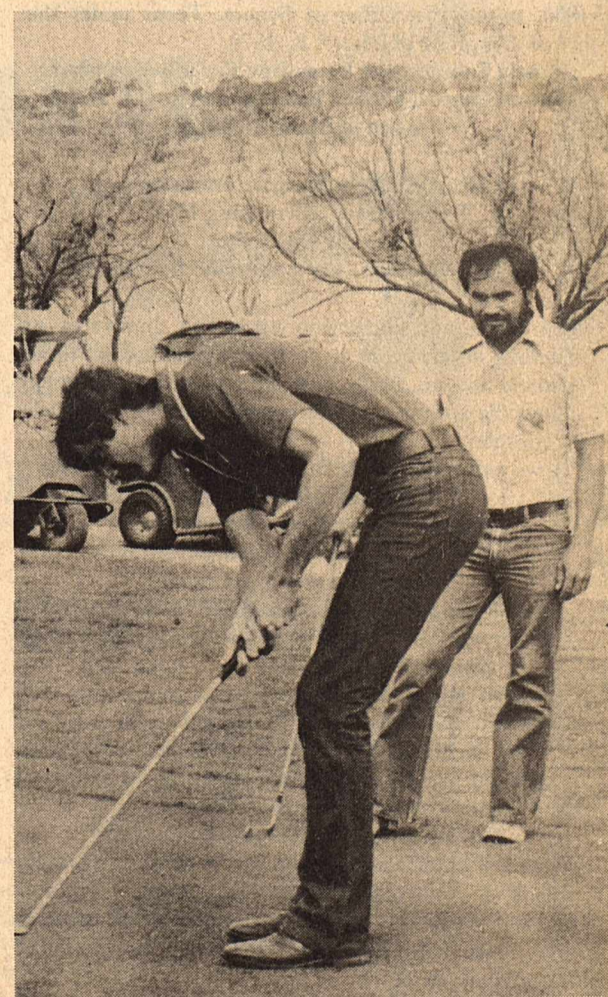

Board Approves Purchase Of Buses, Playground Equipment

At a recent meeting the Board of Trustees, Sonora ISD, reorganized, hired auxiliary personnel, and approved purchases of buses and equipment for playgrounds.

After canvassing the election returns, James Hunt and W.L. (Bud) Whitehead were declared winners of the April 3 election. Sammie Stewart and W.L. (Bud) Whitehead were elected president and secretary of the board, respectively.

The auxiliary personnel were given a cost of living increase and the board agreed to pay for their hospitalization insurance.

Approval was made for the purchase of new playground equipment and also the purchase of two new buses.

Recommendations for selecting high ranking students were postponed until a later date.

In other business, board members agreed to meet in special session to

consider alternatives for adding additional classrooms at the present high school or building a new high school. Plans for an addition to the shop were also approved.

Some new courses to be

offered in the high school are journalism, art, anatomy and physiology, build-

ing trades, drafting, gymnastics, recreational physical education, and power mechanics.

Don O. Wootan has been named Tax Assessor/Collector, and Business Manager for the Sonora Independent School District, replacing Carroll King, who resigned.

Aggie Muster Set April 21

Former students of Texas A&M University will assemble in Sonora April 21 for the annual Texas Aggie Muster, announced chairman Jimmy Beresky.

The Muster activities will begin at 6:30 p.m. at the Sutton County Steakhouse in Sonora, and is open to all former students and their families, parents of students, and friends of Texas A&M.

This year A&M is celebrating its Centennial year. It also marks the 100th anniversary of public higher education in Texas. During those 100 years, Texas A&M has grown from a small land grant college to one of the leading research and educational institutions in the nation.

The Aggie Muster dates back to 1903 and has been held annually since. More than 350 Centennial Musters will be held around the world this year, Beresky said, "wherever Texas A&M former stu-

dents live or work."

During wars, the Aggies muster in foxholes, on the battlefield, aboard ships, in airplanes and in medical hospitals. In World War II, a Muster was held on Corregidor shortly before the Japanese captured the island. Every Muster ceremony is the same, Beresky reported.

The Texas Aggies pay their respects to all those who are absent, because of death, since the last Muster. When the names of the honored dead are called from the Muster Roll, a friend of the deceased answers, "Here."

This year's Muster will include a Texas A&M Centennial movie, "That Certain Spirit", scheduled on 17 Texas television stations. On the program scheduled following the viewing of the movie will be Adam Morriss, A.E. Prugel, Dr. Elroy Otte, Jim Beresky and other local Aggies.

At 12:05 a.m., police answered a call regarding a disturbance at a local lounge. No charges were filed.

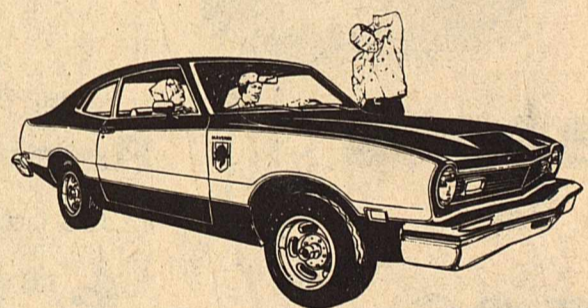
A resident on East 2nd Street called the police department at 10 a.m., April 12 reporting that a beer bottle had been thrown through the windshield of their car, parked on private property.

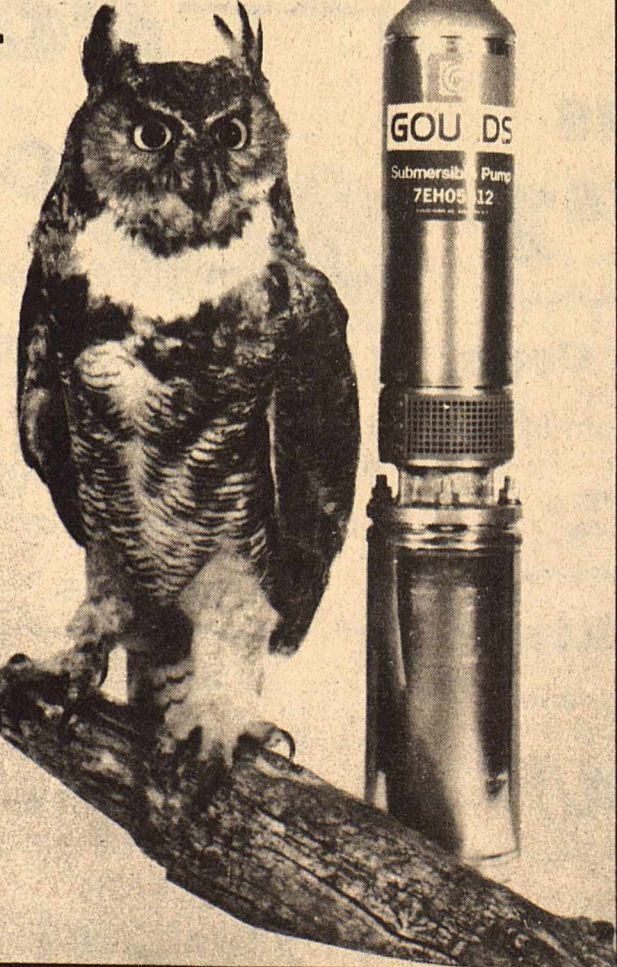
